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Preface

Delhi College of Arts and Commerce (DCAC), a premier institution of higher learning, is a constituent college of the Delhi University, financed partially (5 percent) by the Govt. of NCT, Delhi. It is a co-educational institution situated in prime location of Netaji Nagar, with various prominent residential societies and commercial ventures in its proximate neighbourhood. It is well connected by the Delhi Metro, the nearest stations being INA and AIIMS, as well as by road transport, through both bus routes as well as auto rickshaws/ e-rickshaws from the nearest Metro/ bus station. With the proposed Metro stations of Bhikaji Cama Place and R.K. Puram likely to be operational soon, commuting to college would further be eased.

The College was established in 1987 under the aegis of Delhi Administration once the erstwhile G.D. Salwan College closed its operation. Though it is now an entity independent of the Salwan Trust, yet in its formative years, it transformed out of the erstwhile G.D. Salwan College that was located in Rajinder Nagar. The college presently operates in a building owned by the Department of Higher Education, GNCTD. Despite the infrastructural constraints posed due to a non permanent self owned building, DCAC has earned the distinction of being one of the most sought after colleges, not just in South Campus, but also Delhi University as a whole. DCAC was also the pioneer college in Delhi University to introduce a three year Honors Programme in Journalism in July-August 1989.

The high quality of education imparted at DCAC is reflected in the All India survey done by India Today and Nielsen Company. This survey, that provides the Directory of Best Colleges for various years based on their independent evaluation criteria, gave a ranking of 30 to DCAC among All India Colleges in Commerce stream in 2015; a rank of 32 among All India Colleges in Arts stream in 2015; and a rank of 8 among top 10 colleges in India offering Mass Com in 2014. The college offers 18 undergraduate courses leading to the Bachelor with Honours/ Programme Degree with various paper options for students to choose from both under the CBCS mode and the erstwhile semester/ FYUP mode. The college also offers various add on and self financed courses. Till 2013, the college, in collaboration with ILL, also offered an add on English Language Proficiency Course, Basic Level to give students practice in using English in a wide variety of contexts relevant to work, study and social activities. Besides this, in 2015, the college also collaborated with National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), which has since been supplemented with the Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana Scheme. The college has also been making various efforts and initiatives to integrate cross cutting issues as gender, climate change, environmental education, human rights, ICT, etc. through various cells, societies and community outreach programmes.

Weaknesses

- ♦ There is an infrastructural constraint as the college does not own the building it operates from.
- ♦ The college does not have residential facilities for employees and students.
- ♦ To achieve enhanced institutional growth and development, the number of permanent faculty needs to be increased.
- ♦ As an undergraduate institution, the scope for research is limited in the curriculum.
- ♦ There is limited industry interface.
- ♦ There are limited prioritized research areas in the college.

Opportunities

- ♦ The college has identified that there is limited industry interface and plans to make this interface more vibrant.

- ♦ The college plans to foster a more concrete relationship with its alumni.
- ♦ The sees opportunities in collaborating with various research organization.
- ♦ The college needs to identify and promote prioritized research areas in individual departments

Challenges

- ♦ There is an infrastructural constraint as the college does not own the building it operates from.
- ♦ The process of regularization of permanent faculty is delayed.
- ♦ The ‘Weaknesses’ listed above pose the greatest challenge for the college.

Future Plan of Action

- ♦ The college library plans to revive book bank facilities for students who cannot afford to procure books on their own
- ♦ The plans to construct a gym and upgrade its canteen.
- ♦ The college plans to expand and upgrade its sports facilities.
- ♦ The college plans to get sanctions for more Hons. Courses in different subjects/ departments.
- ♦ The process of making the college a chalk-free zone is underway.
- ♦ The college plans to introduce more add-on courses.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY OF THE CRITERIA

SUMMARY OF CRITERION I CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The vision of Delhi College of Arts and Commerce (DCAC) to impart holistic education to the students for their academic excellence and inculcating national and human values in them through academic, co-curricular and socially meaningful activities is reflected both in its mission and objectives. We at DCAC aim to embrace changes and diversity and look at these as learning opportunities, sensitise students to issues central to national and social survival, introduce innovations in teaching-learning and focus on extra-curricular activities and sports alike through various activities that involve team work and learning through peer interaction. The vision and mission of the college thereby aim at achieving the embodied objectives of focusing on students through mentoring and guiding, strengthening faculty and staff interactions, fostering leadership and ethical decision-making, encouraging peer learning and engaging alumni.

The college offers 18 undergraduate courses leading to the Bachelor with Honours/ Programme Degree with various paper options for students to choose from both under the CBCS mode and the erstwhile semester/ FYUP mode. The college also offers add on self financed courses of Certificate in Spanish, Certificate in German, Certificate in French and Diploma in Spanish, along with the add-on course of Basic course in Mass Media in Hindi. Till 2013, the college, in collaboration with ILL, also offered an add on English Language Proficiency Course, Basic Level to give students practice in using English in a wide variety of contexts relevant to work, study and social activities. Besides this, in 2015, the college collaborated with National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) to implement courses in areas of a) IT-ITES b) BFSI and c) Automotive skills in the college.

Besides effective implementation of the curriculum through various teaching pedagogies and focus on blended learning, the focus is also laid on overall and holistic development of the students. To achieve this, the college has various students' societies as well as National Cadets Corps (NCC) and National Service Scheme (NSS) units, running comprehensive programmes for the betterment of the students in particular, and society at large. Further, in addition to departmental societies, the college also boasts of many societies formed by students' initiatives, under the expert guidance of teachers. Besides the seven societies which are operating under the cultural Committee, namely, Debating Society (Debsoc), Dramatics Society (Leher), Music Society (Dastgah), Dance Society (DriftUp), Photography Society (Clicks), Quiz Society and Fashion Society (Stylus.in), there are various other societies formed by student-teacher initiatives that help students do practical application of curriculum they are taught, like MUN, Enactus, Prakriti and Vyapaar.

DCAC also has a very active Placement Cell (Broadway). The Cell not only coordinates placements, but also conducts seminars in order to inform students about emerging job markets. Student placement coordinators are appointed from each stream to be part of the

placement cell. This cell trains students in various activities like the art of writing CVs, career opportunities in various sectors etc. Mock interviews and group discussions are also organized to give the students a real feel of what the placements are going to be all about. Not only does this give them the required inputs, but also goes miles in improving their confidence levels. In 2014-15, around 100 students were placed in the companies like KPMG, E&Y, PWC, L&T, ICIC Prudential, CBSE, Capital IQ, Zee media, Focus TV, Zakoobi, Oberoi group of Hotels, Genpact, Delhivery, etc.

DCAC also makes every effort to integrate cross cutting issues as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum. This is achieved through Counseling Centre, Women Cell, Eco- Club, NSS activities, activities of the students' union like organizing regular blood donation camps in the college, etc. and various other committees, societies and clubs functioning in the college. Furthermore, though the college does not have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from various stakeholder, efforts are made to devise some informal mechanism at the teacher, principal or college level to take feedback from each of the stakeholders like students, alumni, parents, industry, academic peers, management, etc. The college also has suggestion and feedback boxes located at strategic positions in the college, besides a 'Nirbheek' feedback box installed at the college gate by Delhi Police to specifically address the problems of the female students.

Finally, though the college does not have autonomy to devise curriculum of courses offered by Delhi University, faculty members of our college are represented on Board of Studies of various University departments. Department teachers of the college also represent in the Committee of Courses of their concerned departments and the teachers from the college are also represented in the University Academic and Executive Councils. All efforts and support are extended by the institution to encourage the teachers of the college to regularly participate in the course revision meetings held by some university departments before the commencement of each semester.

We at DCAC therefore abide by the preaching of **Aristotle** whereby *educating the mind without educating the heart is no education at all*.

SUMMARY OF CRITERION II

TEACHING – LEARNING AND EVALUATION

As the college is affiliated to the University of Delhi, admissions to various programs are strictly based on the norms laid down by the university. The admission process is absolutely transparent and consistent and is purely merit based. For candidates seeking admission under the sports quota, university guidelines are followed. The Sports committee organizes trials and monitors the admission process. To maintain transparency and quality, experts from outside the college, as nominated by the University of Delhi, are invited to judge the trials and participate in the selection process.

Prior to 2015, the Centralised Admission Committee of the college was not in place. The admission process was done by teachers of each department and cut-offs were decided by the teacher-in-charge in consultation with the Principal. This year onward, to add another layer of scrutiny and to minimize the chances of human error, especially in the wake of drastically changed admission guidelines of Delhi University in 2015, the Centralised Admission Committee was formed to guide, oversee and review the admission process. This review process was highly beneficial as it gave an insight into the possible errors that may be made calculating the marks for admission. Furthermore, during the review process of admissions of previous year/s, a few cases of fake admissions were detected. The Principal, on duly informing the Chairman and taking the Staff Council's decision through its meeting, informed the University Proctor of the matter and reported to the authorities through an FIR immediately. Presently the students found involved in such fake admissions are suspended and the matter is sub-judice.

DCAC follows a very student centric and guidance oriented behaviour, guided by the ethos of equal opportunities and principle of inclusivity of all sections of the society, while doing the admission process. All the rules and regulations stipulated by Government /University with regard to the admission of the SC, ST, and OBC, differently-abled candidates, wards of defense personnel, war widows, Kashmiri migrants and foreign nationals are strictly adhered to. In order to facilitate the smooth admission of various category students coming from different states and backgrounds, an Admission Help Desk is set up by the NSS wing of the college during the admission phase.

Also, as per the policy of the government, the college has reserved 3% seats for the differently-abled candidates. The reservation norms fixed by the government for the differently-abled students are strictly followed. The college is sensitive/alert to the requirements of the students with disabilities has a very active EOC which ensures provision of excellent infrastructure and other requirements for the differently-abled students of the college.

DCAC as an institution and individual teachers on their part too adopt a number of policies for bridging the knowledge gap of the enrolled 'weak' students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choices as well as promote, reward and facilitate 'advanced' learners.

The teaching, learning and evaluation schedules are strictly as per the calendar notified by the University of Delhi. The AEC and the IQAC, the latter yet in its truncated, infancy stage, ensure that learning is made more student centric and critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper is nurtured among the students through research, innovation projects, seminars, workshops, class projects, etc. Blended learning is focused in DCAC where chalk-duster mode is used simultaneously with e-methods of teaching. The college journal *Intellectual Resonance* is also available in downloadable form on the college website and a couple of our faculty members have also been invited as experts for delivering lectures

DD Vyas Higher Education Channel as a part of the UGC-CEC (Consortium for Educational Communication) initiative.

We at DCAC have well qualified and dedicated teachers who are themselves too proactive as well encouraged and facilitated by the institution to take part in various conferences, seminars, workshops, FDPs/ FTPs, etc. relevant to their areas of specialization. All our teachers have participated in various conferences and seminars, nationally as well as internationally. Many of them have presented their papers too and a few have also been invited as Resource Persons in the same. As a result of concerted effort by the individual faculty members and institutional support and encouragement, some of our faculty members have also received various awards/ recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching.

The rules and regulations concerning the evaluation process are strictly followed by the college and the same is well communicated to the students. The IA moderation and monitoring committees too ensure the proper implementation of the evaluation process. DCAC can boast of a fairly well examination performance with most of our courses having a pass percentage of higher than 90% in the last four years. DCAC as an institution makes concerted effort to monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes, be it in academics (through AEC), sports (through sports committee) or extra curricular activities (through cultural committee).

SUMMARY OF CRITERION III RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Being a leading undergraduate college in humanities, social sciences and commerce, Delhi College of Arts and Commerce values the importance of research. The college initiates its students into research and encourages them to be involved in various research projects. In order to develop a probing disposition among students, faculty members adopt a pedagogy that prioritizes questioning, dialogue and analysis. In order to inspire students to think critically, faculty members strive to lead by example and undertake various research projects. The introduction of the Innovation Projects by the University of Delhi has been a real boon for our college. Fifteen faculty members and sixty-six students have successfully undertaken six innovation projects as research investigators. One such project was selected for special display at Antardhvani (DU annual festival) and two other projects led to the publication of two edited books which offered a sound platform to students to publish their research findings.

Several of these Innovation Projects were based on the concept of community outreach which developed in our students a greater degree of social awareness and responsibility. One of the projects motivated a team of students and faculty members to develop an innovative way of integrating students with disabilities and those who wish to help them

in any form. They constructed the first of its kind online portal (www.enablethedisabled.in) that allowed instant communication between its registered members. Another project took the students outside the comforts of their classrooms and led them to conduct extensive household surveys and work as facilitators with slum women to skill them. Research and social outreach activities, however, have not remained confined to Innovation Projects alone. A few of our faculty members have availed themselves of research and travel grants from various agencies including the UGC. A number of them have been supervising PhD/ MPhil scholars from different universities. The college encourages teachers to organize and attend national/international seminars and conferences, and grants them leave as per DU/UGC guidelines. It also grants sabbatical to senior teachers to facilitate their research work. To foster research interests among the faculty, the college also brings out an interdisciplinary, peer-reviewed journal *Intellectual Resonance*. Similarly, students have been actively involved in a number of community outreach activities and sensitization programs as part of the NCC and NSS units of the college.

SUMMARY OF CRITERION IV INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The changing needs of an institution necessitate the enhancement of its infrastructure. The college has been operating, since its inception in 1987, on the premises owned by the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of NCT (GNCT), Delhi. In order to meet the infrastructural requirements of all its stakeholders, the college has always taken into consideration/cognizance all the suggestions pertaining to the same and implemented all necessary infrastructural changes/development through a proper mechanism.

In order to accommodate the growing number of students and the faculty, the college has constructed a new building. All the construction work was carried out by PWD, which has been acting as Nodal Agency for getting all construction/repair/maintenance work done in the college. The New Block of the college comprises the administrative block, four computer labs, EOC Cell, 23 classrooms, and three toilets and eight ramps with tactile paths, to make the college premises differently-abled friendly. To meet the basic need and safety of the students and staff, the college has a canteen, toilets, ten RO water coolers installed at strategic locations, a power back up 85KVA generator, 24 fire extinguishers and a fully fledged and dedicated staff for the maintenance of all the college premises and other equipment.

The college ensures an extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer aided teaching/learning materials by staff and students. This is facilitated by providing a fully Wi-Fi enabled campus, four computer labs, 21 ICT enabled classrooms, a state of the art Media Lab, a UGC-Resource Centre for the faculty members and an Equal Opportunity Cell (equipped with 17 laptops and 10 desktops installed with JAWS-13 software, Braille Script/Print, audio books, one Lex portable camera reading system

(Lex Air) and a notebook computer) for differently-abled students/staff.

The college has a well maintained library which keeps updating its database and technology to the latest versions. Approximately 500-600 students visit the library every working day. The fully computerized library has an open shelf system and OPAC which facilitates open access of books. INFLIBNET service (UGC-NLIST) has been subscribed which will become operational from April 2016. In the last three years approximately 3500 books in various disciplines were added. It has two separate reading rooms for students and the faculty, supported by IT with LAN, WAN and WiFi for uninterrupted connectivity. The College believes in holistic development of the students and motivates and encourages students to participate in that various curricular, extracurricular and sports activities are integral to the holistic development of students. The college boasts of a state of the art Multi-purpose Hall, a dedicated recreational room for cultural rehearsals/practices, NCC, NSS rooms and various sports facilities like synthetic Basket Ball Court, Volleyball Court, Table Tennis Room, Carom and Chess Room, and Mini Football Court (Six a Side) etc.

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

DCAC provides a dynamic learning environment for its students to gain knowledge, acquire skills to achieve their goals, and pursue excellence. To make the college an inclusive space, it extends various supports and facilities to students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections. A large number of free-ships, scholarships and fee-concessions are given to students at DCAC every year. The college has a very active EOC that looks into the specific concerns of differently-abled students and is equipped with ten personal computers installed with Jaws (Version 13.0) talking and screen-reading software. The EOC also has 17 netbooks with special screen-reading software.

The college plans a schedule for various curricular and extra-curricular activities well in advance every year. The college prioritizes students' participation in various college, inter-college, national and international level competitions in order to develop self-confidence and attain a sense of achievement. The college believes in holistic development of the students by creating opportunities for them to participate in various curricular, extracurricular and sports events/activities. Moreover, the college also encourages students at DCAC to be a member of at least one of its societies – National Cadet Corps (NCC), National Service Scheme (NSS) and Sports. The college has a very active NSS Unit with more than 350 volunteer students engaged in carrying out more than five in-house projects like TanZeal, Art and Craft, project Blind, and project RTI etc. DCAC NCC Unit is attached with Army unit of Group HQ Delhi 'C' i.e., 7 Delhi Battalion (7DBN) NCC. Our cadets are always encouraged to participate in various activities throughout the year which includes attending various prestigious National and International camps and parades like Youth Exchange Programme (YEP), Republic Day Parade, Thal Sainik Camp, All India

Adventure Trekking Camp, National Integration Camp, Chief Minister Rally, Blood Donation Camp, Disaster Relief Camp, etc. In order to intensify the involvement students in extra-curricular activities, the college provides allowances and support facilities such as trainers, practice space, refreshments, conveyance allowance, audio-visual facilities, musical instruments, etc. to participants in various inter-university and other national level competitions. Sports play a very important role in the holistic development of students, especially in inculcating the values of team spirit and leadership. Students of DCAC are active participants in various sports activities and have won many National and International prizes/awards.

To create awareness about market trends and job opportunities, the college encourages its students to attend workshops, seminars and pre-placement talks. Broadway, the placement cell of DCAC, provides job and internship opportunities to its students on the college campus.

The college has various grievance redressal mechanisms to address issues concerning sexual harassment, ragging, and other grievances of its stakeholders. All the activities and developments at DCAC are student centric. Societies of all the departments have appointed their respective representatives and office bearers through proper selection process. Various administrative and academic bodies in the college also have student representation like Students' Council/Union, Grievance Redressal Committee, Cultural Societies, all departmental societies etc.

The upgradation of ICT is an ongoing activity. The EOC of the college is well equipped to fulfill the needs and requirements of the differently abled. All necessary leaves are given to faculty to ensure that they attend training programmes etc. The college also engages with the larger community through the Innovation Projects, social outreach programmes etc. The placement cell of the college – *Broadway* facilitates industry interaction and provides job opportunities to the students. Students are taken for educational and industrial visits as part of their curriculum. The college has 3 complaint/suggestion boxes. The Principal has an open door policy which enables all the stakeholders to approach him with their issues and problems. Relevant information is displayed on notice boards and the college website. The college has an efficient grievance redressal mechanism. The college provides welfare schemes for the employees and they contribute and avail them regularly.

The college monitors all aspects of its functioning. The funds received are judiciously utilised. The IQAC works to refine and maintain quality standards in all aspects of functioning. The faculty and non-teaching members attend training programmes regularly for innovative teaching-learning process and ICT skills.

The vision, mission and objectives of the college are communicated to the students, teaching and non-teaching staff, parents and guardians, alumnae and other stakeholders such as industry and social service partners through the college display board, website, prospectus, interactions during staff council, staff association and other meetings, the reunion of alumnae, seminars and extra-curricular activities held in the college, besides the classroom student-teacher interactions.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The effective implementation of action plans is developed as follows:

- As the first step, each department of the college holds its meeting to decide which papers to offer among the choices offered by the University, based on teachers' specialization and student preferences known through informal interactions with the students.
- Subjects are allotted to the teachers according to their area of specialization. In ad-hoc or guest appointments too, the focus of the selection committee is to induct the faculty that can deal with the papers that they are expected to teach, if appointed.
- Each department prepares and submits the workload and the workload committee meets well before the beginning of the semester to decide, ascertain and recommend the filling of vacant posts in each department.
- The time table committee too meets before the commencement of the classes and the master time table for the college as well as for each department is prepared well in time and uploaded on college's website.
- The list of courses/papers offered, along with other information, is given in the prospectus of the college.
- The first day of the college is the orientation day where the first year students are informed about the course structure, papers, reading lists, time table and other such information as necessary for the effective implementation of the curriculum.

- Teachers follow various teaching methods to make the teaching-learning process interesting and effective. The traditional format of lectures is supplemented by classroom discussions, student presentations, group discussions, and project work. The integration of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) with traditional pedagogy enhances the learning experience of the students, reinforces conceptual clarity and instills self-confidence among the students.
- Various workshops, conferences and seminars are organized by individual teachers on topics related to their subjects.
- Guest lectures and interactive sessions with eminent scholars, experts, and activists are also planned and conducted as a part of the curricula learning. For example, the *Friday School of Economics* organizes lectures every Friday on topics that are related to the curriculum as well as practical learning for the students from the department of Economics. These are well attended by students from other departments too.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- The college administration follows the dictum that *educating the mind without educating the heart is no education at all*. Hence, the college administration strives to create an environment where teachers are motivated to take up projects and participate/ conduct seminars, conferences, etc. for the enhancement of their own learning skills and knowledge base.
- The college encourages faculty members to participate in various faculty development programs. Many faculty members are also involved in academic and professional enrichment programs.
- Faculty members attend orientation program and refresher courses organized by Academic Staff College, Delhi University, Jawaharlal Nehru University, amongst others. Some of them have also been invited over the years to be coordinators/ resource persons in such Orientation and Refresher Programmes organized by Academic Staff Colleges across the country.
- Departmental workshops are organized to discuss particular papers from time to time.
- Organization of UGC/ ICSSR sponsored National Seminars on contemporary and topical issues is an annual feature of the college.
- The college also disburses a total of Rs. 7500 annually to teachers for reimbursing the registration fee for attending various conferences, seminars, etc.

- Faculty members are provided with excellent teaching aids such as projectors, audio visual aids, computers and laptops. Sufficient numbers of classrooms with ICT provisions as well as computer laboratories are available.
- Internet is accessible for faculty as well as students. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled.
- Teachers can access the rich library resources, central computing facilities, printers and scanners, etc. The library with its extensive collection of books, journals and magazines is available and accessible to teacher and students. There are separate reading rooms for teachers and students. Also e-resource database is available for teachers and students to enrich their learning process.
- Teachers also enhance their teaching learning process through organizing workshops, seminars, field trips, etc.

As a result of such coordinated efforts of the college and teachers, a number of faculty members have been granted financial assistance under various projects and schemes; participated in/ organized various conferences, workshops, etc. and have a number of publications to their credit, as is reflected in the departmental profiles.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the curriculum provided by the affiliating university or other statutory agency.

University of Delhi has been updating its curriculum to improve its delivery and transaction. One of the major changes made by the university in recent times is shifting from annual mode to semester mode. The Four Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP) introduced by the university in 2013 had been rolled back in 2014 and Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) has been implemented in the academic session 2015. The college provides excellent support to the faculty to easily adapt to these changes, working in tandem with the Academic Execution Committee (AEC).

- The institution works with the departments in planning out the transaction of the curricular activities of each academic calendar.
- The institution encourages and provides supports to all the respective departments in organizing conferences, seminars and workshops thereby enriching academic calendar of the college.
- Subjects are allotted to the teachers according to their area of specialization. In adhoc or guest appointments too, the focus of the selection committee is to induct the faculty that can deal with the papers that they are expected to teach, if appointed.
- The curricular transaction is further enriched through the use of technology such as LCD Projectors in the classroom and transaction of the curriculum through projects which supplement regular lecture mode.

- Each Department organizes field trips to various places of academic interests.
- Inter departmental seminars and competitions under the aegis of various departmental festivals are organized from time to time.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

The various departments of the college organize workshops, seminars and conferences at national and international levels, in order to inculcate the ability to understand curriculum development and its effective operationalization. In 2014, the college organized two seminars – Intersections: History and Literature, March 11- 12, 2014, sponsored by UGC and organized by Department of English and second Whither Indian Democracy; Towards General Elections 2014, April 15-17, 2014, sponsored by ICSSR, organized by Department of Political Science.

The college has a very active Placement cell that not only helps students in getting internships and jobs, but also works towards making them employment ready. Various departmental societies conduct academic programmes, seminars and industrial visits for interaction with the industry and companies like KPMG, E&Y, IBM, Genpact, etc. Table 5.3 provides a detailed information regarding placements.

The fourth edition of Gyanodaya, Delhi University's 'College on Wheels' expedition, which started on March 11, 2014, came to an end on March 19, 2014. This time the journey was themed 'Urbanization – Now and Then'. Our college students from across the departments participated in it with Dr. Tamanna Khosla, Assistant Professor in the Department of political Science.

Departments of the college, in collaboration with the NSS, also organize field trips to slums, schools, etc. so that students can develop an understanding of discipline – society interface. Details of the activities undertaken by the NSS unit of the college are as provided in 5.3.1 and 5.3.2.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?

- Faculty members of our college are represented on Board of Studies of various University departments.
- Department teachers of the college also represented in the Committee of Courses of their concerned departments.

- Teachers from the college are also represented in the University Academic and Executive Councils.
- The teachers of the college also regularly participate in the course revision meetings held by some university departments before the commencement of each semester.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The college develops a comprehensive communication system amongst all the stakeholders to ensure that the stated objectives of the curriculum are effectively achieved. The college ensures following measures while implementing courses:

- The college strictly follows the academic calendar published by the University of Delhi. The college also fully adheres to the University regulations regarding the curriculum.
- A thorough completion of the syllabus of each subject before the end of academic calendar is always maintained.
- Class test, projects and assignments are conducted routinely and in the process, identification of slow learners is also achieved. Tutorials and remedial teaching is arranged for them.
- The AEC plays an important role in ensuring that the objectives of the courses are being met by the teachers. The committee analyses the performance of the students in the examination. Based on this analysis, subject and course-wise toppers are identified and certificates, scholarships and awards are distributed during the Annual Day Function.
- Though not as a part of the formal system, student's feedback is taken by most of the concerned teachers as part of the student centric educational strategy and in compliance with the requirements of the Student Charter. This feedback survey helps to capture the perceptions of the students about the achievement of the curriculum objectives and improvising the teaching methodology of the teacher, if required.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives, give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill

development courses etc., offered by the institution.

The College offers certificate/diploma/ skill development courses as: Certificate in Spanish, Certificate in German, Certificate in French, Diploma in Spanish and Basic Course in Mass Media in Hindi. The part time foreign language courses consist of 3 years of study in Certificate, Diploma & Advanced- Diploma. The students can then apply for M.A in the language, provided he/she has also completed his/her graduate degree course. Even if a student does the Certificate & Diploma Course, his/her knowledge of the language is complete. Advanced Diploma deals with literature. After doing such courses, the students become competent to undertake a job related to the use of the language or apply for scholarship in the country of origin of the language for Master's courses.

The basic course in Mass Media in Hindi is an abridged version of the Hindi Patrakarita course taught in a few colleges of Delhi University. This course makes the students well versed with nuances of various aspects of working in the field of media, television, print or web, even without a background of formal course in Journalism and Mass Media. Students have been able to secure jobs in the media industry after successful completion of this course along with their graduation degree.

The College does not offer any such programs as no such provision exists in the ordinance of the University of Delhi. However the college does offer various add-on, certificate and diploma courses as enlisted in 1.2.1 above.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility

The College itself does not offer nor has the autonomy to offer such facility. The rules of the Delhi University in the adoption of CBCS are applicable to the college too.

Lateral and vertical mobility within and across program and courses

Such facilities are not provided to the students as admissions are strictly taken on the basis of declared cut-offs and upholding the rules and regulations of Admissions of Delhi University. Hence, to allow such mobility to students may lead to violation of the admission rules and procedures.

Enrichment courses

No such courses are offered by the university.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed program? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programs, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Add-on Self financed courses run by the college are:

1. Certificate in Spanish
2. Certificate in German
3. Certificate in French
4. Diploma in Spanish

Procedure for admission: For Certificate courses, applications are invited and merit list is drawn according to the percentage of marks in class 12th. And for Diploma and Advanced-Diploma, the qualifying examination is certificate course and Diploma, respectively, in the concerned language. Usually, the intake every year is around 50-55 students for each of the four courses, which are then divided into 2 sections of 25-30 students for each course.

The Curriculum is as prescribed by the University of Delhi through the Department of Germanic and Romance Studies (GRS).

The Fee Structure is decided by the Principal and Coordinator of the Foreign Languages and Add-on courses at the beginning of each academic year. Since the course is a not-for-profit course, the fee is kept low, as it is meant only to support the salary of the teaching and non teaching staff and to meet other minimal sundry expenditures like teaching aid, stationery etc.

The teacher Qualifications are as recommended by GRS Department, University of Delhi as the teachers for various courses are sent by them only as per the requirement sent by the college. The college makes no direct recruitment of faculty for such courses, on ad-hoc, temporary or even guest basis.

Salary of Teaching Staff is as prescribed by the University of Delhi that is presently at Rs. 2000/- per lecture.

The Salary of Non- Teaching Staff is as decided by the Principal and Coordinator of the Foreign and Add-on courses, which is presently Rs. 11986/- per month.

Certificate Courses in Korean, Chinese & Japanese were running in college till 2 years back. However, they had to be discontinued after the Department of GRS, University of Delhi, expressed its inability to send teachers for the same.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented program, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Delhi College of Arts and Commerce & Institute of Lifelong Learning, University of Delhi offered an add on English Language Proficiency Course, Basic Level to give students

practice in using English in a wide variety of contexts relevant to work, study and social activities. It was aimed to specifically help students to:

Understand and respond to spoken language

Learn how to speak fluently and use appropriate expressions

Read and comprehend different kinds of texts for different purposes

Write coherently and effectively in formal and informal contexts

The teachers teaching the course had to undergo special training to teach it and the course was run successfully till 2013 with students giving an excellent feedback. It was/is an interactive course where the teacher is the facilitator. However, the course could not be continued as it was an add-on course held after college hours and, with the introduction of the FYUP, with its long college hours, students were keen to join but reluctant to stay back late as it was a two hour class, held three times a week.

Presently, a number of students were/are interested but said that they were unable to pay the fee of Rs. 3000. Earlier, the University subsidized the course. The Course was open to all students studying in the University of Delhi, including SOL Students. We are keen to try to re-introducing the programme from the academic session 2016-17.

Besides this, in 2015, the college collaborated with National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) to implement courses in areas of (a) IT-ITES (b) BFSI and (c) Automotive skills in the college. The college has appointed a nodal officer for the same and he attended an orientation for skill development programme at Delhi University North Campus in August, 2015 and later another workshop in the same month at ARSD college campus.

As the next step, orientation session for the above skill based courses was organized in the college in September 2015 with the Training Partners of NSDC. The course was priced at a fee of Rs. 5000/- per course. However, we did not receive any enthusiastic response from the students and not a single enrolment was made in the college. This may be due to the fact that the average pay package being offered after the completion of such a skill based course was around 10—15 thousand per month, whereas the average pay package that our students earn through placement cell is considerably higher and therefore more lucrative to the students.

Ever since, this scheme has also been supplemented with the Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana Scheme and it is planned to introduce and gauge students' response for it from next semester onward.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and distance mode of education for students to choose the courses / combination of their choice? If yes, how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

The University of Delhi does not provide such flexibility.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programme and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

One of the objectives of the college is to groom, cultivate, develop and prepare students to deal with social and professional challenges of the modern world. Efforts are made to foster necessary skills in the students to compete in a global society. But more importantly, all endeavors are made to cultivate good human values among the students. Thus, the focus is on overall development of the students. The college tries to give the students an exposure keeping this perspective in view.

For achieving this goal, various committees are put in place well before the academic session starts. Such committees ensure that each and every functional activity of the college is carried on under the expert guidance of the teachers. The college has various students' societies as well as National Cadets Corps (NCC) and National Service Scheme (NSS) units, running comprehensive programmes for the betterment of the students in particular, and society at large. The college also constitutes committees for addressing the special needs of the students from all walks of life. In addition to departmental societies, the college also boasts of many societies formed by students' initiatives, under the expert guidance of teachers. Besides the seven societies which are operating under the cultural Committee, namely, Debating Society (Debsoc), Dramatics Society (Leher), Music Society (Dastgah), Dance Society (DriftUp), Photography Society (Clicks), Quiz Society and Fashion Society (Stylus.in), there are various other societies formed by student-teacher initiatives that help students do practical application of curriculum they are taught, like MUN, Enactus, Prakriti and Vyapaar.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experience of the students and cater to the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Though the college does not have the autonomy to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum as it is taught as per the curriculum approved by the University of Delhi for various courses, yet the college boasts of running various cells/units which work towards preparing students for the dynamic employment market.

DCAC has a very active Placement Cell (Broadway). The Cell not only coordinates placements, but also conducts seminars in order to inform students about emerging job markets. Student placement coordinators are appointed from each stream to be part of the placement cell. This cell trains students in various activities like the art of writing CVs, career opportunities in various sectors etc. Mock interviews and group discussions are

also organized to give the students a real feel of what the placements are going to be all about. Not only does this give them the required inputs, but also goes miles in improving their confidence levels.

The college also boasts of a Model United Nations (MUN) cell. The students learn to behave like a parliament in these sessions, arguing and counter arguing with each other on issues that concern the world. In this era of inter-disciplinary studies, when students from across the streams are taught about the democratic ways of functioning of Indian and world parliament systems, MUN goes a long way in building student confidence and catering to their need of learning to face the job markets.

Furthermore, the inter-disciplinary innovation research projects undertaken by students and teachers from different disciplines are an effective means of fostering critical and analytical ability in students and also the teachers. These skills are essential in creating an effective workforce for an emerging and dynamic economy.

Workshops, training programs, and special lectures are also organized regularly and interactive sessions for students with eminent scholars and resource persons are organized from time to time in order to build a culturally rich campus. These activities are a source of enrichment for students and teachers alike.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The college makes every effort to integrate cross cutting issues as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum.

Counseling Centre, Women Cell, Anti Ragging Committee and Internal Complaints Committee, etc. are very active in the college. Programmes are regularly conducted by these cells/committees to increase the awareness and sensitivity regarding gender related issues.

In association with Delhi State Legal Services Authority, the college recently organized lectures by eminent judges Ms. Monika Saroha and Ms. Chetna Singh, who are renowned for their works on sexual harassment and domestic violence. They delivered talks and answered students' queries on issues of "Prevention of Sexual Harassment at workplace" and "Domestic Violence". The college plans to make such talks with them a regular feature.

The College also recently installed a Sanitary Napkins Vending Machine in the Girls Common Room. This was installed by HLL, as duly approved by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

On the occasion of Women's Day, the women's cell of DCAC in collaboration with Delhi Police, Sarojini Nagar Station, conducted a session on self defense training for the female students. The students were also addressed on several aspects and issues related to women's safety by Mr. Tyagi, ACP and Mr. Yadav, SHO, Sarojini Nagar Police Station.

A compulsory course on Environmental Studies as per the UGC guidelines has been included in the curriculum.

The Eco-Club of the college is also a very active club and organizes regular programmes on environmental protection and awareness. The NSS activities further reinforce environmental awareness among the students and help them to work towards environmentally sustainable practices. The details of the ecological initiatives undertaken in the college are also given in section 7.1.2.

The NSS, along with the students' council/union, also organizes regular blood donation camps in the college, in association with reputed organizations and NGOs, that are very well received by the students.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programs offered to ensure holistic development of students?

For the holistic development of the students and to inculcate moral and ethical values, various initiatives are taken by the college like:

- Certificate in Spanish, Certificate in German, Diploma in Spanish and Certificate in French are run as add-on self financed courses by the college; Basic course in mass media in Hindi is run as an add-on course and till 2013, the college used to run the skill orientation program of English Language Proficiency Course
- The NCC and NSS as well as clubs like the environmental club, etc. run social extension activities which foster all-round development of the students.
- Distinguished persons from varied academic and cultural spheres, political and social activists are regularly invited to deliver talks and hold interactive sessions for the students.
- The college as a whole as well as various departments and interact clubs also organize various activities such as poster making competition, painting competition, debates, slogan writing competition, essay competition, literary competition, dance competitions, music and song competition, treasure hunt, fashion shows, film screening, etc. from time to time.
- Medical Checkup and Blood Donation Camps are regularly organized in the college.
- The Eco club organises awareness walks for conservation of water, electricity and cleanliness.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Student feedback, obtained through the informal mechanism/s adopted in the college, has been helpful to the college for deciding on the courses to be introduced as well as the curriculum enrichment activities to be introduced. For example, efforts are being made to introduce new Honors programs such as Mathematics Honors, Hindi Honors and B.Sc. Computer Science after getting feedback from stakeholders. The students' feedback is also incorporated in planning guest lectures and all efforts are made to invite scholars on issues of interest to the students.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment program?

The college takes the monitoring and evaluation of the quality of the enrichment program in a very serious manner as this, after all, is the true reflection of the efforts that have been made in every sphere. In order to monitor and evaluate the quality enrichment program, course wise and class wise report of the results is prepared for each department and the result is reviewed by the Department in the meeting with the Principal as well as with AEC. The shortfalls and lacuna are observed and remedial actions are taken whenever necessary. Moreover, the accolades and awards won by our students in various inter-college activities too are a reflection and testimony to the results born of the efforts. Tables 5.3.2 a), b) and c) present a detailed report of all such societies and achievements of the students in extra curricular and sports events for the last four years.

As a result of this coordinated effort and amalgamation of curricular and extra-curricular activities, the college can boast of alumni like Mr. Rahul Verma, Social worker and activist, founded the Uday Foundation; **Mr. Nalin Mehta**, Senior Journalist, Former Managing Editor of Headlines Today; **Mr. Rahul Kanwal**, Senior Journalist, TV Today Networks, **Mr. Cyrus Sahukar**, VJ and Bollywood Actor; **Ms. Rekha Rana**, Bollywood Actress and theatre artist; **Mr. Vinil Mathew**, Ad filmmaker and Bollywood film director; **Mr. Gursimran Khamba**, Comedian of AIB fame, among others.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The college ensures that every department is represented in meetings, seminars and workshops related to curriculum design and development, especially in the context of the restructured syllabi. Teachers of the institution also play a dynamic role in the curriculum design and development through their respective departments. Many of our teachers have been part of their respective departments' committee of courses to review the changes in the syllabi.

Also, under the Delhi University system, since the college itself does not have the freedom to incorporate new topics in the syllabus, all efforts are made that worthwhile suggestions are communicated to the concerned departments at the university, as also to the Academic Council of the University. As mentioned in table 1.1.6, many of our college teachers have been part of committee of courses as well as the Academic Council of the Delhi University.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the university and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new program?

The college does not have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from various stakeholders. However, efforts are made to take feedback from each of the stakeholder as discussed below:

For *student feedback*, most of the departments and/or individual teachers have evolved a mechanism to obtain student feedback on curriculum informally. Students are also encouraged to submit their feedback regarding the functioning of the non-teaching staff, infrastructure related issues, library facilities and computer laboratories available for them in the college. The college also has suggestion and feedback boxes located at strategic positions in the college. This feedback is discussed within the department as well as with the Principal and appropriate measures are taken to improve the teaching-learning process. The concerns of the department are communicated during the Delhi University departmental review committee of course meeting. The Principal of his own too, meets, class representatives of all the courses and takes their feedback on both the academic as well as infrastructural aspects of the college and tries to remedy them as much as possible, given the constraints.

The *feedback from alumni* is obtained in the Alumni Meet hosted by the college. DCAC organizes its Alumni Meet on the last Sunday of February every year. This is in an informal manner, both at the college level as well as at departmental level. This helps in improving the market acceptability and beyond the coursework teaching as this feedback comes from the ones already in the employment market and knowing fully well as to what were the shortcomings they possessed, both in securing a job and working on field. We

thus ensure that we learn from this feedback and help improve the present students' employability prospects.

Though there is neither a formal feedback mechanism nor an interactive forum where the *feedback from parents* is obtained, yet the college Principal is always available to discuss the problems that any parent might want to share. These are then discussed with the concerned teacher/s and all efforts are made to address them in the most efficient manner.

The *industry feedback* is taken by the Placement Cell of the college and this helps them organize lectures and provide suggestions to students to enhance skills to meet employment aspirations of the employers.

The informal discussion that our faculty members have with *academic peers* in various departmental meetings, paper setting boards, central evaluation centers, etc. help them determine the potential that their students have vis-à-vis their university peers and the gaps that need to be filled. The teachers then discuss the infrastructural requirements for this gap filling with the Principal and all efforts, as possible within the financial and administrative constraints, are made to help the students realize their full potential.

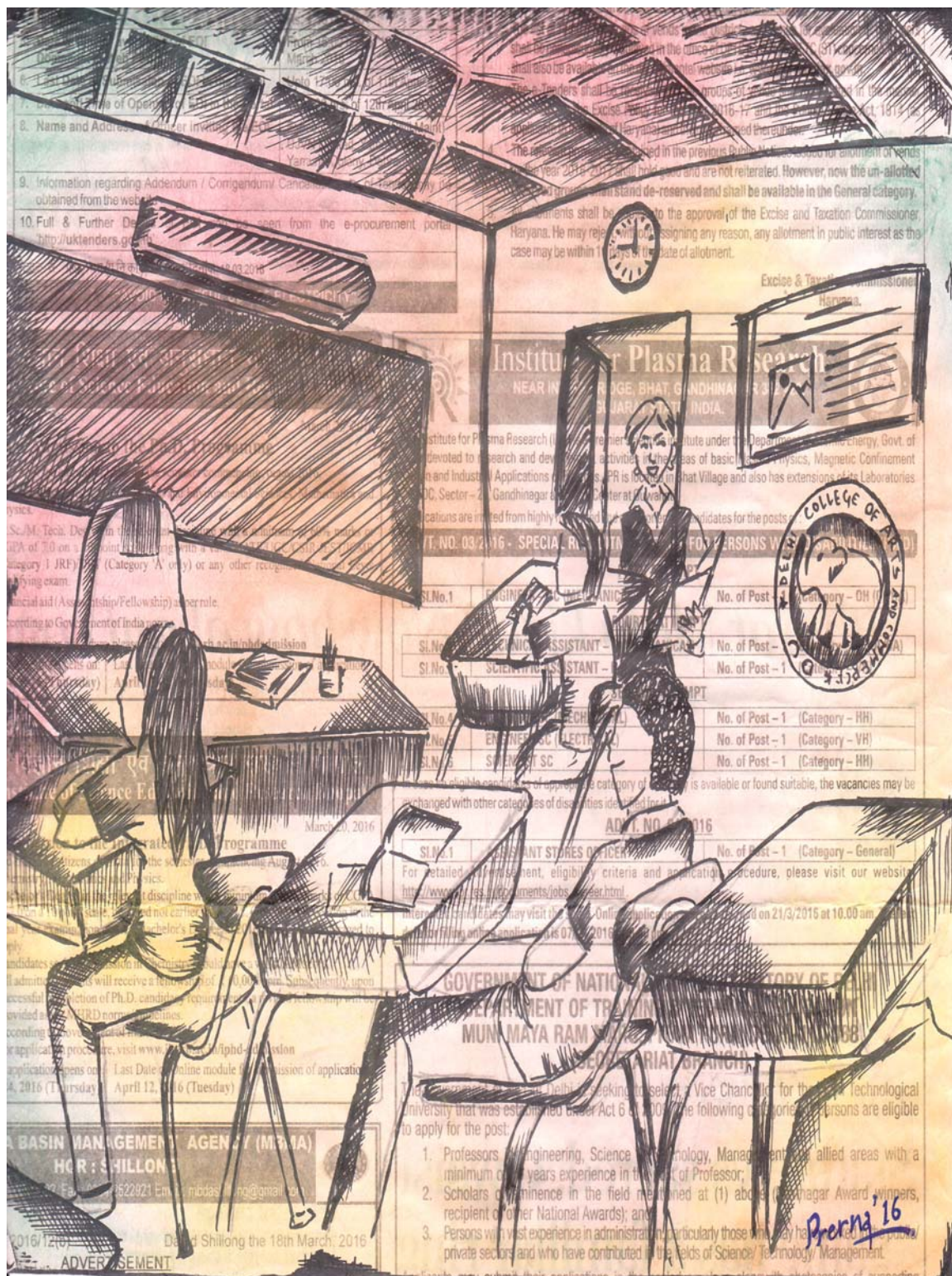
The *management* of the college does not give any formal feedback. However, there are two members of the faculty who are a part of the college Governing Body and issues of the teachers, that warrant the attention of the management, can always be raised by them as teachers' representative. The Chairman, Treasurer and other members of the Governing Body usually discuss any major administrative/ functional problem of the college and ratify the decision/ give suggestions for improved working of the college. Besides this, the teachers are also authorized to approach the Chairman on an independent level concerning an issue of concern. On an informal level too, the Chairman of the Governing Body and the Principal do keep in regular touch over the issues concerning overall development of the college.

1.4.3 How many new program/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/program?

No new programs/courses were introduced in the college in the last four years. However, the process to start B.A.(Hons.) Mathematics and B.A.(Hons.) Hindi courses in the college is in the pipeline. This is based on the feedback of students who are studying Mathematics and Hindi as discipline papers in B.A. Program as well as the admission seekers, which reflects visibly high demand among the students of good ranks for these courses. The B.Sc. Computer Science course has been approved by the competent authority and will be introduced in the college from academic session 2016-17.

CRITERION - II

TEACHING – LEARNING AND EVALUATION



2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

- As the college is affiliated to the University of Delhi, admissions to various programs are strictly based on the norms laid down by the university. The admission process is absolutely transparent and consistent.
- The applications are judged on merit and marks are verified through the internet and CDs of various Boards provided by the University.
- The entire admission process is presented in the college prospectus.
- The cut-off lists of various courses are displayed on the college and University websites (<http://dcac.du.ac.in> and <http://du.ac.in>, respectively). The same are also displayed on the college notice boards and made public in all leading national newspapers.
- There is a Centralised Admission Committee in place to oversee the entire admission process of each department and to guide the faculty and non teaching members too about changed admission procedures, as done in the admission to courses in the session 2015-16.

Besides the centralized admission committee, there is also an admission grievance committee in general and specific to students from reserved categories. Information about these, along with members' contact numbers and e-mail ids duly displayed is the college premises.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various program of the institution.

- The admissions to all courses of the college are purely merit based. For admission to any course in the College, the candidates are required to fill the University centralized application form. The cut-offs of various courses are decided by the department teacher-in-charge in consultation with the Principal and the centralized admission committee.
- Previously, for the admissions in B.A.(Hons.) English and B.A. (Hons.) Journalism, the scores of applicants in the Common Aptitude Test conducted by Department of English, University of Delhi and Common Journalism Entrance Test and interviews, respectively, were considered. From 2013-14 onwards, University stopped conducting these entrance exams, therefore admissions for these two courses too are now given on the basis of the marks obtained by the candidate in Class 12th.

- For candidates seeking admission under the sports quota, university guidelines are followed. The Sports committee organizes trials and monitors the admission process. To maintain transparency and quality, experts from outside the college, as nominated by the University of Delhi, are invited to judge the trials and participate in the selection process. Table 2.1.2 gives details of the students admitted under the sports category in the year 2015-16.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the Institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Prior to 2015, the Centralised Admission Committee of the college was not in place. The admission process was done by teachers of each department and cut-offs were decided by the teacher-in-charge in consultation with the Principal. This year onward, to add another layer of scrutiny and to minimize the chances of human error, especially in the wake of drastically changed admission guidelines of Delhi University in 2015, the Centralised Admission Committee was formed to guide, oversee and review the admission process. This proved to be an exercise of great advantage as a few cases were detected where the departmental teachers' oversight resulted in the issuance of admission forms to students who were not eligible as per the new cut off rules. With this committee, added layer was formed to verify and check the eligibility criteria, after which the documents went to the administration and account branches for onward processing.

This review process was highly beneficial as it gave an insight into the possible errors that may be made while calculating the marks for admission. This formed the basis of orienting and guiding other members of the college involved in admission process to be careful not to make similar miscalculation/error.

Furthermore, during the review process of admissions of previous year/s, marks of the students were being checked with the CD of marks of various boards in class 12th as provided by the Delhi University. A few cases, where list of boards, eg. Mohali Board, were not enlisted in the CD data, the student marksheets were sent to individual boards/schools for verification. In this review process, a few cases of fake admissions were detected. The Principal, on duly informing the Chairman and taking the Staff Council's decision through its meeting, informed the University Proctor of the matter and reported to the authorities through an FIR immediately. Presently the students found involved in such fake admissions are suspended and the matter is sub-judice.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase / improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrates / reflect the national commitment to diversity and inclusion.

DCAC follows a very student centric and guidance oriented behaviour, driven by the ethos of equal opportunities and principle of inclusivity of all sections of the society, while doing the admission process. All the rules and regulations stipulated by Government /University with regard to the admission of the SC, ST, and OBC, differently-abled candidates, wards of defense personnel, war widows, Kashmiri migrants and foreign nationals are strictly adhered to.

In order to facilitate the smooth admission of various category students coming from different states and backgrounds, an Admission Help Desk is set up by the NSS wing of the college during the admission phase. While adhering to the statutory reservation policies, DCAC caters to a mix of students from all across the country. Though DCAC does not provide hostel facility for its students, yet a number of girls/boys Paying Guest options are available near the campus to cater to out station students of the college. Question no. 26 of the college departmental reports gives an insight into the course wise diversified student profile of the college.

The College is also making efforts to introduce new honors courses.

Since the candidates fill the centralized admission forms, one cannot specify exactly as to what are the most preferred courses of the students. Generally, a student applies to multiple courses and colleges in one form. The admission trends too cannot give a clear pointer to students' course preferences because seats keep getting filled in large numbers even with marginal drop in cut off percentages. Efforts are made that the number of students admitted to each course are as per the sanctioned strength of the college for that course; however, since the Delhi University admission rules do not follow a 'first come first served' policy, the number of students admitted under a particular course may be much more than the sanctioned strength for that course. The only seats that have lied vacant this year are due to changed admission guidelines of Delhi University and the reluctance on part of the college to drastically drop a particular cut off for fear of attracting much more admissions than the sanctioned strength.

2.2 Catering to the needs of students

2.2.1 How does the Institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

As per the policy of the government, the college has reserved 3% seats for the differently-abled candidates. The reservation norms fixed by the government for the differently-abled students are strictly followed. The college is sensitive/alert to the requirements of the students with disabilities and is adhering to the government policies in this regard. Some of the infrastructural facilities for students with physical disabilities are:

- College has the Special Ramps facility at various locations in the college to ensure easy accessibility and movement of differently able students.

- All stairways and steps have grab handles which makes it easy for the differently able students and faculty to climb the stairs, if required.
- Differently-abled-friendly toilet has been constructed on the ground floor with the ramp.
- Lectures of differently able students are always managed and designed to take place on the ground floor to make the college differently able friendly.
- To make it convenient for the blind students to identify their classrooms, all the room numbers are displayed in Braille.
- College has constituted an Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC) to create a socially sensitive environment and inclusive society. Every year it organizes a one day festival to give a platform to such students to showcase their talents. Time to time EOC also conducts seminars to streamline the problems faced by differently able persons in the society and to address the issue of attitude, approach and interaction towards differently able students and teachers.
- The main library, administrative office and examination department are situated on the ground floor of the college building which makes these easily accessible for differently-able/ physically challenged students.
- Braille books are available for visually challenged library users and they are kept on ground floor.
- Library has a collection of books in the Braille Script/Print, audio books, one Lex portable camera reading system (Lex Air) and a notebook computer.
- Laptops with special installed software are also provided in the library for visually challenged students to facilitate their learning.

These students are also granted additional time for writing their examination. During the examination a scribe is appointed for the visually challenged who writes for the examinee. These students are also given preference in all support schemes available in the institutions.

2.2.2 Does the Institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes, give details on the process.

- Though a particular student who has secured the desired cut off mark for a given course becomes eligible to seek admission in that course, yet on an informal level, the teachers of the department counsel the student/ his guardians as to what the course entails and the opportunities and challenges there-of.
- The Centralised Admission Committee guides the students about the career prospects of the courses being offered. The department teachers too orient a candidate and

help him/her clear confusion about the syllabus and difficulty level of some given papers.

- The NSS admission help desk too helps students decide on various course options depending on their skills, knowledge, interest and available course books and other reading material for the same.
- Besides orienting admission seekers during the admission phase, the college organizes a formal Orientation Day to facilitate and familiarize the students with various facilities available in the college. The Principal addresses the gathering and acquaints them with the college culture, expected code of conduct, examination pattern, ECA, sports, NCC, NSS, various societies and other facilities which are available in the college.
- Subsequently, each department organizes its own departmental orientation programme to apprise the students of the course content and scope of the programme. Through group interaction, teachers assess the students' ability and accordingly plan teaching methodology.
- Each departmental society organizes a Fresher's talent search programme to identify the hidden skills of the new students.
- Various cultural societies and clubs of the college like Enactus, Vyapaar, Prakriti, Fashion Society, Lehar, Debating Society, Quiz Society, etc. too organize their respective orientation and selection process in the first month itself wherein the first year students are selected for the given club based on their skills. These are then nurtured further and exposure provided to the students through participation in various intra and inter college activities.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the Institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choices? (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on /Enrichment courses, etc.)

The tutorial classes provided in the University system helps in giving special attention to weak students of the class and to help them cope with the course work.

Some teachers, on an informal level, try and divide the class into tutorial groups based on their aptitude and abilities to learn and grasp the course they are studying. This helps the teacher in giving focused attention to those students who need to bridge the knowledge gap.

Personalized counseling is also given by the teachers to students as well as to parents who sometimes come to college to discuss specific problems of their children.

After-class-teaching and informal remedial classes are also organized by some teachers of the college to help the students who find it difficult to keep pace with the class course work.

The college also had an English Language Proficiency Course, Basic Level, running successfully till 2013. It was aimed to specifically help students to understand and respond to spoken language; learn how to speak fluently and use appropriate expressions; read and comprehend different kinds of texts for different purposes and; write coherently and effectively in formal and informal contexts.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college makes a number of efforts to sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender inclusion, environment etc. The following efforts and initiatives are done by DCAC on these sensitive issues of critical importance:

Counseling Centre, Women's Cell, Anti Ragging Committee and Internal Complaints Committee, etc. are very active in the college. Programmes are regularly conducted by these cells to increase the awareness and sensitivity regarding gender related issues.

In association with Delhi State Legal Services Authority, the college recently organized lectures by eminent judges Ms. Monika Saroha and Ms. Chetna Singh, who are renowned for their works on sexual harassment and domestic violence. They delivered talks and answered students' queries on issues of "Prevention of Sexual Harassment at workplace" and "Domestic Violence". The college plans to make such talks with them a regular feature.

The College also recently installed a Sanitary Napkins Vending Machine in the Girls Common Room. This was installed by HLL, as duly approved by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

On the occasion of Women's Day, the Women's cell of DCAC in collaboration with Delhi Police, Sarojini Nagar Station, conducted a session on self defense training for the female students. The students were also addressed on several aspects and issues related to women's safety by Mr. Tyagi, ACP and Mr. Yadav, SHO, Sarojini Nagar Police Station.

The Eco-Club of the college is also a very active club and organizes regular programmes on environmental protection and awareness. The NSS activities further reinforce environmental awareness among the students and help them to work against climate change.

The NSS along with the students' council/union also organizes regular blood donation camps in the college in association with reputed organizations and NGOs that are very well received by the students.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

- The faculty members teaching a given paper/course are the best judges to identify the advanced learners of any class. These students are given various incentives and help by the faculty to nurture and blossom their special talents and help them in their chosen areas of higher studies.
- The teachers sometimes provide them with extra question banks to help them enhance their skills further and to help them prepare for various entrance tests for admission to programs of further higher studies.
- These students are involved in the organization of various workshops, seminars, etc. of the department so that they not only learn to organize such events, but also learn to interact and enhance their knowledge base by interacting with the eminent scholars and invited guests.
- These students are also sent as representatives to various inter college workshops, presentations and programs of their interests.
- Many of the students are also involved by the teachers in the innovation projects that are running in the college.
- Most of the departments have their own departmental societies that organize annual departmental fests. This gives the students hands-on experience in planning, implementation and execution of an idea and programme that requires multi-layered coordination.
- Further, to motivate and reward such students, various informal scholarships have been initiated by the college faculty members that are awarded to students from time to time. These are besides the ones being offered by the different governmental organization and Delhi University. These are:

Dr. M. Vats (retired from Dept of History), in memory of her mother, awards Damayanti Pathak Memorial Award for contributing to History Association.

Dr. Devika Narula (Associate Prof, English), awards in memory of her mother Late Mrs. Pushpa Khanna for contributing to college life.

Dr. Anuradha Gupta (Associate Prof, Mathematics) awards in memory of her husband Late Shri Sanjay Gupta, which is awarded to a meritorious student of the college.

Dr. Tarjeet Sabharwal (Associate Prof, Journalism) awards in memory of her late father for outstanding students in the field of journalism.

The teachers belonging to the SC/ ST communities award Jyotiba Phule Award for best

male student and Savitri Bai Phule award for the best female student, to be awarded to meritorious students among the SC/ST admissions in any course of study.

Besides these, the college also has two Trust scholarships running for its students, namely, Usha Aggarwal Trust Scholarship and Sultan Chand Fund Scholarship.

2.2.6 How does the institution collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

- It is difficult to identify all such students; however individual staff members keep a keen eye for such cases during the classes, tutorials, and interactive sessions.
- Special attention is given to such students in tutorial classes.
- Informal remedial classes are held for the slow learners by many teachers to help them keep pace with the class.
- Many teachers have also devised a system where they tend to group slow learners with others in class in project/ presentation/ other group activities.
- Also, when identified, they are sent to counselor too to address any specific problem/s.
- Since the classrooms are not fixed course-wise, when room allotment is done, first priority is to give ground floor classes to physically challenged students for least discomfort to them.
- Financial support from the Students' Aid Fund and other scholarships are provided to those belonging to the economically weaker section. Details of the same can be referred to from 5.1.
- The new entrants to the college are also informed about the various scholarships run by different governments, their departments or the Delhi University. The college motivates and helps them to apply for the same and facilitates in ease of their disbursements, if awarded to the students.

2.3 Teaching – Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The college follows the academic calendar notified by the University of Delhi.

Each Department prepares teacher wise and paper wise workload for the next semester well in advance. The teachers are given papers as per their specializations. The workload

submitted by each department is scrutinized by the workload committee and then the time table is prepared and as observed by the AEC, it is displayed on the college website as well as pasted outside each classroom.

The first day of the college is the orientation day where the first year students are informed about the course structure, papers, reading lists, time table and other such information as necessary for the effective implementation of the curriculum.

The teachers conduct projects/ presentations/ tests/ assignments as per the prescribed norms and discuss the model answers with the students.

For class tests, assessed answers sheets along with module evaluation/scheme marking are shown to the students and discussed in the class.

Internal Assessment marks scored by the students are signed by them and displayed on college notice board as well as website.

The evaluation scheme for the theory papers is as per the University of Delhi guidelines whereby all papers are checked in centrally assigned evaluation centers and teachers report there as per their papers taught.

2.3.2 How does IQAC, contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

- An IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) had been constituted in the college which monitors quality of teaching and has taken important decisions to supplement the working of the AEC.
- Though yet at an infancy stage, it has been working to ensure that the teaching-learning process proceeds unhindered, by way of assigning days for departmental festivals on weekends to disrupt minimal college teaching, monitoring of display of time tables in front of all classes and on website, and other such activities.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Our aim is to produce good and responsible citizens of India through our classroom teaching and extra curricular and sports activities. Our teaching is largely focused on active learning in pursuit of knowledge. The college provides the following support system to the students:

- The Computer Lab/s, Multi Purpose Hall/Auditorium, Seminar Hall/s, ICT enabled Class Rooms, Library, e-resources, Wi-Fi enabled campus.
- The college organizes workshops, seminars and conferences which aim to broaden and deepen their knowledge in various fields.

- The college encourages students to participate in intercollegiate events, community outreach initiatives, sports, etc. in order to inculcate leadership skills among them.
- The departmental festivals promote student-centric events for them to plan and execute, so that they learn the art of managing and administering works and processes.
- At the department level, students are encouraged to invite scholars for special lectures so that besides learning on the subject, they also learn to interact with professionals in the field and, in the process, learn about people and their contributions while doing their background study before approaching them.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- Our teaching is largely focused on interactive learning in pursuit of knowledge, and acquisition of moral and ethical values of our society. The students are encouraged to debate and develop scientific temper in these interactive classroom sessions.
- Special emphasis is laid on assigning research projects to students which are likely to encourage out of the box thinking. Projects on conventional subjects are discouraged and efforts are made to stimulate critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper of students through them.
- The Innovation Projects of our faculty too were ‘unconventional’ and encouraged practical thinking, application of ideas and scientific temper. The faculty for each of these projects involved students from across the disciplines to carry out research with them, that nurtured their research skills and application of theoretical knowledge.
- Students and faculty are encouraged to take part in seminars, workshops and conferences hosted by other institutions.
- The college has also been encouraging the students to take part in Gyanodaya, as it was popularly called as the ‘knowledge on wheels train’ of Delhi University. By exploring new places each year and learning about different cultures, the students learnt to amalgamate theory with practical and developed scientific temperament towards things, people, places and cultures.
- Various societies under the cultural committee of the college encourage their students to participate and deliberate on non conventional issues so as to sharpen their critical thinking and analytical powers.
- Testimony to such teaching pedagogy is the Dramatics Society of the college, Lehar, that has been organizing its street plays on contemporary and topical issues

and presenting them in a manner that challenges all students to think, analyze and learn to question. In 2013, it organized the play “Galli ke Kutte” that was based on the life of street beggars; in 2014, its annual production was on Transgenders and it was named as “What is the Gender of your Soul” and in 2015, it was Bhakshak which was based on various forms of violence that exist in the society.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g. Virtual laboratories, e-learning – resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), Open educational resources, mobile education etc.

- Projectors are installed in many classrooms in the college and are effectively used by the faculty to deliver lectures.
- Select topics from the syllabus are taught with the help of PPT presentations.
- The campus is Wi-Fi enabled with open access to faculty and students alike.
- Laptops have also been provided to each department to facilitate e-teaching techniques. Some laptops have also been issued to students on demand.
- The college has well equipped computer labs to encourage students and faculty to use technology to supplement classroom teaching.
- To develop e-learning, the college journal *Intellectual Resonance* (ISSN: 2321-2594) is also available in downloadable form on the college website.
- A couple of our faculty members have also been invited as experts for delivering lectures DD Vyas Higher Education Channel as a part of the UGC-CEC (Consortium for Educational Communication) initiative.
- Students are also encouraged to see and make use of such lectures delivered on DD Vyas channel/s.
- The students are also encouraged to make use of the e-information-resources available by accessing the UGC-Info net databases and thousands of e-journals with full text information that are available at N-LIST platform through institutional membership.
- Faculty members and students can access the resources prepared by the Institute of Life Long Learning (ILLL) of DU in order to have access to updated information and knowledge.
- A few of our faculty members have also been part of ILLL’s content writers’ team for various courses.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lecturers, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- LCD projectors have been provided in the lecture rooms to facilitate e-learning.
- Teachers blend the chalk and lecture modes of teaching with e-based learning.
- Each department organizes workshops, seminars and lectures for students and faculty.
- The institution also encourages students to attend or participate in workshops and seminars outside the college.
- The departments invite experts—professionals or academicians—in their fields, to encourage students to learn and analyse what they are being taught. Practical = applications of the theory is taught to the students in such lectures/workshops.
- Many societies running in the college, besides those under the ambit of the cultural committee, organize various events in the college like internship fests, MUN, mock parliament, etc. that expose the students to advanced level of knowledge and practical skills.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidanceservices (professional counseling/ mentoring/ academic advise provided to students)?

- The Centralised Admission Committee guides the prospective students regarding which course to opt for and which discipline to follow.
- With number of options being offered in B.A. (Prog.) course, this counseling becomes of utmost importance to help students choose subjects as per their areas of interest and future employability options.
- The department teachers also counsel students on which papers to choose among various choices offered.
- The faculty constantly counsels and mentors the students regarding their academic and at times, non-academic problems too.
- Seminars and expert talks on the topics related to stress, career counseling and other social issues are organized in the college from time to time.
- The college also has a professional lady counselor to help students overcome stress and problems related to academic as well as personal issues. The names of those seeking counsel are kept confidential. Details about the working of the same are also as provided in 5.1.8.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches / methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

- The University of Delhi has seen many substantive changes in course structures in the last four years, with the university moving swiftly from annual to semester to FYUP and presently to CBCS mode of teaching.
- In keeping with the changing trend, the faculty too has undergone various adaptive changes in their teaching styles and methodologies.
- The faculty members are encouraged to be computer literate so as to enable them to use computer skills in teaching learning process.
- The ICT workshop held in college was nearly fully attended by many faculty members.
- The college has Central Computer Labs. The campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled.
- LCD projectors are installed in many classrooms and power point presentations are given in the class.
- The teachers attend various seminars/ workshops/ conferences/ orientation/ refresher courses and share the PPTs of various course related matter with the students.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- DCAC has a well equipped, fully automated library with two reading rooms for students and faculty members.
- It is well equipped with latest books, references and other reading material to help the students as well as the faculty to keep themselves updated with the latest knowledge sources.
- Every year a number of additions are made to the existing stock of the library and in the year 2014-15 alone, around 1100 new books were added across various disciplines.
- The Library has a subscription of 15 newspapers and 29 magazines as per the students' and faculty's demands keeping in mind the need to be updated with latest trends.
- The library is installed with Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) which ensures easy access and provides all information related with bibliography and reading list.
- In the beginning of every new academic session, an Orientation programme is

organized for the first year students, wherein they are introduced to the library facility by the faculty.

- The library maintains a Reference Section for Statistical Data, Biographical Information, Bibliographical Details, Reference Books and Reference regarding finding information through e-resources.
- The library displays all the new arrivals for the information of the reader at the library notice board. The online information is always available through OPAC. The library also displays important information like employment news, various magazines and newsletter, etc.
- Download facility is available through UGC INFONET E-resources, which students and faculty can avail through the computers available in library for public access. Library has got the approval to subscribe INFLIBNET (Information library Network) service such as UGC-NHLIT from the period April 2106-march 2017.
- The entire library has NETTLIB software for all-in-hour activity.
- Presently there are 4 computers for the public access. Out of the four computers, one is with the library staff to store all kind of data and to cater help to students/faculty, whenever needed. Students and faculty have all time access to three computers enabled with Wi-Fi.
- Braille books are available for visually challenged library users and they are kept on ground floor.
- Library has a collection of books in the Braille Script/Print, audio books, one Lex portable camera reading system (Lex Air) and a notebook computer.
- Laptops with special installed software are provided for visually challenged students to facilitate their learning.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

- The faculty takes utmost care to plan in advance and complete the prescribed syllabus in the given time frame. If any problem does occur in exceptional circumstances in any subject, extra classes are held. Most of the departmental meetings and college meetings too are attempted to be organized in the post class hours.
- Most of the departmental festivals and other extra curricular activities are planned post the lecture hours or on weekends.

- Adhoc / guest faculty is appointed as soon as possible by each department in place of teachers going on long leaves. The institution makes all efforts to ensure that the curriculum is completed on time and that the students' teaching hours suffer the minimum in any circumstance.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- Monitoring of the teaching schedule and adherence to the University calendar is done through AEC.
- The result analysis is carried out by the respective teachers-in-charge and discussed with the Principal as well as AEC.
- The efforts of exceptional performers are appreciated, while at the same time failures are noted and efforts are made to ascertain the same in consultation with the concerned teacher.
- Efforts are made to adopt corrective/ remedial measures as far as possible.
- The Principal also takes regular feedback from students about their classes, teachers, and their progress in periodic interactions with the class and course representatives.
- Regular departmental meetings are held to assess teaching progress, problems and prospects.
- Teachers-in-Charge monitor the successful progression and completion of the syllabi in their respective departments.
- The quality of teaching-learning is also reflected in the self appraisal form filled in by the faculty for promotions under the new Career Advancement Scheme of the Delhi University. The same is scrutinized by the competent authority.

Besides this, the college has employed 23 Guest teachers, out of which, 10 are female and 13 are male.

- There has been an effort on part of the college to make regular appointments in as many areas as possible.
- The permanent faculty is appointed in a fair and transparent manner by the Selection Committee duly following the UGC/DU norms in this aspect.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand / scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new program / modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

- The college has never faced any scarcity of qualified teachers. However, the institution copes with the growing demands of the qualified faculty to teach new programs like Environmental Studies by engaging ad-hoc and guest faculty, till permanent appointments are made.
- The departments at the University level are also approached to provide well qualified and competent teachers to teach any new paper like Environmental Studies.
- Experts in subjects and practitioners in field are regularly invited to supplement in-house teaching so that standards can remain high.
- The college appoints new ad-hoc/permanent teachers purely on merit basis and ensures that the specializations match with the requirements of the curriculum.
- It is ensured that the work load of the new programmes is shared by the new and senior faculty equally. The senior faculty puts in their experience and the new faculty brings new innovative methods while teaching the prescribed courses.
- Teachers who are not accustomed to new subject areas are encouraged to attend refresher courses and related workshops to update themselves.

- To enhance teacher quality and to keep updating their knowledge, teachers are encouraged to take part in various conferences, seminars, workshops, FDPs/ FTPs, etc. relevant to their areas of specialization.
- The teachers are also encouraged to take membership of professional associations and take part in organizational activities of such academic conclaves.
- The college too has been organizing conferences, seminars and symposia for the benefit of the students and also faculty members to enhance their knowledge and teaching skills.
- A number of Innovation Projects have been awarded to our faculty members to enhance their knowledge and research base for practical application and analysis of various theoretical concepts.
- All our teachers have participated in various conferences and seminars, nationally as well as internationally. Many of them have presented their papers and a few have also been invited as Resource Persons in the same. The same information is reflected in the Departmental Profiles of the college.

- The college provides all possible support and encourages the faculty members to undertake research projects and collaborative research activities with institutes of national and international repute.
- Study /Sabbatical /Extraordinary Leaves for research are granted in accordance with the University rules and ordinances.
- The college nominates faculty for academic staff development programmes and grants duty leave to attend orientation programmes, refresher courses, workshops, seminars, symposiums and conferences.
- The teachers of the college are also permitted to take up academic and other assignments on deputation or as visiting faculty etc.

- The College has always provided an environment congenial for self development, growth and knowledge enhancement of the faculty.
- Duty leaves, as per the University rules, have been given to the faculty to attend various knowledge and skill enhancing workshops, seminars, etc. so as to nurture their own skills and research abilities.
- For various university, government or any other organizational sponsored awards/ felicitations, the faculty is not just informed through staff room notice board displays, but is also encouraged by the Principal to apply for such awards.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching – learning process?

- Though there is no formal mechanism for Student Feedback either at the University or at the college level, yet many teachers themselves have devised their informal feedback mechanisms for assessing and improving their own performances.
- The Principal has regular interactions and meetings with various class and course representatives and informs the department of any major problems that the students might have been facing.

- The students' council/union members also have regular interactive sessions with the Principal to inform him of the general overall problems being faced by the students.
- Teacher evaluation is also reflected in the self appraisal form filled in by the faculty for promotions under the new Career Advancement Scheme of the Delhi University. The same is scrutinized by the competent authority.
- Such mechanisms surely improve the teaching-learning processes as the teachers too take it positively and work hard for improvisation in their teaching skills.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The rules and regulations concerning the evaluation process are displayed on the college website as well as the University of Delhi website.
- Students are also informed about the distribution of marks for internal assessment on the departmental orientation day and during regular classes as well.
- The internal assessment marks are uploaded on the college's website and notice board, as are also signed by all the students.
- The uploaded information can be accessed and verified by the student as well as by parents at any time. Any queries or discrepancies are resolved to the full satisfaction of students and teachers.
- A moderation committee is set up in each department which holds its meeting in each semester and carefully analyses the internal assessment marks submitted by the teachers and seeks to resolve students' queries about the same.
- The college also has an Internal Assessment monitoring committee.
- Students can approach teachers and moderation committee members for any query and clarifications.
- The patterns of question paper and suggestive marking schemes are discussed by individual teachers in their classroom interactions with the students.
- The students are made fully aware by their respective teachers of the centralized evaluation process for the theory component of their papers.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- During the last one decade, the University has introduced major reforms in the evaluation process four times:
 - ♦ In 2003-04 Internal Assessment was introduced, in which 25% of the total marks were awarded on the basis of house examination, attendance and assignments.
 - ♦ In 2010-11 when the Semester system was introduced, the House Exams was replaced by the Class Tests.
 - ♦ In 2013-14 changes were made with introduction of FYUP when weightage of Internal Assessment was increased in some papers and also attendance was not made a parameter for evaluation of internal assessment marks.
 - ♦ Finally, in 2015-16, when the CBCS system is introduced, the markings would be on basis of ranks and CGPAs.
- The college had adopted all these reforms and have guided students accordingly in orientations as well as regular classes too.
- The university follows centralized evaluation system and evaluation schedule is communicated to the colleges in advance. The college takes care that the examination invigilation duties of teachers are assigned keeping in view their centralized evaluation schedules.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- The institution ensures that all the evaluation reforms are followed as per schedule so that the results can be declared on time.
- The attendance is uploaded on the college on a monthly basis.
- The internal assessment marks are also uploaded on the college website.
- A form provided by the university is to be filled by the teachers in each semester indicating which papers are currently taught by them so that their names are included in the evaluation schedules of these papers in the evaluation Centre. The centralized evaluation schedule is received by the college and is communicated to the teachers. The entire schedule is also displayed on the university website. Furthermore, it is mandatory for all the teaching faculty members to take part in the evaluation process.
- The IA moderation and monitoring committees too ensure the proper implementation of the evaluation process.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approach adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The relative weightage of summative and formative assessments under the current evaluation system of the university, is as under:

- **Summative Assessment:** 75% weightage is given to the marks obtained by the students in theory examinations. These final examinations are conducted by the university and evaluated centrally.
- **Formative Assessment:** 25% weightage, out of which 5% is allotted based on class attendance.
- Of the remaining, 10% is awarded on the basis of class tests and assignments and the remaining 10% is awarded on the basis of projects and class presentations.
- Attendance was not made a parameter for evaluation of internal assessment marks under the FYUP scheme.

Internal assessment marks given on the basis of formative assessment have resulted in the following positive impacts:

- There is an increase in students' participation in class discussions, projects and activities.
- Regular class-test and participation makes student better prepared for the final summative exams.
- The participation of students in curriculum enrichment activities of the departmental societies has been increasing over the last couple of years.

2.5.5 Detail of the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)

- There is a complete transparency in the Internal Assessment scheme followed by the college. The College strictly adheres to the guidelines laid down by the University of Delhi and awards marks in internal assessment as per the criteria laid down and modified by the University of Delhi from time to time.
- The internal assessment marks are uploaded on the college's website and notice board, as are also signed by all the students.
- The uploaded information can be accessed and verified by the student as well as by parents at any time. Any queries or discrepancies are resolved out to the full satisfaction of students and teachers.

- A moderation committee is set up in each department which holds its meeting in each semester and carefully analyses the internal assessment marks submitted by the teachers and seeks to resolve students' queries about the same.
- The college also has an Internal Assessment monitoring committee.
- Students can approach teachers and moderation committee members for any query and clarifications.
- Though as per the University guidelines on internal assessment markings, there is no formal system of assigning weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc., yet the group discussion element takes care of the communication skills and the projects display students' creativity that are rewarded accordingly in the internal assessment scores.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

- The college aims at holistic development of its students and expects attainment of graduate attributes like an all round extrovert and compassionate individual, able to strike a fine balance among competing objectives in life, besides of course being ready for higher studies or the job market, as per the students' acumen and orientation.
- Students attain all the graduate attributes by being a part of academic as well as extra curricular activities held in the college.
- Classes, tutorials, assessments, presentations, projects, workshops and talks contribute to the academic part and cultural activities, departmental festivals, college festival and its activities contribute to the creative part of students' development.
- Further, various motivational talks, skill enhancement talks and career orientation lectures and talks are also regularly conducted by the college for students to ensure their all round and holistic development.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redress of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and university level?

- **Evaluation Related Grievance Resolution Mechanism of the University :** The Dean of Examination of the university receives and addresses grievances relating to evaluation. The office of the Dean is accessible through email dean_exam@admin.du.ac.in. In addition, the students have the right to obtain a photocopy of their answer script and seek remedies based on it. The students can also request for re-evaluation of answer scripts on payment of a nominal fee.

- **Internal Assessment Related Grievance Resolution by the College :** The grievance resolution process of the college is described as below:
 - ♦ **Opportunity for Reporting Grievances:** Students have the following opportunities to report their grievance—after receiving the results of class tests/projects, etc., students can approach their course teachers and report their grievances. Also, soon after receiving the results of any internal assessment, the students can direct their query for the assessment by the individual teacher as well as IA moderation and monitoring committees.
 - ♦ At the time of formative feedback given by teachers: The teachers usually provide formative feedback to students during the classes or tutorials, when students report their grievances also.
 - ♦ At the time of the finalization of Internal Assessment marks by teachers, students are also made to counter sign their Internal Assessment marks. This not only makes them aware of their Internal Assessment marks but also gives them an opportunity to report their grievances.
 - ♦ After Internal Assessment marks are displayed on the notice boards/website: Time is also given to the students to report grievances, if any and seek corrections before these marks are uploaded on the university computer system.
- **Grievance Resolution Mechanism:** College also sets up a moderation committee to counter check the Internal Assessment marks and ensures their correctness and fairness. All grievances are also addressed by this Committee. Finally, the Internal Assessment monitoring committee ensures that everything is in order and then sends the final internal assessment marks to the University.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If yes give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

- The well followed and practiced learning outcome is to help students become good citizens and specifically, the learning ability includes the ability of students to recall, analyze, evaluate and apply.
- The staff is well aware of this and follows this dictum in their everyday teaching and interactions with the students.
- The learning objectives are in tune to the vision and mission statement of the college. This statement is placed on the college website as also displayed prominently in the college.

- It is aimed to achieve the following four broad learning outcomes:
 - ♦ Knowledge outcomes pertain to grasp of fundamental cognitive content, core concepts or questions, basic principles of inquiry, a broad history, and/or varied disciplinary techniques.
 - ♦ Skills outcomes focus on capacity for applying basic knowledge, analyzing and synthesizing information, assessing the value of information, communicating effectively, and collaborating.
 - ♦ Behavioral outcomes reflect a manifestation of knowledge, skills, and attitudes as evidenced by performance, contributions, etc.
 - ♦ Environmental outcomes aim at attainment of a growth process for the students that is in harmony with the nature and develops ecologically and environmentally conscious citizens.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programmes? Provide an analysis of the students' results/achievements (Programmes/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any, and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

- The progress and performance of the students is monitored via tests, oral tests, projects, presentations, day to day classroom interaction, tutorials and revision sessions. The results and internal assessment marks are discussed in departmental meetings and are then forwarded to the principal and AEC for further analysis.
- The students attaining attendance less than a certain percentage are supposed to sign an undertaking to make sure that they overcome their attendance shortage in the successive semester.
- The students' result is analysed in the AEC Meeting and drastic changes if observed are discussed with the concerned teacher/s and efforts made to improvise the same through remedial classes, after class teaching, etc.

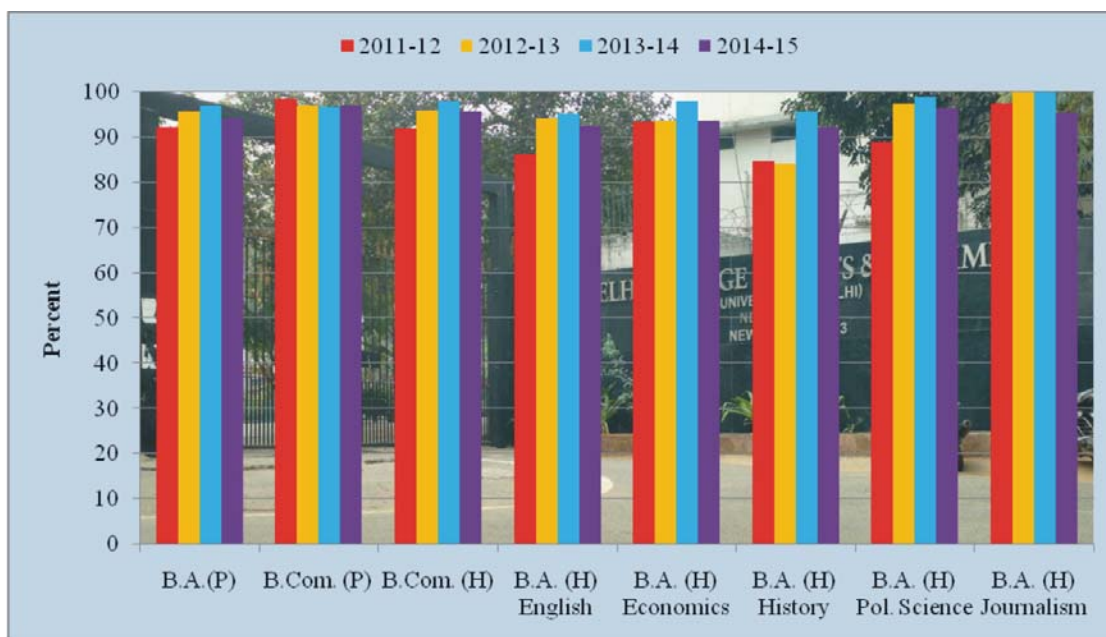

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

- Clear instructions are given to the teachers that uniform procedures are to be adopted for assessment process and the teaching learning strategies to be devised as best suited for holistic development of students.
- Academic outcomes are achieved through teaching and assessment methods applied. Assignments, projects and the test questions are so focused that the specific learning outcomes of each course is achieved.
- The co-curricular activities are integrated into the academic life of the students so that the desired learning outcomes are achieved.
- Ad hoc and guest teachers are appointed in place of teachers on leave or in case of extra workload to ensure that teaching is not affected.
- Various cultural and other societies of the students help in their holistic development by imbining in them the necessary organizational and administrative skills.

2.6.4 What are the measures / initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

- Broadway, the placement cell of DCAC works with the aim of providing a strong interlink between the corporate sector and the academia. It is a common platform for the companies where their recruitment hunt for young talent ends and the

students' aspiration of dream jobs are met. It works as a career guidance unit as well as placement service provider for the students of the college.

- Team Broadway is a combination of experienced teachers and young minds who are representatives of various departments.
- The cell has organized various seminars and workshops on career related matters and conducted placement sessions time to time.
- Besides, the E-cell of the college also organizes annual internship fest where companies are invited to hire interns.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

- The learning outcomes are measured by the scholastic achievement of the students and achievements and awards won by them in various sports and extra curricular activities.
- The progress and performance of the students is monitored via tests, oral tests, projects, presentations, day to day classroom interaction, tutorials and revision sessions.
- The final university result analysis also helps us in analyzing the achievements of learning outcomes. These are duly discussed and analysed in departmental meetings as well as in the AEC meetings of the college.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

- The monitoring and analysis of all the learning outcomes are done at different levels in the college.
- For academic outcomes, the result analysis is done paper wise as well as overall for each department and college as a unit and the same are discussed in AEC meetings as well as by each department at its own level.
- For achievements in sports, the Sports Committee meets and analysis the same on regular basis. The lacunae, if any, are noticed and all possible training, equipments and other desired facilities are aimed to be facilitated to students to help them achieve greater heights.
- The cultural committee as well as the convenors of various other activity cells of the college discuss their performances and achievements and motivate students by conducting intra-college activities to help them overcome stage fear and win further accolades at various inter college events.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/ evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If “yes” provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

- On a formal level, it is only the examination and internal assessment performance, based on performance in theory papers and clearly defined objective evaluative schemes in internal assessment markings, that are used as indicators for evaluating student performance.
- However, on an informal level, the attainment of knowledge, skills, behavioral and environmental outcomes are attached a lot of importance by the teachers to adjudge the overall development of the students concerned. For example, the start of various flagship programs under the NSS wing of the college like TanZeal for slum children's education, environmental concerns under Prakriti society, etc. are considered highly among the teachers.
- The teachers ensure to 'reward' such students by ways of generous words of praise in their letters of recommendation for higher studies or by way of felicitating their achievements and contributions in Annual Day function.
- The achievements of the students in sports are also duly recognized and awarded.
- There are also various awards instituted by our faculty members as well as Trust awards to encourage, reward and motivate the meritorious students.
- Due procedures and rules of the University of Delhi are also followed in giving benefit of attendance for internal assessment to students involved in sports, NCC, NSS and various extra curricular activities.

CRITERION - III

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION



3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center(s) of the affiliating university or any other agency / organization?

Delhi College of Arts & Commerce is an institution for undergraduate studies in humanities, social sciences and commerce. The college understands the importance of initiating its students into research, and therefore, its faculty members strive to cultivate an inquisitive propensity among students. Although the college does not have a recognized research Centre on its campus, some of its faculty members are research supervisors in the University of Delhi, and other institutions.

3.1.2 Does the institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Since the college runs only undergraduate courses, we do not have a research committee *per se*. However, the Academic Executive Committee (AEC) in addition to its various other functions, attempts to encourage research interest among faculty members. To do so, the committee proposed and facilitated the publication of a peer-reviewed, interdisciplinary journal *Intellectual Resonance* (ISSN: 2321-2594). 3 issues of the journal have already been published.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the Institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes / projects?

The college encourages its teachers to take up research projects and pursue them alongside their teaching routine. To ensure the progress and implementation of the research projects, the college takes the following steps:

- Ensures autonomy (as per the guidelines of individual projects) to the principal investigators with regard to expenditure, procurement of equipment, stationary and travel.
- Timely release of funds is ensured.
- Ensures adequate human resources and infrastructure.
- Lends support in terms of technology and information needs through a well-stocked library (with OPAC), a separate reading room and a Computer Lab for teachers, and a Wi-Fi enabled campus.
- Grants leave to its faculty, permissible under the leave rules of DU, for undertaking research work.

- Grants leave to its faculty for participating in conferences/seminars/workshops/symposia/refresher courses/orientation programs (as per DU and UGC rules). Several members have attended state, national and international conferences and seminars in India and abroad. Kindly refer to 2.4.3.(a) and Department Profiles.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper, and research culture and aptitude among students?

- College involves students in research projects, especially as part of the DU Innovation Projects (please refer to the table in 3.1.5 for a list of student investigators).
- Student Investigators in the Innovation Projects are taken to the sites of study where they carry out interviews and participate in lecture-demonstration workshops.
- Project-related work is assigned to undergraduate students and all possible research facilities including logistic/financial support are provided to them.
- To inculcate research aptitude among students, departments/societies/faculty members of the college conduct study tours and field visits from time to time.
- Students are taken to various institutional and industry visits by faculty members of the college to give them hands-on experience.
- Students of various disciplines gained practical knowledge through participation in all 4 educational trips of Gyanodaya express organised by DU. Details of the last two editions of Gyanodaya trip are given below: –
 - ♦ The theme of the last Gyanodaya (18-29 December 2014) educational trip was entitled “Dharohar: The Glory of the North East.” – Ten students (eight from Journalism (H) and 2 from B.Com (H) of DCAC – under the guidance of Dr. Tamanna Khosla (Pol Sc), explored the workings several small scale industries especially in the state of Assam.
 - ♦ The aim of the Gyanodaya held between 11-19 March 2014 was to develop skills in students to undertake research through project studies and expose them to the urbanization of rural and urban India through the prism of developing cities and industrial centres across the cities of Kanpur, Varanasi, Bhopal, Ahmedabad and Surat. Ten students from the college, under the guidance of Dr. Tamanna Khosla (Pol Sc) studied the context of literature in small towns.
- Students of BA (H) Journalism submit a dissertation as part of their course work.
- Final year students in different departments submit research projects on various national and international issues.

- Students participate in seminars, workshops, conferences organised by various institutions.
- Students are encouraged to publish their research articles in various journals and magazines.

3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual / collaborative research activity etc.

DCAC is an undergraduate college affiliated to DU. While many of the faculty are engaged in active research and are associated with a number of research projects funded by DU and UGC as principal and co-investigators, a few of our faculty members have been offered the opportunity to guide PhD/MPhil scholars.

3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/ advocating / transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land).

Faculty members and students who participated in the DU Innovation projects displayed their research findings at "Antardhvani" (DU Annual Festival). Teachers are also encouraged to get their research work published in reputed journals and magazines or as books. Most of the DU Innovation projects that our faculty members have carried out are premised

directly on the concept of ‘lab to land’. A project-wise description of community outreach activity is given below:

- “Creating a More Enabling Environment for Differently-abled Students in Universities in Delhi through a Dropout Prevention Programme” — a team of students and faculty members developed an innovative way of integrating students with disabilities and those who wish to help them in any form. They constructed the first of its kind online portal (www.enablethedisabled.in) that allowed instant communication between its registered members. The students with disabilities could post their requests for scribes, readers, audio files, scanned copies of chapters, etc., which were instantly communicated to all its other members (via their social-media accounts), thus enabling quick response. Since renewal of the domain name required funds each year, the same provisions and facilities were shifted to the freely available portal provided by *Facebook* (www.facebook.com/enablethedisabled). The team also tied up with the Delhi based NGO ‘Save the Quest’ (<http://www.savethequest.org/>), whose founder, Saif Ahmad Khan, was a team member. This tie-up further helps in achieving the objectives of the project.
- “Skill Development for Socio-economic Empowerment of Marginalised Urban Women” — carried out extensive household surveys and worked with slum women as facilitators to skill them. The project enabled students to get hands on experience of working with real life situations, working outside the comforts of classrooms, being sensitive to marginalised communities and gender issues not merely as abstract theoretical ideas but go out and deal with women who are facing huge challenges because of varied forms of gender inequalities.
- “A Study of Stress Levels and Stress Sources among the Undergraduate Students of University of Delhi” — the Questionnaire Based Survey project answered some important questions related to student stress and at the same time busted some popular myths. For example, contrary to popular notions, attending classes and keeping up with the hectic schedule of the university does not stress students as much as do other stressors. Such findings will be a reference point to initiate a change in the way psychologists — especially the ones who work in the sphere of stress management among students think. The findings published in three newspapers helped undergraduate students and potential undergraduate students learn more about student related stress sources and stress levels so that they, their parents and public in general can be more aware of the kinds of stresses students are experiencing and can work towards reducing student stress.
- “New Medias and Pedagogy: Promoting Liberal Arts Education” — explored the viability of New Medias, specifically exhibitions as a pedagogical tool in complement to traditional class room and syllabus education. To determine the viability of exhibitions, the project team constructed and curated an exhibition on

a subject chosen for its multi-disciplinary nature, and its non-traditional scope. The exhibition was curated across 6 Delhi University Colleges and also at Ambedkar University, and students were polled on their interest in exhibitions, the subject, and replicating exhibitions as a learning and teaching tool.

- “Symphonies of Life: Nature and Environment in the folksongs of Punjab and Jammu & Kashmir” — the project brought awareness of different cultures and evoked interest amongst all the guests visiting Antardhvani 2012-13. People related to its findings which reminded them of their grassroots, and revived their memories. The comments on the Visitors’ Book bear testimony to this. In fact, the project was selected for special display in Antardhvani 2013-14. The project concluded with dissemination of its learning at seminar organised at IIC on 1 May 2013, with Dr. Karan Singh as the chief guest.
- “Visualising Economic and Political Impact of Globalization on Gaddi Tribe of Chamba District of Himachal Pradesh” — a serious attempt to understand day-to-day life of a very significant but small tribal community of Himachal Pradesh through an on the spot survey of Gaddi tribe. The survey provided an opportunity to the students to have a first hand experience of tribal life. The research team became aware of the cultural past of the tribe and changes in modern times due to inroads of new ideas, economy and technology in their life. “Gaddi: A Tribe in Turmoil,” a documentary based on the findings of the research team, has received wide appreciation during screenings.
- “Sustainable Development, Environmental Degradation and Poverty: Measurement and Linkages” — aimed at discussing environmental concerns that are at the heart of every developmental debate of all economies. The research was carried out with primary surveys from the slum households of Delhi and in the process, the slum dwellers were explained the dangers to their own health that were occurring due to the over exploitation of the environmental resources. They were explained that attempts made by them to alleviate their poverty by means of an intensification of resource extraction tends to lead to worsening of their poverty levels through health impacts. With case studies and using examples from their daily lives, they were explained that if for example, consuming water that has been polluted by their wastes leads to higher incidence of water borne diseases, then their out-of-pocket medical expenses rise on the one hand and their labour days and consequently the earning prospects are lost on the other hand due to sick days.

3.2 Resource Mobilisation for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The college has no separate provision for research in its budget as grants are received

from the UGC and the Government of Delhi mainly under the categories 'Pay and Allowances for the teaching and non-teaching staff.' However, the college always supports and encourages its faculty members to apply for project grants from various funding agencies.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The Research carried out in the institution is funded by the UGC, ICSSR, DU and other organizations. There is no provision in the college to allocate seed money for either student or faculty research projects in its budget.

However, faculty members are reimbursed registration fee for paper presentations in national/international conferences and seminars, as per DU/UGC guidelines.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

DU does not make any special financial grant to support student research in undergraduate colleges but since 2012, students have been part of interdisciplinary innovation projects sanctioned by the University.

3.2.4 How do the various departments / units / staffs of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavours and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

Since 2012 faculty members from several departments have been working together as part of Innovation Projects sponsored by DU. For each Project there are three Faculty members from at least two departments and approximately 10 students from various disciplines. The composition is such that it ensures interdisciplinarity in research. (For a list of students from across departments who participated in research projects, kindly refer to Table 3.1.5 (b))

Challenges

Since students working for various DU Innovation Projects are from diverse disciplines, very rarely, if at all, are all student-investigators free at the same time. This, at times, leads to a situation when a group of students has to sacrifice attending their regular lecture-classes. However, teacher-investigators try their best to minimise their loss of attendance.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

At DCAC, students and teachers have free access to all resources (including online) in the library on all working days from 9 AM to 5 PM which ensures that they can access

it whenever they are free. Similarly, teachers and students have free access to the computers in the laboratories.

3.2.6 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If yes, give details.

The college received a grant of Rs. 2,50,000 from UGC, under the “Allocation of Development Scheme and Merged Scheme during the XI plan period,” to establish a Network Resource Centre (now known as the UGC Resource Centre) in 2011-12. The UGC Resource Centre is a lab for faculty use, with more than 10 desktops and Internet facility.

3.3 Research Facilities

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

DCAC has four computers labs with more than one hundred desktops interconnected in a Local Area Network with a central server system.

- In addition to the labs, the college has 711 laptops which are issued as and when required.
- The campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Login IDs have been issued to students and the faculty. It has a full time system administrator.
- A well-stocked library with OPAC. Approximately 500-600 students visit the library every working day.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

DCAC is an undergraduate degree college and as teaching is done mostly in general courses, there is limited scope for focusing on emerging areas of research. However, in order to facilitate research, the college has adopted various strategies to upgrade its infrastructure.

- Renovation of the multi-purpose hall/auditorium to create a state-of-the-art space in order to hold conferences and seminars.
- Creation of dedicated reading spaces for students and faculty in the library.
- The college has a UGC Resource Centre which has 10 computers (with a printer-cum-scanner) for the exclusive use of teachers.
- The college has four computer laboratories with desktops and 711 laptops for the use of students and teachers.

3.3.4 What are the research facilities made available to the students and research scholars outside the campus / other research laboratories?

In addition to the resources available at the college, students and faculty members can access many well-stocked libraries in Delhi (e.g., Ratan Tata Library, DU Central Reference Library, Sahitya Akademi Library, Nehru Memorial Museum and Library, American Centre Library, etc.)

3.3.5 Provide details on the library / information resource centre or any other facilities available specifically for research?

There are a number of learning resources available to the students and faculty, some of which are as follows:

- The library has three terminals of OPAC for reader's accessibility. Two terminals are installed at the ground floor and one is in the reading room.
- The entire library has NETTLIB software for all in-house activity.
- Approximately 3500 holdings have been added to the library in the last 3 years. Altogether, the library has 43, 157 holdings.
- Download facility is available through UGC INFONET e-resources, which students and faculty can avail through the computers available in library for public access
- The library has got the approval to subscribe INFLIBNET (Information Library Network) service such as UGC-NHLIT from the period April 2016-March 2017.

3.3.6 What are the collaborative researches facilities developed / created by the research institutes in the college? For ex.-Laboratories, Library, Instruments, Computers, New Technology etc.

The college built a UGC Resource Centre utilising a fund of Rs. 2,50,000 granted by the UGC. The Centre is for the exclusive use of teachers.

- Dr. Deepti Taneja was awarded a contract of USD 5000 as Principal Investigator by International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI), Washington DC to conduct the special session on food security on 29th December, 2014 at Mohanlal Sukhadia University, Udaipur, on behalf of IFPRI during the 97th Annual Conference of the Indian Economic Association.
- Dr. Amrit Basra is currently engaged in DU History Project titled "Biographical Dictionary of Punjab," (1849-1947), A Project by National Institute of Punjab Studies, by Vir Singh Sahitya Sadan, New Delhi, Rs. 30,00,000.
- Dr. Neeru Kapoor (Commerce), Ms. Meera Malhan (Economics) and Dr. Anita Bhela (English) have contributed to the e-Pathshala project.

3.4.2 Does the Institute publish or partner in publication of research journal(s)? If yes, indicate the composition of the editorial board, publication policies and whether such publication is listed in any international database?

Yes, the college has published three issues of a peer-reviewed interdisciplinary journal *Intellectual Resonance* (ISSN: 2321-2594). The AEC of the college, in order to advance research interests among faculty members, proposed and facilitated the publication of the journal. 3 issues of the journal have already been published which have been uploaded on the college website (<http://dcac.du.ac.in/researchjournal.html>).

Over the years, the faculty and students have been encouraged to publish their research findings. I am providing below are separate tables for the number of publications by the faculty and students. The college has no formal mechanism to create and maintain a database of students' publications. 3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute industry interface?

- The college invites experts from industry to interact with students and faculty.
- Students are taken for industrial visits to have institute-industry interface. The Department of Commerce organises plant visits very year. For example, it has organised visits to various industries such as Bata Shoe Co., Faridabad; Britannia Industries Ltd.; Kwality Ice-cream Co., Delhi; Mother Dairy Delhi; DCM, Delhi; etc.
- *Broadway*, the college placement cell works as a conduit between industries and would be graduates from college looking for placement opportunities.
- Student-volunteers of different societies approach various industries for funding their festivals and seminars.

3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized.

The College is yet to formulate a policy to promote consultancy. However, it has uploaded its faculty profile on its website which is in the public domain.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

Faculty members individually discover consultancy opportunities and the college facilitates the process by granting them leave as permissible under DU leave rules.

Presently, the institution is yet to prepare a list of major consultancy services available at the college. (Department Profile, Question no. 20)

Since there is no institutional mechanism to offer consultancy services, no revenue has been generated.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighborhood community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship service orientation and holistic development of students?

The college engages its students and faculty in institution-neighbourhood community network through its various units like NSS, Prakriti, ENACTUS etc. Some of the activities of these units are as follows:

- Project TanZeal of NSS, DCAC aims at the holistic development of the underprivileged children who come to the college five days a week from 2:30 to 4:30. The College premises are used as the centre for the Project and the TanZeal team has access to all the facilities provided by the college right from using the classrooms as well as Computer Rooms. Presently the project is imparting education to 80 students. Project TanZeal was initiated on 1 August 2012 by two students of the college, Yashvardhan Verma and Sukriti Sethi.
- Project Blind School of NSS, DCAC is one of the most important and the very first projects taken up by Save the Quest, an NGO founded by an alumnus of DCAC. This project has been operational since January 2013. Its objective is not just assisting the visually impaired students but to empower them in carrying out their day-to-day activities. STQ volunteers act as scribes for numerous visually-challenged students from University of Delhi, JNU and National Association for the Blind.

- Project RTI of NSS, DCAC has been working in collaboration with SNS (Satark Nagarik Sangathan) for the last 4 years. Its main objective is to facilitate a better understanding of the RTI Act among the students and neighbourhood community.
- The NSS unit of DCAC periodically organises blood donation camps on its campus in collaboration with BloodConnect.
- DCAC NCC Unit sent its cadets to SDM 12/1, Jam Nagar House, Shahajahan Road, New Delhi-110011, in order to work as volunteers for Odd-Even Transport Drive from 1st January, 2016 – to – 15th January, 2016.
- DCAC NCC Unit sent its cadets to Raj Path, New Delhi for International Yoga Day on 21st June, 2015.
- Prakriti, the environment of DCAC, periodically organises nature walks to sensitise citizens towards environmental degradation and rising pollution levels.
- Prakriti also conducts plantation drives in and around the college.

Apart from the efforts of various societies/units of the college, several of our DU Innovation Projects are directly based on the concept of institution-neighbourhood network. For example,

- For the project “Creating a More Enabling Environment for Differently-abled Students in Universities in Delhi through a Dropout Prevention Programme,” a team of students and faculty members developed an innovative way of integrating students with disabilities and those who wish to help them in any form. They constructed the first of its kind online portal (www.enablethedisabled.in) that allowed instant communication between its registered members. The students with disabilities could post their requests for scribes, readers, audio files, scanned copies of chapters, etc., which were instantly communicated to all its other members (via their social-media accounts), thus enabling quick response.
- As part of “Skill Development for Socio-economic Empowerment of Marginalised Urban Women” students carried out extensive household surveys and worked with slum women as facilitators to skill them. The project enabled students to get hands on experience of working with real life situations, working outside the comforts of classrooms, being sensitive to marginalised communities and gender issues not merely as abstract theoretical ideas but go out and deal with women who are facing huge challenges because of varied forms of gender inequalities.

3.6.2 What is the institutional mechanism to track students’ involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

- Students at DCAC are always encouraged to be a member of at least one of these three activities—NCC, NSS and Sports.

- There are seven societies which are operating under the Cultural Committee, namely, Debating Society (Debsoc), Dramatics (Leher) Society, Music Society (Dastgah), Dance (DriftUp) Society, Photography (Clicks) Society, Quiz Society and Fashion (Stylus.in) Society
- Various other societies formed through student-teacher initiatives that help students do practical application through community outreach of curriculum they are taught, like MUN, ENACTUS, Prakriti and Vyapaar.
- At the start of new session, student presidents/Coordinators are chosen for each society under the guidance of a faculty member to facilitate, guide and coordinate in their smooth functioning. For the societies under the ambit of the cultural committee, Presidents are chosen from among the third year students and the cultural committee coordinates their year round activities. The society Presidents are in charge of the functioning of the society and track students' involvement.
- Student office bearers are also elected in each academic year to coordinate between the staff and students.

Kindly refer to 5.1.6 for further details.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder's perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

- The principal has an open-door policy. He is always accessible to students, guardians, faculty and administrative staff.
- He holds frequent meetings with Class Representatives who apprise him of their concerns. The principal then forwards their concerns to relevant committees for further action.
- IQAC has members from the larger community who give their inputs on how to improve quality.
- GB members interact with various stakeholders during their visits to college.

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its expansion and outreach program? Provide the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach program and their impact on the overall development of students.

The College organises and plans its extension and outreach programmes through meetings attended by the faculty members chosen to run the unit and student members. The events are planned in advance as is reflected in the Programme Calendar of the college (5.3.1 (d)).

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National / International agencies?

The college believes that extension activity is an essential part of academic life and motivates both students and faculty to take an active part in such pursuits.

- Students are encouraged to choose one of the three societies — NCC, NSS and Sports — at the time of admission. This ensures maximum participation.
- The principal, on the orientation day, motivates students to participate in NCC, NSS and other cultural activities.
- At the beginning of the session senior student volunteers and faculty members apprise the freshers of the activities of various societies and their constituent clubs.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

As could be garnered from the description of research projects in 3.1.10, many of the DU Innovation Projects carried out by our students and faculty attempted to empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society.

For example, as part of the project “Creating a More Enabling Environment for Differently-abled Students in Universities in Delhi through a Dropout Prevention Programme,” a team of students and faculty members developed an innovative way of integrating students with disabilities and those who wish to help them in any form. They constructed the first of its kind online portal (www.enablethedisabled.in) that allowed instant communication between its registered members.

Similarly, a team of students and faculty carried out extensive household surveys for the project “Skill Development for Socio-economic Empowerment of Marginalised Urban Women,” and worked with slum women as facilitators to skill them.

The projects TanZeal and the blind school run by the NSS, DCAC directly attempt to empower the under-privileged. (for details please see 3.6.1)

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

- The extension activities inculcate in our students the values of patriotism, national integration, social commitment, eco-friendliness, ethics, scientific temper, analytical approach, dignity of labor, human rights, etc. These values strongly complement the learning experience they achieve from the institution.
- Through such activities students become aware of the harsh realities of life facing the multitude, and in the process imbibe a sense of social responsibility.

3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities?

The college ensures the involvement of the community by inviting various NGOs and societies/units of the college to set up their stalls showcasing their achievements, during the annual fest of NSS, "Aadya." NSS also undertakes the collection and distribution of winter clothes at the onset of the winter season.

3.6.9 Give details on the constructive relationships forged (if any) with other institutions of the locality for working on various outreach and extension activities.

- Project Blind School of NSS is run in association with Save the Quest, an NGO founded by an alumnus of DCAC.
- Project RTI of NSS, DCAC has been working in collaboration with SNS (Satark Nagarik Sangathan) for the last 4 years.
- The NSS unit of DCAC periodically organises blood donation camps on its campus in collaboration with BloodConnect.
- For the DU Innovation Project "Creating a More Enabling Environment for Differently-abled Students in Universities in Delhi through a Dropout Prevention Programme," student and faculty investigators worked in association with 'Save the Quest' (<http://www.savethequest.org/>), a Delhi based NGO
- For the project "Skill Development for Socio-economic Empowerment of Marginalised Urban Women," student and faculty investigators have been working with the mentorship of Dr. Shanti Auluck, Founder of Muskaan (<http://www.muskaanthengo.org>) — an NGO which runs a centre for adults with intellectual disabilities.

3.6.10 Give details of awards received by the institution for extension activities / contributions to the social / community development during the last four years.

The college has not received any award from any institution for extension activities/ contributions to social/community development in the last four years.

3.7 Collaboration

3.7.1 How does the institution collaborate and interact with research laboratories, institutes and industry for research activities. Cite examples and benefits accrued of the initiatives— collaborative research, staff exchange, sharing facilities and equipment, research scholarships etc.

The college is an undergraduate institution and does not offer science programmes and therefore the scope of collaboration with research laboratories and institutes is limited.

The college does not have a formal mechanism in place to institutionally collaborate with research laboratories, institutes and industry for research activities. However, researchers, either individually or as part of a group, have from time to time collaborated with various organisations.

- Student and faculty investigators working for the DU Innovation project “Creating a More Enabling Environment for Differently-abled Students in Universities in Delhi through a Dropout Prevention Programme” (2013-15) collaborated with a Delhi based NGO “Save the Quest” (<http://www.savethequest.org>) — which has the expertise in providing assistance to differently-abled students — in order to effectively attain their objectives.
- Student and faculty investigators working for the DU Innovation project “Skill Development for Socio-economic Empowerment of Marginalised Urban Women” work with the mentorship of Dr. Shanti Auluck, Founder of Muskaan (<http://www.muskaanthengo.org>) — an NGO which runs a centre for adults with intellectual disabilities to provide them challenging work training and opportunities.
- In 2015 the college through DU has signed an MoU to impart skill-based training to the students. However, this collaboration is not research based.
- The college is in talks with National Institute of Financial Management (NIFM) to offer short duration courses (Management Development Programme).

3.7.2 Provide details on the MoUs / collaborative arrangements (if any) with institutions of national importance / other universities / industries / Corporate (corporate entities) etc. and how they have contributed to the development of the institution.

The college has collaborative arrangements with Chintan Environmental and Action Group

(<http://www.chintan-india.org>) for the disposal of e-waste produced by the college. In a disposal drive organised by the college in 2014, 20 kgs of e-waste was collected.

Prakriti, the environment society of the college collaborated with Navdanya to develop 'Gardens of Hope' and 'Herb Garden' in the college premises. This collaboration helped in making the campus greener.

3.7.3 Give details (if any) on the industry-institution-community interactions that have contributed to the establishment / creation / up-gradation of academic facilities. Student and staff support, infrastructure facilities of the institution viz. laboratories / library / new technology / placement services etc.

Broadway, the Placement Cell of the college, works as a link between the corporate sector and the academia. The team of Broadway is a combination of experienced teachers and young students who are representatives of various departments. The Cell provides a range of opportunities to suit the diverse requirements of our students. Students have been placed in reputed companies like KPMG, E&Y, PWC, L&T, ICICI Prudential, CBSE, Capital IQ, ZEE Media, Focus TV, Zakoobi, Oberoi Group of Hotels, Genpact, Delhivery etc. In addition to that the Cell organizes various seminars and workshops on career guidance and conducts placement sessions from time to time.

3.7.4 Highlighting the names of eminent scientists / participants who contributed to the events, provide details of national and international conferences organized by the college during the last four years.

In the last four years the college has organised four national/international seminars:

- ❑ Political Science department organised an ICSSR sponsored international seminar titled **"Whither Indian Democracy and State: Towards General Elections 2014"** in April 2014.

Prof. Subrata Mukherjee spoke about the history of elections in India and later on described how various political parties have been contesting elections by raising various slogans to get the involvement of the public to cast their votes in their favour. Ms. Jupi Gogoi, Asst. Professor., I.L.I, & Ms. Sikha Burman, University of Delhi, elaborated on the various occasions of tabulation of Women Reservation Bill in India. They highlighted that the condition of women in India had been excluded from participation in the political arena altogether, the result of centuries of social and economic inequality and it is necessary that there is a deliberate attempt by the world's largest democracy to empower the women of this country. Dr. Sarbeswar Sahoo, IIT, New Delhi, highlighted the implications of neo-liberal economic policies on the marginalised citizens of India.

The students gained an insight into issues such as party and elections in india, caste and gender issues in our political system etc. Further in the section on economy the implications

of neo-liberal economic policies on the marginalised citizens of India was discussed. The section on media looked at the role of media in popular democracy. The section on foreign policy focused on the importance of foreign policy in the international political environment. Students also learnt from crucial section on federalism in India which looked at the state of Telengana and North East region. Further the stress on issues of internal security and challenges due to Naxalism, Maoism was also understood vividly.

- ❑ English department conducted a UGC sponsored national seminar, **“Intersections: History and Literature”** in March 2014.

The Keynote Address was given by Prof Mushirul Hassan, an internationally known historian and ex VC Jamia Milia Islamia who spoke about the interconnections of historical sources and literary sources. He cited many incidents where history and literature converge, diverge and intersect. Prof Christel Devadasan, Department of English, University of Delhi, made a scintillating power point presentation on the interconnections between literature and visuality that functions as a counterculture to challenge the hegemony of the mainstream depictions of heroic figures that do not belong to the upper classes. Analysing the comic strips and illustrations she discussed how the visual landscape of the book underscores the narrative and foregrounds the interconnections between literature and history. Through her lucid presentation, the students could easily identify the use of the Gond artwork so central to the narration of the life story of Bhima, the dalit boy and his experiences. The life of the revolutionary B R Ambedkar was presented via the visual narrative that clearly conveyed to the students the sense of heroism that Ambedkar demonstrated.

Prof Jasbir Jain, eminent critic and scholar, retired Professor of English from the University of Jaipur, delivered the valedictory address on What Fiction can do and History cannot and Vice Versa. She raised many questions in her address and gave much food for future thought such as What is history? Happenings, the visible facts, dates, counter-forces? Or is it revolutions and upheavals, a narration of conquests, biography of leaders? And what is fiction? An imagined construct, a personal experience or a reflection of the unconscious? Does fiction cater to an immediate need for ideology or does it analyse and connect the historical pasts? The Seminar raised many issues and the students carried these points to their classrooms for further deliberations.

- ❑ Economics department held a UGC sponsored national seminar titled **“Shifting Gears: jumpstarting a slowing Indian Economy”** in January 2013.

The goal of this seminar was to deliberate upon the steps required to sustain robust economic growth and also address the larger question of establishing socio-economic equality. The Inaugural address by Prof. TCA Anant (Chief Statistician of India) on the “Challenges to Measuring an Evolving Economy” focused on the analysis of Indian Economy’s growth trajectory. The keynote address by Prof. Pami Dua (Head, Delhi School

of Economics) discussed the implications of ‘India Link Model’ and explained how the future rate of growth is likely to pick up. The main take home of the seminar was the conclusion that an economic turnaround is not possible without a big push for economic revival measures, to break a long-standing policy deadlock and address the challenges faced by the economy.

- ❑ Commerce Department conducted a national seminar funded by UGC, titled **“The Failure of Corporate Finance in India”** in March 2012.

The seminar helped to evaluate any company’s financial needs and raise appropriate type of capital that best fit those needs. The seminar helped in understanding transactions in which capital is raised in order to create, develop, grow or acquire business. The seminar helped in planning of value-adding, long term corporate financial projects relating to investments funded through and affecting a firm’s capital structure. The seminar helped to evaluate projects that increase a firm’s value may include a wide variety of different types of investments. The seminar helped students to build career opportunities.

- ❑ Hindi Department organised a UGC-funded seminar National Seminar **“Hindi Sahitya Main Hashiye ka Vimarsh: Chunotiyaan Evam Sambhavnayien”** on March 15-16, 2016.

3.7.5 How many of the linkages / collaborations have actually resulted in formal MoUs and agreements? List out the activities and beneficiaries and cite examples (if any) of the establishment linkages that enhanced and / or facilitated.

The college has not yet signed any formal MoU with any research organization/institution. However, the college has signed an MoU with National Skill Development Corporation through DU, in order to provide skill based training to students.

What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

- The changing needs of an institution necessitate the enhancement of its infrastructure. The college has been operating, since its inception in 1987, on the premises owned by the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of NCT (GNCT), Delhi.
- The college management is aware of the limitations of space in the campus. However, it has made creditable efforts to create and augment the infrastructure to meet the demands after the expansion of seats under OBC reservation and introduction of new courses.
- Expansion of the infrastructure in the college takes place through a proper mechanism.
- Whenever need for new infrastructure is recognized by the stakeholders of the college, the matter is brought to the notice of the Principal who in turn forwards it to the Land and Building Committee constituted by the Staff Council.
- The Land and Building Committee deliberates over the matter and returns the proposal to the Principal with its recommendations. The Principal takes the recommendations (if they are in accordance with the rules and regulations of UGC/DU) to the GB for its approval.
- Once the proposal is approved, the Principal forwards it to the PWD which has been acting as Nodal Agency for getting all construction/repair/maintenance work done in the college.

4.1.3. How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution / campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

- The college organizes the Staff Council meetings regularly to discuss matters pertaining to students' welfare, progress, development or any other matter related to infrastructure, development and academic growth of the institute.
- The Staff Council, constituted under the Guidelines of DU, has various committees to look into all these matters and take necessary steps for the same.

Expansion of the infrastructure in the college takes place through a proper mechanism. So whenever need for new infrastructure is recognized by the stakeholders of the college, the matter is brought to the notice of the Principal who in turn forwards it to the Land and Building Committee constituted by the Staff Council of the college. The Land and Building Committee deliberates over the matter and returns the proposal to the principal with its recommendations. The principal takes the recommendations (if they are in accordance with the rules and regulations of UGC/DU) to the GB for its approval. Once the proposal is approved, the Principal forwards it to the PWD which has been acting as the Nodal Agency for getting all construction/repair/maintenance work done in the college.

- College's Purchase committee looks into the purchase of all the equipment, furniture, and other infrastructural requirements proposed to the Principal. The Principal marks the different proposals from the departments to the convener of the Purchase Committee (PC). The PC give its recommendations and all purchases are made as per the General Financial Rules 2005 (GFR 2005) laid down by the Government of India.

Some examples of facilities developed/augmented during last four years:

- In the academic year 2012-2013, to meet the infrastructural requirements due to OBC expansion scheme of UGC, 30 classrooms along with a new administrative block were constructed.
- Media Lab was constructed when students of Journalism felt the need for a Lab where they can have practical sessions on mass media and communication
- Due to increase in the number of the teaching faculty under OBC Expansion, the need for a new space for the staffroom was felt. In 2014 the teachers' staffroom was shifted to its present location lock, stock and barrel. The demand of faculty members for separate washrooms was met. The staffroom has a pantry with RO facility for drinking water, a refrigerator, a microwave oven etc.

- A state of art Auditorium/MPH with latest equipment such as advanced sound and light system and other ICT facilities was inaugurated in 2015.
- The college constructed a Music/Recreation room where students can practice and rehearse for various recreational activities.

Since its inception in 1987, the college has been operating from an already constructed building handed over by DHE, GNCT of Delhi. In 2012, a new block was constructed by PWD under the OBC Expansion Plan. We are attaching the plan of the new building. A layout the college premise is as given in Annexure No. 2.

4.1.4. How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The college is sensitive to the needs and requirements of the students with physical disabilities. Some of the infrastructural facilities are as follows:

- The college has special ramps with tactile paths at key locations in the college premises to ensure easy mobility of differently-abled students.
- All stairways and steps have grab handles which makes it easy for the differently-abled students and faculty to climb the stairs, if required.
- Three differently-abled toilets have been constructed on the ground floor with ramp facility.
- The classes of differently-abled students are usually held in the classrooms on the ground floor.
- To make it convenient for visually-challenged students to identify their classrooms, all the room numbers are displayed in Braille.
- The College has constituted an Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC) to create a socially inclusive society on the campus. Every year it organizes a one-day festival to give the differently-abled students a platform to exhibit their talents. EOC also conducts seminars to sensitize and streamline the problems faced by differently-abled staff and students in the college and society.
- The college library, administrative office and examination rooms are easily accessible for differently-abled students.
- We have two reserved parking spaces for them.
- The library has a collection of books in Braille Script/Print, audio books, one Lex portable camera reading system (Lex Air) and a notebook computer.

4.1.6. What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The following provisions are available to students and staff in terms of Health care:

On Campus

- The Medical Aid Room, with a trained staff nurse, was recently inaugurated by Sh. Manish Sisodia, the Deputy Chief Minister, GNCT of Delhi. It is well stocked with basic medicines, a sphygmomanometer (Blood Pressure monitor), a transducer (pulse monitor) etc. It has a bed where patients can receive first aid, in case of emergency, before being transferred to the nearest hospital, if needed.
- Besides the Medical Room, First-Aid boxes are also available at different locations in the college. The College has two first-Aid boxes: one in the teacher's pantry room and the other in the Girls Common Room (GCR).
- To handle any sort of medical emergencies in the college Ambulance services are available on call. The list of nearby hospitals/clinics is displayed at the main gate of the college. Moreover, the dispensary of NDMC is only 500m away from the college where students, faculty and administrative staff can get treatment free of cost.
- In January 2016, a sanitary-napkin vending machine was installed in the GCR.
- A counsellor is available in the college twice a week from 10:00 a.m-11:00a.m for consultation.
- All attempts are made to maintain hygienic standards of food served in the canteen. The canteen committee frequently monitors the functioning of the canteen.
- Dustbins are placed at various locations for easy accessibility. This ensures cleanliness on the campus.
- One stretcher and 2 Wheelchairs are available for medical emergencies in the Medical Aid Room.

Off Campus

Employees of the college avail CGHS and WUS facilities (as per UGC/DU guidelines)

4.1.7 Give details of the Common Facilities available on the campus—spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal unit, Women's Cell, Counselling and Career Guidance, Placement Unit, Health Centre, Canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.

IQAC : The College has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell. The meetings of the IQAC are held in the New Committee room as and when required.

Grievance Redressal Unit : There are various committees/cells to redress the grievances of students and staff: Internal Complaint Committee (ICC), Internal Assessment Moderation Committee, SC/ST/OBC Grievance Committee, Admission Grievance Committee, Anti-Ragging Committee, Equal Opportunity Cell and Proctorial Committee. Each committee/cell holds its meetings in the committee rooms of the college. In addition to this, details pertaining to these committees/cells are displayed at strategic places.

Women Cell: The College has recently constituted a Women Cell to address the problems/issues of specific concern to female students and staff. It has been formed to supplement, strengthen and reinforce the grievance of Redressal Cell, whereby a female member, if hesitant otherwise, can directly approach the women cell for relief. On Women's Day, the Women Cell, DCAC had organized a session on self-defense in collaboration with Delhi Police. Students were addressed by ACP Tyagi and SHO Yadav.

Counselling: The college has a dedicated room for the counsellor.

The Placement Unit: The college has a pro-active Placement cell, *Broadway*. To facilitate its smooth functioning, the college provides companies that visit for on-campus placements with infrastructure in the form of a dedicated room, seminar hall, audio-visual system, internet connectivity and computers etc to hold their talks, written tests, interviews etc.

Canteen: The canteen is properly ventilated with exhaust fans and has a seating capacity of 50 students; it has separate cooking and washing areas. It is ensured that hygiene and cleanliness is maintained in the canteen.

Recreational Space: The College has a recreational room where students can rehearse/practice for various academic/cultural activities and events. The Sports room provides indoor sports facilities for students and staff.

Safe Drinking Water: Water purifiers (RO) are attached to all the water coolers on the campus to provide safe drinking water for students and staff. The maintenance of the purifiers is outsourced to appropriate agencies.

Auditorium: The Multi-Purpose Hall/auditorium of the College was inaugurated in 2015. It has a seating capacity of 300 persons. College events and student activities are hosted in the auditorium for which there is provision of a screen, projector, good sound system and mikes.

Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1. Does the library have an Advisory Committee? Specify the composition of such a committee. What significant initiatives have been implemented by the committee to render the library, student/user friendly?

The Library Committee acts as the advisory committee of the college library. It comprises the Principal, the Librarian and the teacher-in-charge (TIC) of each department. The functions of the committee are:

1. To approve the annual budget for the library — the committee decides the allocation of funds to individual departments. TICs then, in consultation with department members, decide on the books to be purchased.
2. To address issues and grievances pertaining to library matters — Library has a notice board to display information and a suggestion box to get students' suggestions for improvement.

The initiatives taken to make the library student/user friendly:

- The fully computerized library has an open shelf system which facilitates open access of books.
- INFLIBNET service such as UGC-NLIST has been subscribed from April 2016.
- In the last three years approximately 3500 books in various disciplines were added to the library.
- The library has an online catalogue through OPAC.
- The library has a photocopy machine.
- Weeding out of books and journals.

4.2.2 Provide details of the following :

- The same is attached as Annexure 3.

The Library is located in the Administrative Block of the “New Building”. It has two blocks with two floors:

- **Ground Floor:** The ground floor of the building includes entrance, property counter, check-in/check-out desk, membership-circulation counter, circulation desk, new arrival alert area, main book stack hall for the subjects like Computer, Economics, German, Hindi, History, Theatre, Political Science, Braille collection etc, and OPAC desk.
- **First Floor:** The first floor of the library consists of a reading hall, current periodical section, back volume section for periodicals and technical section, Librarian's room and relaxed reading space. There are two reading rooms: one for the students and one for the faculty members. It has stack area of references books, bound volumes, reference books like encyclopedias, dictionaries, subject and general dictionaries, competition books, bound question papers of previous years.
- There is constant CCTV monitoring in stack hall and reading room.

4.2.3 How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during the last four years.

- The Library Committee is made up of the Principal, the Librarian and TICs. It is constituted by the Staff Council and has a tenure of two years. The committee allocates funds to various departments. The TICs, in consultation with the department members, places the order with the book distributors, publishers and vendors. They then deliver the books to the library where the library staff do the acquisition of the books, accession, classification and cataloguing. Thereafter the books are available to the users.

- The college library has a well trained staff to assist and support students and faculty. Library Staff is very cooperative and helpful to the students and faculty and happily provides assistance, wherever possible, within the system.
- Issuing of library cards and maintenance of record: Each student can get books (4 for Honours and 3 for Programme) issued at a time against her/his library card for a duration of 07 days. The faculty can get 10 books issued against their card.
- Personal assistance is provided to readers for the use of the OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue), accessing electronic resources and technology in the library, as well as locating alternative sources.
- The library provides internet facility on all the computers available for the library users for searching journals, magazines and other e-resources.
- The library provides the facility of reserving the books that are in great demand.

4.2.8 What are the special facilities offered by the library to the visually / physically challenged persons? Give details.

All the facilities which are available for the regular/normal students are also extended to visually/physically challenged students. A special care is provided to them by the library staff. Apart from these, the following special facilities are offered to differently-abled students:

- Braille books are available for visually challenged library users and they are kept on ground floor.
- Library has a collection of books in the Braille Script/Print, audio books, one Lex portable camera reading system (Lex Air) and a notebook computer.
- Laptops with special installed software (JAWS 13) are provided for visually challenged students to facilitate their learning.

4.2.9 Does the library get the feedback from its users? If yes, how is it analyzed and used for improving the library services. (What strategies are deployed by the Library to collect feedback from users? How is the feedback analyzed and used for further improvement of the library services?)

Yes, the library takes regular feedback, verbally and physically, from its users. Feedback mechanism of the library:

- Suggestion/Complaint box is placed in the library.
- The library is equipped with OPAC which has an inbuilt facility through which students submit their suggestions.
- Users can directly approach the Librarian or any other staff member to report any inconvenience or any suggestion in the present library services.

4.3.2 Detail on the computer and internet facility made available to the faculty and students on the campus and off-campus?

- Students and faculty members have been provided with computers and internet facility. Since the entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled, Wi-Fi authenticated user ID and password for internet through their devices is also given.
- Out of the 711 Laptops that the college has 653 are exclusively for the students and 14 for the faculty members.
- The EOC of the college has 17 laptops (with JAWS) and 10 desktops for the use of differently-abled students/staff.
- The UGC Resource Center has 10 Desktops with Internet and printing-scanning facility, for the exclusive use of faculty members.
- The college library has several computers with Internet and printing facility.
- The college has four Computer Labs, enabled with CCTV and LAN Connectivity.
- The Administrative Block (AB) of the college is fully computerized and equipped with scanners, printers and internet facilities.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT Infrastructure and associated facilities?

DCAC has four computer labs equipped with servers, printers, desktop machines, laptops, LCD projectors, and scanners of latest configuration. The College has a well-designed website to disseminate timely information for transparency. The website is regularly updated to inform the students and staff about the necessary information.

The institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT Infrastructure are as follows:

- The college is considering the upgradation of its CCTV infrastructure.

- The college is planning to upgrade its existing software.

4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching / learning materials by its staff and students?

The institution ensures an extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer aided teaching/learning materials by the following methods:

- It provides computers and access to Internet to its students and staff. The Computer Labs are open from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm on all working days.
- Students and faculty members have been issued laptops for making optimum use of e-resources (UGC-Info net databases, thousands of e-journals with full text information available at N-LIST platform).
- Teachers and students are encouraged to use ICT for presentations and lectures. Subject-relevant feature-films/documentaries are screened frequently.
- Library provides e-resources facilities (e-journal/e-books databases).
- The College uploads student's attendance, Internal Assessment marks, time table and important news/ events on the college website.
- Non-teaching staff frequently attends training programmes and workshops on use of IT. These members deploy these training in various processes of the institution. For more details kindly refer Table 6.3.1 (c).

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching-learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled class rooms / learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

- Teaching through ICT tools makes classes more interesting and interactive. Fulfilling the role of a facilitator, faculty members encourage students to use e-resources for research, assignments, projects and presentations.
- Students introduce feature films and documentaries before they are screened usually followed by vibrant discussions. For example selected episodes from *Bharat Ek Khoj*, *Rashomon*, *The Red Balloon* and *Asi-The Lost River* (an award-winning documentary prepared by an alumnus) were screened.
- Faculty members direct students to access Virtual Learning Environment (<http://vle.du.ac.in>), an updated information and knowledge repository pertaining to the syllabus, prepared by ILL, DU. Faculty members also circulate open-source material downloaded from www.dli.gov.in.
- Teachers also encourage students to submit their assignments in soft copy to their mail id so as to motivate them to save paper and to inculcate IT resources in their daily life.
- *Broadway* makes extensive use of ICT in its functioning. After the placement cell convener posts the relevant information on the facebook page of the cell, interested students fill a Google form. The information gathered is automatically converted into an excel file, which is then mailed to the concerned organization for holding interviews when they come to the college.
- Departments have their facebook pages to share relevant information (about workshops, seminars etc.) and resources. For more information kindly refer to table 6.1.6(a) & 6.1.6 (b)

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

- The College ensures regular maintenance and upkeep of all infrastructural facilities.
- Principal through administrative staff tries to ensure upkeep of the available infrastructure, facilities and equipments from time to time.
- Hygiene and cleanliness of the college are maintained by *Sulabh* (since November 2014).
- College has a caretaker who takes care of the day to day maintenance of the college. The college also has the following personnel:
 - ♦ Electrician and plumber as and when required
 - ♦ Chowkidar
 - ♦ Gatekeepers/ security guards (outsourced)
- A team of experienced and efficient gardeners maintain the garden of the college.
- The college has a technical assistant (computers) who takes care of the day to day maintenance and upkeep of computers and related accessories in the four computer laboratories, office and other places in the college.
- The college has AMCs and Insurance for sensitive equipment and infrastructure.
- PWD is the nodal agency of all Construction/maintenance/renovation work in the college. However, the college calls a plumber and electrician as and when required.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment / instruments?

- Annual Insurance for Laptops
- Annual Insurance for Library (Equipment, furniture, almirah, books, cases/racks etc.)
- Annual maintenance of Photocopier machine at Administrative and Accounts Office

- Annual refilling of Fire extinguisher
- Annual service of Air conditioners, water coolers, RO water purifiers and fire extinguishers.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)? Any other relevant information regarding infrastructure and learning resources which the college would like to include.

- Drinking water in the college is supplied by NDMC and the college Pump House is also maintained by NDMC.
- All water coolers on the campus are attached to water purifiers (RO) to provide safe drinking water for students and staff
- The maintenance of the purifiers is outsourced to appropriate agencies.
- The college server room is fully air conditioned.
- The College has full power back-up with three-phase electric supply, voltage stabilizers and UPSs. The college maintains computers and other facilities through its own staff and through the PWD, as applicable.
- 85 KVA silent Generator is provided for electricity backup (maintained and operated by PWD operator) to ensure uninterrupted power supply.
- 24 fire-extinguishers and several sand buckets have been installed at strategic locations in the college.
- The caretaker ensures that the fans, lights etc. on the campus are in working-condition and all complaints regarding the above are swiftly resolved.

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

5.1.1 Does the institution publish its updated prospectus/handbook annually? If yes, what is the information provided to students through these documents and how does the institution ensure its commitment and accountability?

The College publishes its prospectus annually which is provided to the students at the time of admission along with the admission form. The prospectus informs applicants of the history of the college, faculty profiles and the details of various courses offered by the various departments. It contains the following information:

- Details of schedule, criteria and procedures for admission.
- The fee structure, eligibility criteria, and rules regarding attendance, Internal Assessment and semester examination, etc.
- Information of various committees/cells, societies and facilities available in the college.
- Information containing Rules of Discipline as per Ordinance XV-B, Anti-Ragging as per Ordinance XV-C, Sexual Harassment as per Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace Act, 2013.
- Besides providing information of the courses offered at the Under-graduate level, short term/add on courses, scholarships, college rules and ordinances of Delhi University, the prospectus also informs students of the infrastructural facilities available in the college, such as the canteen, multi-purpose hall, committee rooms, computer labs, the library, etc.

The college ensures that its policies, rules and regulations mentioned in the prospectus are strictly adhered to. Several committees, for instance, Admission Committee, Internal Assessment Committee, Moderation (Internal Assessment) Committee, Monitoring (Internal Assessment) Committee, Proctorial Committee (Discipline) have been constituted to look into any matter of concern brought in by the students. The college has a Grievance Redressal Cell, Internal Complaints Committee, EOC to maintain the commitment and accountability of every stakeholder in the Institution. To give information pertaining to the admission procedures and criteria, notices are displayed on the notice boards of the college.

5.1.2 Specify the type, number and amount of institutional scholarships/free-ships given to the students during the last four years and whether the financial aid was available and disbursed on time?

A large number of free-ships and scholarships are given to students at DCAC every year. Moreover, the college also has a fee concession committee, constituted by the staff council,

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for?

(a) Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

- To make the college atmosphere an all inclusive one, the college supports and

extends various facilities to students coming from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections.

- The college follows the reservation guidelines for the students of SC/ST/OBC as laid down by the Government of India/UGC/DU at the time of admission.
- Scholarships (Central/State Government agencies) for the welfare of SC/ST and minority students are given. The college also gives scholarships and fee- concessions to them.
- Student-Aid is given to students from economically weaker sections.
- A separate committee is constituted at the time of admission to facilitate admission of students of SC/ST/OBC categories.
- The college has conducted free remedial coaching classes as well as Free Coaching Classes for students belonging to above categories under the Eleventh plan.
- To look into the problems faced by students from the North-Eastern states, college has a proactive society led by a nodal officer.

(b) Students with physical disabilities

The College provides extensive support to differently-abled students.

- The college has a very active EOC that looks into the specific problems/concerns faced by differently-abled students.
- This cell makes every possible effort to make the college conducive to differently-abled students, ensuring that necessary infrastructural facilities are provided.
- EOC has 10 personal computers installed with Jaws 13.0 talking and screen-reading software. It also has 17 netbooks with special screen-reading software. One printer with latest technology is also installed.
- The EOC regularly organizes seminars/workshops and various other activities in the college to discuss and deliberate upon the problems faced by the differently-abled students.
- Since its inception in 2010, EOC has been organizing its annual cultural fest, *Justice*. The fest witnesses lectures by eminent speakers and inter-college competitions are also conducted for the differently-abled students across the DU.
- There are 3 special washrooms for differently-abled students on the ground floor.
- The College has Special Ramps with tactile paths at key locations in the college premises to ensure easy mobility of differently-abled students.

- The college library is equipped with software LEX that can scan a book and convert it into Braille and vice-versa. It also has basic reading equipments such as angel e-book reader and voice recorder, and Braille slates, mathematical slates, etc.
- Differently-abled students are exempted from payment of Examination Fee and other University fees, except Admission fee, subscription towards DU Students' Union and Identity Card fee (as per Sub-clause 2 of Ordinance X (4)).
- The College's NSS unit runs a project Blind School with the objective of not just assisting the visually impaired students but to empower them in carrying out the routine life.
- Under the Blind School Project, NSS also conducted a campaign, "I Pledge Campaign" to sensitize people around the society to pledge that they would never discriminate among people on the basis of their disabilities.
- Faculty members devote extra efforts to make these students capable in competing with other students.

(c) Overseas students

- Admissions of the foreign students are done as per the recommendations of the Dean, Foreign students, DU.
- In lieu of Hindi language, provision for studying History and Political Science is given at the college.

(d) Students to participate in various competitions/national and international

- Students at DCAC are encouraged to participate in various college, inter-college, national and international competitions to develop self-confidence and a sense of achievement.
- The college provides allowances and support facilities such as trainers, practice room, refreshments, conveyance allowance, audio-visual facilities, musical instruments, etc to its students participating in various inter-university and other national competitions.

- Students participating in these activities are given extended time limit for the submission of assignments and project work for internal assessment.
- The College through its Cultural Committee reimburses registration fee charged by the host organizations.
- Sports play a very important role in the overall development of students. The Students at DCAC are active participants in various sports activities and have won many National and International prizes/awards.
- The college felicitates students who secure outstanding positions in national and international competitions. Kindly refer to table 5.3.2 (a) for the detailed list of students' achievements in the field of various games and sports.

(e) Medical assistance to students: health center, health insurance etc.

Following provisions are available to students in terms of Health Care:

- The Medical Aid Room, with a trained staff nurse, was recently inaugurated by Sh. Manish Sisodia, the Deputy Chief Minister, GNCT of Delhi. It is well stocked with basic medicines, a sphygmomanometer (Blood Pressure monitor), a transducer (pulse monitor) etc. It has a bed where patients can receive first aid, in case of emergency, before being transferred to the nearest hospital, if needed.
- Besides the Medical Room, First-Aid boxes are also available at different locations in the college. The College has two first-Aid boxes: one in the teacher's pantry room and the other in the Girls Common Room (GCR).
- To handle any sort of medical emergencies in the college Ambulance services are available on call. The list of nearby hospitals/clinics is displayed at the main gate of the college. Moreover, the dispensary of NDMC is only 500m away from the college where students, faculty and administrative staff can get treatment free of cost.
- In January 2016, a sanitary-napkin vending machine was installed in the GCR.
- A counsellor is available in the college twice a week from 10:00 a.m–11:00 a.m for consultation.
- All attempts are made to maintain hygienic standards of food served in the canteen. The canteen committee frequently monitors the functioning of the canteen.
- Dustbins are placed at various locations for easy accessibility. This ensures cleanliness on the campus.

- One stretcher and 2 Wheelchairs are available for medical emergencies in the Medical Aid Room.

(f) Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

- Under the Eleventh plan the college had conducted special classes to provide assistance to students from SC/ST/OBC categories to prepare for the various competitive exams.
- College alumni are invited to give lectures on the modalities of preparation for various competitive and entrance exams.

(g) Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy etc)

- The college frequently organizes workshops/symposia for the students to equip them with skills which are required in order to explore various carrier opportunities.
- The college, under the guidance of the teachers of the English Department, successfully conducted an add on English Language Proficiency Course (ELPC). The course provided assistance to the students with poor spoken/written skills in English language.
- The college also offers add on certificate courses in French, German and Spanish languages and a diploma in Spanish and Mass Media (Hindi).

(h) Support for “slow learners”

- Students are encouraged to approach faculty members and their seniors for any form of assistance.
- Teachers form small groups consisting of students of different learning abilities in order to facilitate peer learning.
- Academic and psychological counseling is given to such students

(i) Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning/corporate/business houses etc.

- To create awareness about market trends and job opportunities, the college encourages its students to attend internships, workshops and seminars.
- Several students at DCAC are helped through its placement cell Broadway to avail internships in different companies. For more detail refer to table 5.1.9 (a).
- Broadway invites representatives from institutes offering professional degrees (for example S.P. Jain School of Global Management) to counsel students regarding entrance exams and scholarship possibility.

- The college organizes regular educational/historical/industrial/corporate trips for the students. For detailed information, kindly refer to Department Evaluation Report.
- The Department of Commerce organizes plant visits every year. For example it has organized visits to various industries like Bata Shoe Co., Faridabad; Britannia Industries Ltd., Kwality Ice-cream Co., Delhi; Mother Dairy, Delhi, D.C.M, Delhi etc.

(j) Publication of College Magazine

- The students are on the editorial board of the college's Annual Magazine *Swaram* and other departments' magazines and newsletters. The details are as follows:
 - ♦ The Commerce department's annual magazine *Vanijya* provides a platform to the students to exhibit their hidden talents and express their creative ideas skills.
 - ♦ The Newsletter, *Olive Branch*, of the English department gives students an opportunity to exhibit their writing skills and creative potential.
 - ♦ The students of Journalism produce a number of tabloids like DCAC Express, DCAC Herald, DCAC Times throughout the year. Besides this, the department's newsletter, *The Critique*, allows students to dwell upon journalistic and development issues.
 - ♦ The Advertising Association brings out its Annual Magazine *AD-VERVE*.
 - ♦ The Economics Department's newsletter, *Ecosential*, is published annually at the session end. The Newsletter perfectly captures the year in a snapshot and provides a suitable platform to share ideas and views on a wide range of topics.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

- *Vyapaar*, the Entrepreneurial Cell of the college organized its annual fest, Entrepreneurial Summit'15. For details see link: <http://pixr8.com/vyapaar-2015-entrepreneurship-summit-a-new-beginning-at-delhi-college-of-arts-and-commerce/>
- Students learn entrepreneurial skills through Art and Craft project of enactus DCAC. They work with various NGOs to help uplift economically and socially deprived sections.
- Various societies and cells organize talks and workshops by entrepreneurs. Some examples are:

- ♦ On 29 October 2016, the Advertising Association organized a one day event 'AD Retrocia' and conducted a Print AD Competition with the theme of Retro print advertisements which facilitated entrepreneurial skills in the participants.
- ♦ 35 students of Commerce and Journalism participated in Dr. Subhash Chandra Show on Zee News on the theme "Starting New Business".

- To facilitate a holistic development and promote the participation of our students in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, the college has many societies and committees. Moreover, the college also encourages students to be a part of at least one of these societies — National Cadet Corps (NCC), National Service Scheme (NSS) and Sports.
- Apart from above mentioned societies, the college also encourages students to participate in various activities/events/programmes organized by different departments and societies of Cultural Committee. There are seven societies which are operating under the aegis of cultural Committee: Debating Society (DebSoc), Dramatics Society (Leher), Music Society (DastGah), Dance Society (DriftUp), Photography Society (Clicks), Quiz Society and Fashion Society (Stylus.in). Every year, at the beginning of the session each society conducts auditions to elect student office bearer and incorporate new talented students as members. For more details refer to 5.3.1 & 5.3.2.
- ♦ **Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations**
 - The college extends full cooperation to students pursuing extra-curricular activities at college, inter-college, national and international levels.
 - Relaxation in cut-off at the time of admission under Sports quota as per DU guidelines.
 - The students are given special attention during the tutorials and granted concession in attendance as per DU rules.
 - Flexibility in the time limit for the submission of internal assessment assignments.

- ♦ **Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials**
 - Refreshment/uniform/sports kit facilities are provided to the students engaged in NCC and sports activities.
 - The students are given uniform, suits and T-shirts, etc. with the logo/motto of respective society.
- ♦ **Any other**
 - To encourage students' participation in curricular and extra-curricular activities, certificates, awards and prizes are distributed.
 - Achievers in various sports categories are rewarded with cash prizes and certificates on the occasion of college Annual Day.
 - The college has separate space for rehearsals and practices.
 - Professional trainers are hired for grooming students for various activities like dramatics, choreography music, etc.
 - The college reimburses the registration fees incurred by the participants in various activities/events.

ACHIEVEMENTS

5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such UGC-CSIR- NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE / CAT / GRE/ TOFEL / GMAT / Central / State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

- Many graduates from DCAC go for higher studies or central/state services. However, the college does not have a formal mechanism to keep the record for the same. For further information, kindly refer to the profiles of the individual departments. Some of the support activities carried out by the college are listed below:
- In the academic session 2010-12, funds were received under merged scheme of UGC (XI plan). These were used to hold coaching for NET/SET and civil services entrance exams for SC/ST/OBC students.
- The College has organized the ELPC i.e. English Language Proficiency Course for English to enhance communication skills which has helped students to clear many competitive exams.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.

- **Academic Counseling:** At the time of admissions, the Centralised Admission Committee is constituted to clarify students' doubts and queries regarding the choice of stream, subjects and processes of admission.
- **Personal Counseling, Psycho-social Counseling:** The College has a professional counselor, Dr. Jyotsna Mittal, who is available in the college twice a week from 10:00 a.m.-11:00 a.m. to provide counseling. Apart from this, students also go to teachers for guidance on various issues. The Women Cell of the college invites resource persons from different spheres of the academic and professional world to guide and help the students. The College also organises Yoga classes for the students for attaining overall discipline of body, mind and soul.
- **Career Counseling:** Broadway, the placement cell of DCAC is very active and works as a career guidance unit as well as a placement service provider for the students.
- Various departments organise seminars and talks by eminent personalities from respective fields of knowledge to expose students to the skills required for their successful employment.
- The college has a nodal officer to look into the problems and concerns faced by the students from the North-East.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If yes, detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers.

Yes, the college has a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement for its students.

- The college has a pro-active Placement Cell, Broadway, constituted by the Staff Council, which works with the aim of providing a strong interlink between the corporate sector and the academia. The team of Broadway is a combination of experienced teachers and young minds who are representatives of various departments.
- It gives a platform to the aspirants and the companies.
- The Cell organizes various seminars and workshops on career guidance and conducts placement sessions from time to time.
- Broadway invites companies with varied profiles to suit the requirements of our students looking for jobs in finance, accounting, and marketing, sales, computers, audit and research background.

- Students have been placed in reputed companies like KPMG, E&Y, PWC, L&T, ICICI Prudential, CBSE, Capital IQ, ZEE Media, Focus TV, Zakoobi, Oberoi Group of Hotels, Genepact, Delhivery etc.

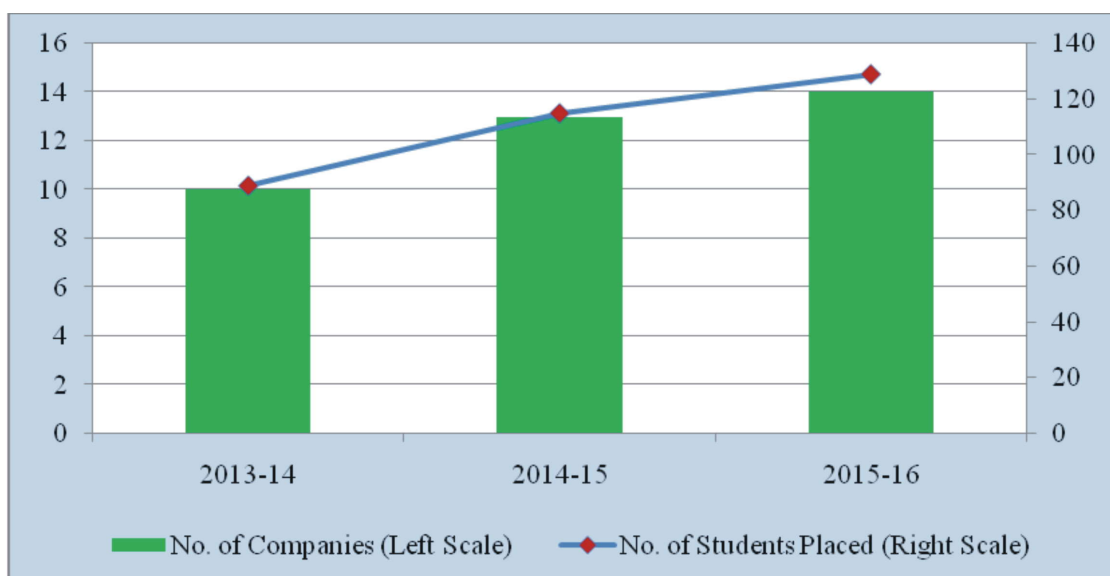

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redress cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

In order to address the grievances of students in a swift and efficient manner, the college has a number of grievance redressal cells to look into the grievances related to admission, sexual harassment, anti-ragging, internal assessment, attendance and academics. Apart from these cells, the college has a recently constituted Grievance Redressal Committee comprising six members (one Nominee of the Governing Body, three senior teachers nominated by the Chairman, Governing Body and one student Representative based on academic merits).

- The students are informed about these committees/cells right at the commencement of the academic session through prospectus and the Orientation programme.
- Several suggestion boxes have been installed at strategic locations. A complaint box, entitled “Nirbhik”, has been installed in the campus by the Delhi Police. Students can maintain their anonymity while giving their suggestion/complaints.
- The grievances are brought to the notice of the Principal and the members of the committee by various stakeholders.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

- The college has a formalized mechanism to deal with issues related to sexual harassment against a female student/teaching/non-teaching staff. The college has an Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) and The Women Cell to deal with matters pertaining to Sexual Harassment.
- The Committee comprises of four female teachers, one male teacher and two co-opted members from outside the college with known contribution to women's issues, as per Delhi University ordinance XV (D). The relevant details of the committee are displayed in the college.
- Relevant section of University Ordinances XV (D) on Sexual Harassment is also displayed in college campus. It is also highlighted in the college prospectus.
- In January 2016, Women Cell, in association with Delhi State Legal Services Authority organized lectures by eminent judges, Ms. Monika Saroha and Ms. Chetna Singh on issues like "Prevention of Sexual Harassment at workplace" and "Domestic Violence" to sensitize students of the same.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

- The College campus is a zero Tolerance zone for ragging. DCAC has a pro-active Anti-Ragging Committee as per University Ordinance XV-C.
- This committee ensures that students do not face the menace of ragging.
- The board displaying the contact details of members of the committee is installed at a strategic place in the college.
- In July 2015, one case of ragging was reported and proper investigation was carried out. The matter was resolved as per rules and regulation.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/ or towards employment?

- We at DCAC initiate students into interdisciplinary oriented courses and mentor students to get through various entrance examinations of PG courses.
- Students are encouraged to pursue higher education in their field of interest in National and International universities. The faculty members write Letters of Recommendation to facilitate the same.
- The college provides certificate/diploma courses in different languages and Mass Media to enable students to pursue diverse career opportunities.
- Activities of *Broadway*
 - ♦ Conducts career counselling sessions and personality development activities to enhance employment opportunities
 - ♦ Serves as an interface between Students and Industry
 - ♦ Organizes workshops/seminars/mock interviews - sessions regarding resume writing, handling interviews, group discussions, and written tests. For instance, a session on the Art of CV writing was organized in 2014 by the *Vyapaar*-The Entrepreneur Cell
 - ♦ Invites representatives from international universities to guide students regarding admission and scholarship

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

- Drop-out rate in the college is minimal. However, the faculty members are quite sensitive towards the needs of students who are at the risk of drop out or failure.

- Extra support in terms of teaching, counseling, preparing assignment etc, is provided to these students.
- The faculty members in the college adopt a lenient attitude towards students facing extraneous circumstances.

5.3 Student Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extra-curricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and programme calendar.

- The College believes in holistic development of the students. Besides creating a congenial and healthy atmosphere, the college provides motivation and encouragement to the students and prepares them for curricular, extracurricular and sports events/activities. Moreover, the college also encourages students at DCAC to be a member of at least one of these societies – National Cadet Corps (NCC), National Service Scheme (NSS) and Sports.

NSS: NSS is promoted by the Ministry of Human Resources and Development. Its objective is the development of the personality of students through community service. It plays a very vital role in carrying out various in-house projects. Some are listed below:

1. Project TanZeal: initiated in August 2012 by two students of DCAC, Yashvardhan Verma and Sukriti Sethi. TanZeal aims at the holistic development of the underprivileged children who come to the centre five days a week from 2:30p.m.- 4:30 p.m. The College premises is used as the centre for the Project and the TanZeal team has access to all the facilities provided by the college right from using the classroom to the Computer Rooms. The children are not just taught basic subjects like Mathematics, English and Hindi, a lot of focus is given to moral education and personality development as well. The children get to hone their dancing, singing, and art talent one day a week in the Project.
2. Year 2013-2014 saw the initiation of Art and Craft project and project Blind School of the visually impaired persons. The volunteers assist the visually impaired children with their 11 opportunities; Leadership talks, etc. are a few major activities. The NSS DCAC organizes its annual fest, Aadya every year to provide an interface between the students of the college and the NGOs such as like Greenpeace, CRY, Goonj, Craftkaari, Aadi, Save the Quest, and Diya, to name a few.
3. Clean and Green has been an important part of NSS DCAC. It emphasizes on the cleanliness of the college. Under this project, the Unit organises various cleanliness drives, which are mostly one day events.
4. Project RTI has been active for about 3 years in NSS DCAC. The main objective of this project is to allow students to have a better understanding of the RTI Act,

2005 and the right to information which has been bestowed upon the citizens of India by the government.

5. The Project Revolution through Education is another important project taken up by Save the Quest with the motive of reforming the education system to make it more flexible and holistic, more importantly quest-based. This project is operational since May 2013.

NCC: NCC is administered by Ministry of Defence and is headed by Director General (DG) who monitors its functioning through his HQ in Delhi. DCAC students are attached with Army unit of Group HQ Delhi 'C' i.e., 7 Delhi Battalion (7DBN) NCC, Delhi, Delhi Directorate in Senior Division (SD) of National Cadet Corps since 1987. The DCAC NCC unit provides several opportunities to the cadets. DCAC also gives weightage to the NCC 'A' Certificate holders at the time of admission in various courses offered by the college of up to 10 per cent marks under NCC Admission Quota. Due procedures is followed as per the DU/UGC rules and regulations. It encourages cadets to participate in various activities throughout the year which includes attending various prestigious National and International camps and parades like Youth Exchange Programme (YEP), Republic Day Parade, Thal Sainik Camp, All India Adventure Trekking Camp, National Integration Camp, Combined Annual Training Camp, Annual Training Camp, Adventure Camp, Advanced Leadership Camp, Chief Minister Rally, Blood Donation Camp, Disaster Relief Camp, etc. Total sanctioned strength allocated to our institution by the 7DBN Unit is 54 Cadets and each cadet is selected through the proper selection procedure as coordinated with the unit.

DCAC NCC Unit does not strive only to provide a suitable environment to motivate the youth to take up a career in the Armed Forces, but also to train and motivate youth, and inculcate spirit of courage & bravery to face any sort of situation in life under the guidance of Lt Bhupinder, Assistant Professor and Associate NCC Officer (ANO). Lt Bhupinder was awarded the rank of lieutenant in Army on 21-03-2015 with Personal No, NCC/04110024 after completing PRCN/SD-157 Course as per section 21(5) of National Cadet Corps Act, 1948.

At the end of every session, cadets of DCAC NCC organize their Annual NCC Fest *Shaurya* in which participants from different universities and schools take part. Approximately 15 competitive events and activities were organized in Shaurya'16 for which 21 college teams and 6 school teams showed their presence. The list of activities and achievements of NCC cadets for the last four years is listed below.

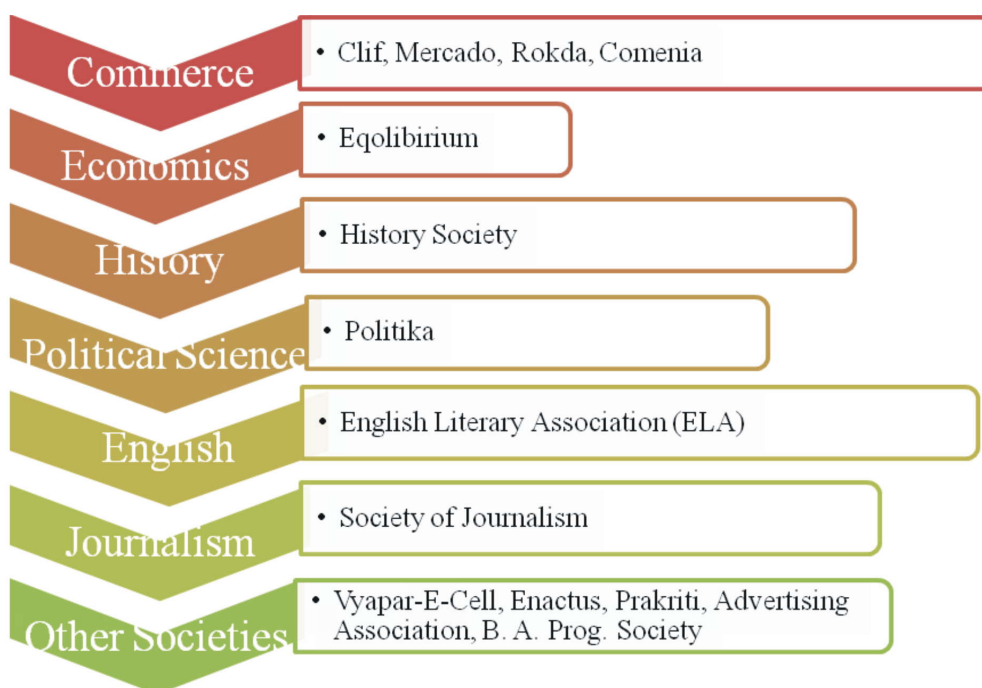
Diagram 5.3.1 : (c) Department/Other Societies

- All organisations that come for campus placements give their feedback regarding their expectations and experiences. This is analysed and used for future activities.

- Students are the key contributors in magazines, newsletters, journal and other research works brought out by different departments. Our students are on the editorial board of the annual students' magazine *Swaram*.
- Students at DCAC are encouraged to publish their research work in various magazines and journals. *Vaanijya*, the annual magazine of the Commerce department, provides a space to the students to exhibit their latent talents and express their creative ideas.
- Students of Journalism submit a research work/dissertation as a part of their course work.
- The *Olive Branch*, the Newsletter of the English department was a trend, set by our students to exhibit their writing skills and creative potential.
- Students are on the editorial board of the Advertising Association's Annual Magazine titled "AD-VERVE" in the year 2007.
- Students of BA (Hons.) IInd Year Journalism bring out three Newsletters/Brochures: DCAC Times, DCAC Herald and DCAC Express as they study print Journalism and Production in their course work. They also bring out their annual newsletter, *The Critique*.
- In the year 2015, the findings of two of our Innovation Projects were published as edited books. The whole idea of innovation projects is to engage students in field based work; conduct house hold surveys, primary research, and learn various technique of data analysis.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes, the college has a Students' Council which is a representative body of the college students and for which elections are conducted in the month of September (as a convention a day before the election of Delhi University Students Union (DUSU). Students Council/ Union is an autonomous body and it is not affiliated to DUSU.

- The College Student's Council/Union is elected every year through a democratic process with active participation of the entire student body.
- The Principal is the patron of the Students' Council/Union.
- The Students' Council/Union consists of 7 members - President, Vice President, General Secretary, Joint Secretary, Cultural Secretary, Sports Secretary and GCR secretary. The Council/Union is ably guided in its functioning by staff advisors and the Principal of the college.

- Student Council/Union members help in the Admission processes and Orientation Programme organized for new students annually.
- The Students' Council/Union organizes cultural, educational, sport's activities in the college and also provides co-operation towards the solution of day-to-day problems and difficulties faced by the students and create healthy atmosphere for all round development of students of the college. The student council/union members help in organising Fresher's Welcome Party, College Fest–Ambrosia, lectures/seminars on contemporary and academic topics of students' interest.

- The College Student Union Fee, and sponsorships, advertisements, donations etc. fund the activities of the Students' Council. For the detailed Constitution of the Students' Council see Annexure 4.

Besides, the experience of the alumni who are already well placed also helps the students learn, and improve their job prospects.
- The college also maintains regular contact with its alumni and former faculty members through various email groups and social networking sites such as Facebook, Whatsapp etc.
- We invite our former faculty members for all the events and celebrations, such as the Annual Fest, farewell parties of the faculty members etc.

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT



6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

Vision Statement

The vision of DCAC is to impart holistic education to students for their academic excellence and to inculcate national and human values in them through academic, co-curricular and socially meaningful activities.

Mission Statement

- DCAC embraces change and diversity and looks at these as learning opportunities.
- The college sensitises students to issues central to national and social survival (gender/disability issues, environmental issues etc.)
- The college introduces innovations in teaching-learning so that all stakeholders are abreast with latest information.
- The college lays special focus on extra-curricular activities and sees the nation's diversity as a strength. Through various activities involving team work students learn to view diversity as an opportunity to embrace differences.

For all stakeholders, DCAC occupies a special place because of the following reasons —

- The college prides itself on having an open-door policy; the Principal, and teachers are available for students any time they want.
- The college is one of the premier institutes in Delhi. However it does not rest on its laurels and is constantly evolving – teachers and non-teaching staff attend training programmes regularly.
- The administration and faculty actively mentor students to enable them to take responsibilities in various spheres of life.
- The culture of team work is prioritised and inculcated in the college and this ensures that peer learning takes place constantly.

Students of different departments bring out newsletters/brochures under the mentorship of teachers. The societies of various departments, under the leadership of elected student representatives, organise academic and extra-curricular activities like talks, seminars and film screenings. The various societies within the cultural committee organise plays, debates,

photography competitions, fashion shows etc. Extra-curricular activities like Mock Parliament, Model United Nations and entrepreneurial activities are also organised. Students participate in social outreach programmes under NSS, *Prakriti*, enactus etc.

- The college recognises that technological innovation/upgradation is essential and uses ICT in the teaching-learning process. Upgradation of technological infrastructure is an ongoing process. For example, it has established a Media Lab for the students of BA (Hons.) Journalism.
- The college plans all its academic and extra-curricular activities in advance to ensure the completion of syllabi as well as to give ample opportunities to students to participate in these activities.
- The college is conscious of the fact that social inclusion is important for the holistic development of society. Providing scholarships and freeships are means of attaining this goal.
- The college tries to appraise the students of social issues through units like NCC, NSS, EOC, the North-East Society etc.

6.1.2 What is the role of the top management, Principal and faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The college has a defined structure to implement its policies and plans. The top management comprises the GB with the Principal as its member secretary. He presents strategic issues concerning the college before the GB.

Academic decisions are taken by the Staff Council with the Principal as its Chairman and a faculty member as secretary. The Staff Council forms different committees for the effective functioning of the college. The college lays emphasis on collaborative governance, and all decisions are taken as per the rules and regulations laid down by DU/UGC.

The GB consists of academicians, journalists, advocates and social workers. They work to improve the academic environment and infrastructure of the college. It comprises of 10 nominated members (5 from GNCT, Govt of Delhi and 5 from DU), 2 University representatives, 2 Teacher representatives, 1 Non-teaching representative and Principal as the Secretary.

The policy decisions taken by the GB focus on:

- Planning in financial matters relating to construction and renovation of infrastructure; increase in components of fee (for ex. setting up of Media Lab, renovation of Multi-Purpose Hall/Auditorium, renovation and shifting of staff room to its present location).

- Approving introduction of new courses which are then forwarded to relevant authorities for further action (for ex. GB approved introduction of BSc (Mathematics) from the session 2016-2017).
- Incorporating feedback which members receive, during their interaction with stakeholders, in order to improve academic and extra-curricular activities.

As head of the institution and chairperson of the Staff Council, the Principal oversees the functioning of various committees. These committees are independent with respect to their functioning and decision making. In order to ensure financial propriety one of the faculty is appointed as Bursar by the GB. The AEC, comprising of the Principal and faculty members, as per Staff Council resolution, is very proactive in maintaining academic standards. It promotes research interest among faculty members. The college has formed an IQAC to monitor quality issues and suggest ways and means of improving the quality and standard of academic activities.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- *The policy statements and action plans for fulfilment of the stated mission*
- *Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan*
- *interaction with stakeholders*
- *Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders*
- *Reinforcing the culture of excellence*
- *Champion organizational change.*
- The college adopts the culture of participative governance to formulate and execute all academic and administrative plans. The Staff Council, with its various committees, extends its co-operation in facilitating the implementation of the strategic plans.
- The GB, Principal, Staff Council, AEC and IQAC work in a concerted manner to ensure effective implementation of policies and programmes so that desired academic standards are achieved and maintained in the college. The Principal and Staff Council have constituted various committees to ensure that the requirements of stakeholders are identified and met. After looking at the specifics of the issues, the concerned committee discusses and deliberates on them. The committee gives its recommendations to the Principal, who, in turn, forwards it to the GB for its perusal and approval.

- The GB assists the Principal in executing all administrative activities. Meetings of the GB are held to take strategic decisions for the infrastructural and academic development of the college. The Principal frequently interacts with the non-teaching staff to get their inputs regarding the functioning of the college. The college recognises their significant contribution in its smooth functioning. A cash award was introduced 2 years ago to recognise their contribution; Mr Dharmanand and Mr. Surender have received it till date.
- The Principal along with TICs, NCC in-charge, NSS convener, Students' Council/ Union advisor, director of physical education and others interacts with all students and guardians to address their concerns.
- As students are the most important stakeholders of the institution the college modifies plans, procedures and processes for their ease. The achievements of students in academics, sports and extra-curricular activities are recognised. They are felicitated on the Annual Day.
- All activities (academic and non-academic) are planned in advance as reflected in the college calendar (kindly see table 5.3.1). This information is displayed on the notice boards and the college website. The annual report and prospectus also give information about the college and its achievements. A PIO, who responds to RTI queries addressed to the college, has been appointed.
- To address any grievance of the stakeholders, the college has a centralised Grievance Redressal Committee and various committees which look after specific grievances concerning admissions, internal assessment, sexual harassment, leave, promotion etc.
- All organisational changes, which involve both material as well as human resources, take place as and when required, within the stipulated and prescribed norms of DU/UGC. The college encourages younger faculty to be involved in various committees and decision making bodies.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

- Since the institution is participative and democratic in its functioning, its plans and policies are framed in consultation with the Staff Council and its various committees, the IQAC, AEC and the GB.
- The Principal has an open door policy; he interacts with all stakeholders in formal and informal settings. The inputs that he receives are forwarded to the relevant committees so that institutional processes and policies can be refined.

- At the departmental level continuous monitoring takes place to ensure that timelines are met.
- Statutory reporting of finances/usage of resources helps keep track of utilisation.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The top management provides ample opportunities for the faculty to take on leadership roles in various academic fields.

Teaching standards: Faculty members are encouraged to apply for research projects from different agencies and help in mentoring the students. (kindly see table 3.1.5 (b) for a detailed list of research projects and students' participation in them). The college encourages faculty members to attend FTP/FDP programmes. Duty leave is given to faculty members to attend these programmes. In addition to this they are also encouraged to attend subject specific seminars, conferences etc. Faculty members constantly update their subject knowledge and pedagogic techniques. Two faculty members attended "Partners in Learning," a teacher training programme, conducted by Microsoft and ILLI in 2009. They then conducted two workshops for faculty members in the college in December 2009 and February 2010. The faculty participated enthusiastically in this ICT workshop.

Organising academic activities in the college: Various departments organise national/international seminars, symposia, lectures, talks and take on projects regularly. Teachers are also encouraged to start short term programmes and add-on courses.

Assessment of the students: Teachers evaluate the performance of students regularly through assignments, presentations and class tests. They also provide feedback to them for academic improvement.

Recognition to faculty: The academic achievements of faculty members are acknowledged in the Annual Report of the college. Faculty members also contribute to the college's research journal *Intellectual Resonance* (ISSN 2321-2594). They are also on the editorial board of the journal.

Activities related to research and scholarship: The college gives impetus to faculty members to be part of editorial boards of various national and international journals. Teachers are encouraged to publish their work, participate in research projects funded by various agencies and guide PhD/MPhil students. Faculty is given sabbatical/study leave as per DU/UGC norms to work on their research areas.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

Students and teachers are encouraged to take up new tasks and projects, but it is ensured that they stick to timelines.

Students:

- One student is the member of the Grievance Redressal Committee. S(he) is selected for his/her academic merit. Through participation in the proceedings of the committee the student gets hands on training in collaborative decision-making.
- The students, under the mentorship of faculty members, are encouraged to take decisions in their roles in various societies/units of the college.
- The students of the college, through its proactive Students' Council/Union, organise various academic and social outreach programmes.
- As part of the DU Innovation Projects students from different disciplines engage in inter-disciplinary research activities. They conduct field surveys, interviews etc. and thus inculcate leadership skills.
- The NSS and NCC units of the college provide a platform to the students to exhibit their leadership qualities and organisational skills in conducting various activities.
- Through their newsletters/brochures the students of the college actively participate in several responsibilities involved in bringing them out.

In addition to this, college also brings out, a student's annual magazine, *Swaram*.

Faculty

- Faculty members assume leadership roles as conveners, nodal officers, PIO, Bursar, TICs etc. on a rotational basis.
- Faculty members in their roles as conveners of student centric societies mentor them effectively.
- Teachers at department level are encouraged to design and model their own ways and mechanisms of classroom teaching and use technologies they feel would aid the teaching-learning process.
- Faculty members are encouraged to organise workshops, lectures etc. They go as resource persons to various training programmes and share their expertise with other teachers.
- Faculty members take up roles like assistant superintendent of exams, when examinations are conducted by the DU.

Administrative Staff

- Staff is encouraged to give their inputs to facilitate a smoother functioning amongst all stakeholders.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The DU charter gives autonomy to its constituent colleges.

All activities of the institution occur at four levels: the GB, Head of Institution, Staff Council and Departments in the college. There is decentralisation at every level.

The Principal, being the administrative head of the college and the Chairperson of the Staff Council, oversees the functioning of various departments and committees. However, departments and committees are independent with respect to their functioning and decision making. They enjoy complete independence vis a vis task planning and execution as long as these are within prescribed budgets and guidelines. In order to ensure financial propriety, one of the faculty members is appointed as Bursar by the GB.

Academic and extra-curricular activities at the department level are carried out under the supervision/leadership of the TIC, in consultation with members of the department. Every member in the department enjoys absolute freedom in designing their own ways and mechanism of teaching and use of ICT. For the smooth functioning of departmental activities regular meetings are held so that timelines can be met.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The college believes in participative management and promotes collaborative governance. Every stakeholder is involved at various levels and in various forms in the management of the institution and its processes.

Governing Body: two faculty members — one with more than 10 years and one with less than 10 years are part of the GB, the highest decision making body in the college. The GB also has, as its member, one non-teaching staff. The Principal is the member secretary of the GB.

Staff Council: is a statutory body constituted under the guidelines of DU for the smooth functioning of the college.

Senior faculty members are also part of the IQAC.

Administrative functioning of the College is facilitated by participation of faculty at various levels as:

- **Bursar:** S(he) is appointed by the GB on the Principal's recommendation. S(he) supervises the maintenance and audits of various financial accounts.
- **Deputy Superintendent of Exams:** They are appointed on a rotational basis to ensure the smooth conduct of semester examinations.
- **PIO:** S(he) addresses all RTI enquiries on behalf of the college.
- **EOC convener:** The convener ensures that the needs of the differently abled are factored in when policies are being formulated. S(he) co-ordinates with the EOC of the University.
- **Liaison Officer of SC/ST:** S(he) is appointed to protect the interests of SC/ST candidates.
- **Liaison Officer of OBC:** S(he) is appointed to protect the interests of OBC candidates.
- **NCC incharge**
- **NSS convener**
- **North-East Committee**
- **Internal Complaints Committee**
- **TICs:** all permanent members take on this role on a rotational basis for a period of 2 yrs.
- **Conveners and members of Committees:** Faculty members are part of various Staff Council and other committees constituted by the administrative head. Committees are formed democratically in the Staff Council Committee and report their working to the Staff Council regularly. To ensure greater participation, no faculty member is part of more than two committees. The college gives leadership

positions to young teachers so that they can hone leadership skills and bring fresh inputs into the system.

Officials from the lowest and the highest levels can initiate action and therefore play an important role in decision making. Thus a two way method of decentralisation works in the college. Any stakeholder of the college can make a request to the administration. When such request is made, the administrative assistant initiates a note. This is then vetted by the supervising officer in the concerned section and is then moved to the Principal through proper channel. The Head of the Institution, on verifying the requirement, sanctions the same and sends it back to the concerned person who has been assigned for processing the purchase and maintenance. In some cases, where expenses are conceived to be on the higher side, the same request is referred to the concerned Committees.

The second operational method flows from a higher to a lower unit of command. The Principal or any other faculty member suggests a course of action, viz. purchases, maintenances, organising seminars, workshops, conferences etc. The order is then passed from the higher to the lower level and the decision is implemented.

Students are duly represented in the Grievance Redressal Committee.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The college implements the quality policies formulated by our apex bodies, namely DU/UGC, from time to time. All stakeholders work in a concerted manner to ensure implementation of best practices:

- The college lays emphasis on enhancing the teaching-learning process through the use of innovative pedagogical methods and ICT.
- To address the curriculum-specific needs, the college and various departments, plan activities such as talks, tours, field visits etc.
- The college encourages peer learning among faculty members and students.
- The faculty members are motivated to undertake research projects in their areas of expertise for career enhancement and also to increase the knowledge bank of the institution. For instance, as a result of the collaboration between teachers and students from different departments in the DU Innovation Projects, two books were published. (Kindly refer to 3.4.1 for details)
- The college ensures that all financial and strategic decisions are taken as per DU/UGC norms.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Since the college operates on the premises owned by the Directorate of Higher Education, GNCT of Delhi, constraints are placed on any expansion plans envisioned.

The college has a development plan which includes the following:

Infrastructure upgradation

- The conversion of classrooms into chalk free zones has begun. The college has white boards in several classrooms and is planning to install them in all classrooms.
- The proposal for the upgradation of the college canteen is in the pipeline.
- The college plans to set up a gymnasium.
- There are plans to make the use of ICT more comprehensive.
- Access to N-LIST, which provides access to e-resources, will be available from the forthcoming academic session.
- The college plans to have an e-resource centre in the library.
- More books and journals, as per the evolving requirements of the syllabus, are being updated in the college library.

Course Expansion

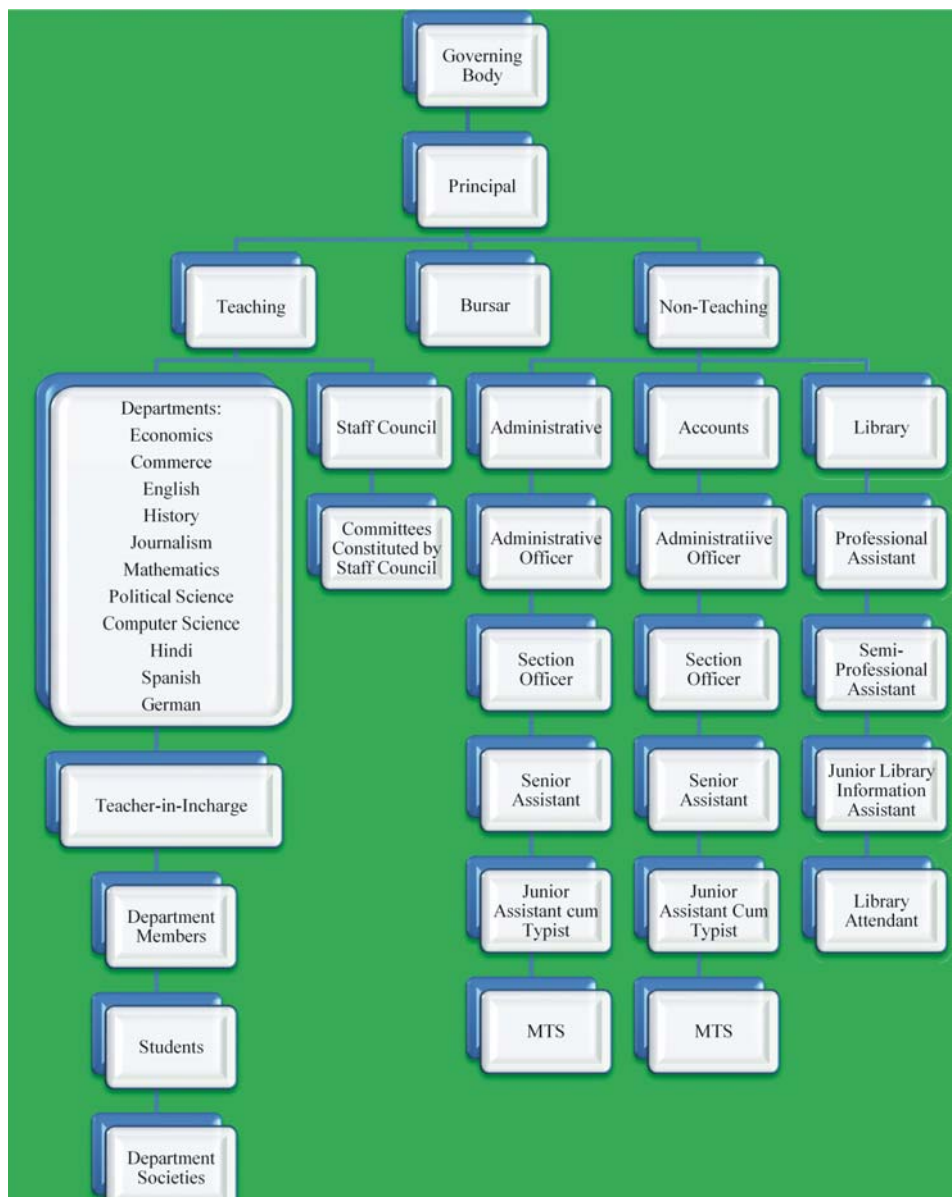
- Course expansion is already in the works: approval for B Sc (Mathematics) has been received, and the course will be operational from 2016-2017.

Other activities

- The college plans to make the alumni association more proactive, which, it anticipates, will facilitate a smoother industry interface for improved placement prospects for students.
- Many Innovation Projects were awarded to the college, and, it plans to continue with the same.
- The college has signed an MOU with NSDC to impart skill based training to students.

Decision making process

The GB plays a regulative and advisory role in the functioning of the college. It assists the Principal in executing all administrative activities. Meetings of the GB are held to take strategic decisions for the infrastructural and academic development of the institution.

The Principal, being the Chief Executive and Administrator, takes decisions pertaining to the day to day working of the college. The Staff Council, under his Chairmanship, forms various committees to assist him. However, these committees are independent with respect

to their functioning and decision making. The decisions taken by the committees are forwarded to the Principal who implements these recommendations after taking due approval from the GB.

At the departmental level, decisions pertaining to academic and extra-curricular activities are taken by the TIC, in consultation with other members.

The Students' Council/Union and other units (NCC, NSS, *Prakriti*, enactus etc.), in consultation with the Principal, the Students' Council/Union Advisor and concerned teacher in-charges, take decisions regarding sponsorship and the organisation of various events and activities.

Apart from the above the Principal co-ordinates with the IQAC to identify the problems and explore various alternatives, choosing the best course of action.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

• **Teaching & Learning**

The college understands the need to constantly evolve pedagogical tools for effective dissemination of knowledge. High quality teaching-learning is achieved through the following:

- White boards are being installed in classrooms to create chalk free zones.
- The college uses ICT as a pedagogical tool to facilitate blended learning.
- For the easy access of e-resources and other information the college has a wi-fi enabled campus.
- The college has three seminar rooms and an Multi-Purpose Hall/Auditorium which is used for academic and extra-curricular activities.
- The college tries to ensure that an appropriate student-teacher ratio is maintained.
- The college has an extensive and ever increasing library equipped with a large collection of books/journals/newspapers/magazines/dissertations and e-resources. (kindly see table 4.2.1)
- The college encourages teachers to attend training programmes so that they are equipped with the latest knowledge in their field, as well as with pedagogical techniques, and incorporate the same in their teaching process. (kindly refer to 2.4.3)
- Students are encouraged to participate in subject specific and inter-disciplinary seminars, workshops, conferences within the college as well as in inter-college

and inter-university events. Students regularly publish their work in various journals/magazines/newspapers. (kindly see table 4.3 (b))

- The EOC ensures that the needs of *divyang* are met (for ex. the college has 8 ramps with tactile paths in strategic locations, 3 washrooms, an EOC library, a LEXIC scanner and JAWS 13 in several laptops and computers for their use.

• Research & Development

The college lays emphasis on research for both students and teachers:

- Faculty members mentor students in DU Innovation Projects which promote inter-disciplinary and trans-disciplinary research (kindly see table 3.1.5 (b)).
- The media laboratory for the students of Journalism will be operational soon.
- Since the introduction of sabbatical leave in 2013, the college has encouraged teachers to avail of the same.
- The college encourages teachers to apply for, and undertake, major and minor research projects (kindly see individual department reports for details).
- Faculty members are reimbursed registration fee for paper presentations in national/international conferences and seminars as per DU/UGC guidelines.
- Faculty members are encouraged to take on roles as members of various academic and non-academic bodies, such as editorial and advisory boards.etc. in other organisations (kindly see department profiles for details)

• Community engagement

The college participates proactively in various community engagement activities:

- Students participate in community programmes and extension activities organised by NSS, EOC, *Prakriti*, enactus (please see 5.3.1).
- Many of the DU Innovation Projects undertaken by students and faculty have attempted to empower students and women from underprivileged and vulnerable sections of society. (please see table 3.1.10).
- The Dramatics Society regularly performs street plays in the wider community to raise awareness on social issues.
- Students and teachers collaborate with various NGOs like Bloodconnect, Muskaan and Save the Quest for a broader community engagement.

• Human resource management

Human resources play a very crucial role in any organisation. The college has a transparent working environment which ensures equal participation and a sense of equity among all stakeholders.

The college has the following policies and procedures to manage its human resources:

- Selection of faculty members and administrative staff is done as per DU/UGC guidelines.
- An Initiation Programme for the new appointees takes place wherein they are familiarised with the working and the rules and regulations of the institute.
- The faculty members are encouraged to attend FTP/FDP as per the requirements of promotions and skill enhancement.
- The administrative staff is also encouraged to attend training programmes on a regular basis.
- An award for the best non-teaching employee has been instituted to recognise their contribution in the college.
- Welfare schemes, as per DU/UGC guidelines, are provided to the employees of the college.
- All rules regarding leaves, pay, benefits and LTC etc. are granted according to DU/UGC guidelines.
- The roles, responsibilities and rights of staff are protected under rules laid down by the DU administration. Personal files and other information are well recorded and maintained.
- Faculty members interact with subject experts who are frequently invited to the college.
- The college makes ad-hoc and guest appointments as and when required.

• Industry interaction

- The Placement Cell, *Broadway*, is very proactive in facilitating campus placements for students (for its achievements kindly see table 5.1.9 (a)).
- The college organises regular industrial interactions, plant visits, corporate trips, thereby realising the goal of learning 'beyond the classroom.' This helps them bridge the gap between theory and practice. (kindly see department profiles for further details).

- As part of their curriculum students take up internships in industry.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

- A suggestion/complaint box is installed in front of the Principal's room where anyone can give suggestions and feedback. The Principal goes through them and forwards them to the relevant committee for action.
- The Principal has an open door policy; all stakeholders give their feedback to him on infrastructural, academic, administrative and financial matters of college. He forwards these to the GB for consideration as and when required.
- Faculty members raise issues and give feedback in various forums like the Staff Council and Staff Association meetings and in their personal interaction with the Principal and GB members.
- The Annual Report is an important mechanism whereby the Principal informs all stakeholders about the achievements and initiatives taken by the administration.
- The prospectus gives details about the college to prospective students and their guardians.
- Information regarding time tables, and other activities is communicated to the students on the Orientation Day. This information is also displayed in front of their respective classrooms and on the college website.
- Notice boards prominently display all activities and initiatives that are underway. Notices are also circulated among staff and students regularly.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

- As per DU rules, two members of staff and one member of the administration are part of the GB.
- Many committees both inside and outside the Staff Council ensure effective implementation of plans.
- The Principal communicates with the staff regularly through meetings, notices etc. to inform them of new initiatives being implemented. The Principal asks for inputs which are incorporated after discussions when consensus has been obtained.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

There is no provision of autonomy in DU rules and ordinances.

The college has an efficient grievance redressal mechanism. Since stakeholders, especially students have a variety of grievances, the nature of the grievances are often varied. Therefore, whenever a grievance is received, the authorities identify the nature of the grievance and forward it to the concerned committee for further action.

The Principal constantly interacts with students, guardians, representatives of the larger community, faculty and non-teaching staff members. Thus, he has first hand knowledge of their grievances and takes timely steps to resolve them. The Staff Council and its committees play an important role in resolving grievances as and when they arise. In case internal mechanisms are unable to resolve grievances they are placed before the GB. If some issues remain unresolved, they are forwarded to the University authorities.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

- The college adheres to all rules and regulations of DU/UGC when it comes to promotion of faculty
- Faculty members are encouraged to attend training programmes so that skill enhancement occurs constantly
- All faculty members are part of various college committees for 2 years on a rotational basis. Since they take on diverse responsibilities, job enrichment takes place.
- Since faculty members constantly organise talks, lectures etc. knowledge transfer occurs between different departments.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

At the time of promotion faculty members fill a self-appraisal form. It measures their performance on the following indices:

- Teaching, learning and evaluation related activities
- Co-curricular, extension and professional development related activities
- Research and Academic contribution

The performance of the administrative staff is annually assessed through the Annual Progress Appraisal Report (APAR). This is a multi-layered appraisal system where the staff member first does a self-appraisal, he/she is then further assessed by his/her reporting/reviewing officer. The final assessment is done by the reviewing officer who in case of AOs is the Principal.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

- Faculty members fill a self-assessment performa at the time of promotion. If there are any discrepancies these are communicated to the individual faculty member concerned.
- The findings of the APAR form are communicated to the concerned employee so that corrective action, if needed, can be taken.
- Presently there are no University guidelines over a formal system of taking feedback. Faculty members take informal feedback from students and incorporate their inputs in the teaching-learning process.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

All faculty recruitments are done as per DU/UGC norms, therefore the college has no role and method of attracting and retaining eminent faculty.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The college monitors effective and efficient use of available financial resources through the following measures:

- The Account Office keeps meticulous records of all financial transactions the college is involved in.
- The Accounts Office and the Bursar assist the Principal in supervising the maintenance and audit of various financial accounts. This ensures that financial propriety is maintained.
- The Internal and External Audit of accounts takes place as per rules and regulations. All audit compliances and objections are handled by the accounts department.
- All purchases recommended by the Purchase Committee and later made under the stewardship of the Principal are done as per GFR, 2005.
- The TICs, conveners of various committees, NCC incharge, NSS convener and the Student Council advisor closely monitor all expenses made by the concerned societies and cells.
- Teachers involved in DU Innovation Projects submit compliance and utilisation certificates and audited accounts to the Accounts Office.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The college conducts all internal and external audits as per norms.

Internal audit is done by a CA duly approved by the GB and DU. The last internal audit was done in March 2015. The audit for the financial year 2014-2015 is underway.

External audit : Since the college receives 5% of its funds from them, an audit team from DHE, GNCT of Delhi conducts an external audit once every two years. The last external audit was done in October 2013.

For audit objections and compliance report please see Annexure 6.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The major sources of institutional receipts/funding are:

- 95% funds are received from UGC
- 5% funds are received from DHE, GNCT of Delhi
- the college has fixed deposits
- fees collected from students
- the college receives sponsorship to conduct festivals
- the college receives fees from add-on courses

There is no deficit.

As per the audit report of 2013-2014 the reserve fund/corpus available with the institution is Rs. 4,07,98,015.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

Additional funds were received from the following sources:

- The College has received grant from UGC under Merged Scheme and Development Assistance during XI plan.

- The College also received separate funds for creating infrastructure under OBC expansion scheme.
- The college receives funds from various agencies like UGC and ICSSR to conduct seminars. The following seminars were held in the past four years: UGC seminars were conducted in association with Departments of Commerce, Economics and English. An ICSSR seminar was conducted by the Department of Political Science
- The college receives sponsorships for holding the college and departmental festivals. Strict monitoring of these is done.
- The college receives Rs. 20,000 every year from the Department of Environment, Government of Delhi for conducting activities of *Prakriti*, the environment society of the college, pertaining to environment conservation.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

The college IQAC was set up in March 2014 with the purpose of further improving the academic quality in the institution. Since the college IQAC is still in a truncated and infancy stage, it interfaces with stakeholders to identify and adopt best practices and thereby promote quality.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management / authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The following decisions of the IQAC were approved by the management for implementation:

- To approach the GB for starting new courses in the college.
- Establishment of Women's Cell in the college.
- It was decided that all departmental festivals will be held on weekends.

c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

At present the IQAC has no external members. However, once the process of the first cycle word of accreditation has been completed IQAC will be formulated as per stipulated guidelines.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

There are no students and alumni members in the IQAC. Once the process of the first cycle word of accreditation has been completed IQAC will be formulated as per stipulated guidelines.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC receives inputs from all stakeholders and deliberates upon them for further action.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes,' give details on its operationalisation.

The college strives constantly to deliver quality to all stakeholders. For this

- Rules and regulations laid down by DU/UGC are strictly followed to avoid ambiguity.
- The organisational structure ensures that reportage of critical activities and responsibilities are clearly assigned.
- Records of all academic and administrative activities are kept.
- All academic activities (classroom teaching, lectures, assessments etc.) are done as per schedule and timelines are met. Assessments are explained to students to remove ambiguity.
- In case of any grievance of any kind, relevant committees take up the issues and try to resolve it at the earliest.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If "yes," give details enumerating its impact.

The faculty and non-teaching members of the college attend training programmes regularly for innovative teaching-learning process and ICT skills. The impact of these training programmes is reflected in improved performance and greater efficiency in the overall working of the institution.

Faculty members constantly update their subject knowledge and pedagogic techniques. Two faculty members attended "Partners in Learning," a teacher training programme, conducted by Microsoft and ILLI in 2009. They then conducted two workshops for faculty members in the college in December 2009 and February 2010. The faculty participated enthusiastically in this ICT workshop. Non-Teaching members also attend workshops and training sessions constantly. For details please see table 6.3.1 (c). They bring the skills learnt into their working in the college.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The college does not have a formal mechanism for conducting academic audit. However the institution believes in focusing on improving the overall academic standards by continuously doing the following:

- the Staff Council and the Departments ensure that University guidelines and provisions on academic matters are adhered to.
- For further details on Teaching-Learning Evaluation kindly see Criteria 2 of the SSR.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

All decision in the college are done within the ambit of the rules and regulations laid down by DU/UGC.

- Internal audits are done prior to getting the external audit done.
- Various committees in the college ensure that all decisions are made as per DU/UGC guidelines
- The college organises academic and co-curricular programmes as per the calendar of the University.
- All ordinances of the University are strictly followed.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The faculty members employ different pedagogical methods in their teaching-learning activities. These are constantly reviewed and refined:

- At the time of promotion faculty members fill a self-appraisal form that delineates the pedagogical tools they use and the efficacy of the same.
- The Principal interacts with TICs and CRs at regular intervals.
- Timetables of teachers and departments are displayed on the college website.
- The college also has suggestion/feedback boxes located near the Principal's office and in the library.

These result in the following:

- The extension of ad-hoc teachers is done only on the recommendation of the concerned TIC.
- Since classes are held regularly, student attendance is monitored and uploaded on the college website.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The policies of the college are communicated in the following manner:

- Students are informed about institutional policies during the Orientation Day.
- Institutional policies are communicated to faculty members during Staff Council meetings and GB meetings.
- Relevant information is displayed on the various notice boards and also uploaded on the college website from time to time.

Outcomes are communicated in the Annual Report that is compiled at the conclusion of every academic year. It details the academic and co-curricular achievements of the internal stakeholders.

7.1 Environment Consciousness

The college has done a preliminary Green Audit of its campus. As per the report the following has been observed in the campus:

There is diverse plant life in the college campus, which includes different varieties of herbs, shrubs and trees. In addition to this the college also has approximately 838 potted plants placed at different locations in the college. Some of the potted plants include jasmine, harshingar, aloe vera, bougainvillea, pansies, croton, marigolds, euphorbia and different varieties of lilies, palms, roses, ficus, cactus etc.

Due to the high plant diversity the college attracts a lot of birds such as babblers, sparrows, pigeons, red vented bulbuls, etc.

Water

The college is primarily dependent on the municipal water supply. There are water conservation methods in place to prevent water wastage from overflow of the tanks and leakages through proper maintenance. The college also has a rainwater harvesting system which has a 200 ft pipe network. It has been functional since 2012-13 and has been effectively recharging the groundwater.

The college has several RO systems installed at various places for availability of clean water for students and staff.

Energy

There is proper ventilation and natural lighting in almost all the rooms in the college which reduces the usage of electricity. The classrooms are airy and well-ventilated which reduces the requirement of cooling systems during the summer months and limited to fans. All electrical devices and gadgets are carefully chosen to ensure BEE certification compliance. The lighting devices used are fluorescent based and yellow light is avoided. The college has a silent generator as power backup. It has a 82.5 KVA capacity and is fitted with an air filter and oil filter to ensure release of minimal pollutants. It also has an emergency stop and auto-cut system to switch off the generator when the electricity supply resumes. This ensures no wastage of fuel.

Waste

There is a paper recycling unit in the college which recycles the paper waste generated in the college campus, reducing the waste generation from the college.

Segregation of the waste is carried out using differently colour coded bins. The garden waste of the college is composted and converted into manure which is used in college gardens. The non-biodegradable plastic waste is used by the students of the Eco-club and the left-over is disposed off through the kabadiwala.

Air

The college has an open campus with large number of plants which purify the air. To ensure minimal particulate matter, the campus is cleaned on a daily basis. The generator used in the campus is fitted with air filters and maintained regularly. To maintain indoor air quality, dustless chalks are used and white boards are being used in some of the classrooms. There is a plan to change the black boards to white boards in all the classrooms.

Eco-club

The college has an Eco-club of the students called *Prakriti* which takes a lead in the environmental activities of the college. They began a paper recycling unit in the college. Last year it produced 500 sheets of paper from waste paper. The college recycles waste paper more efficiently through this project. *Prakriti* organises various awareness campaigns and programs in the college campus and surrounding areas.

*7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?**** Energy conservation**

- The classrooms in the new block have large windows and are airy. This reduces energy consumption.
- In an effort to reduce energy consumption, notices have been displayed in corridors, seminar rooms and staff room advising students, teachers and other members to shut off electrical points when they leave the room.
- Old fans have been replaced to reduce energy consumption.
- A false ceiling has been installed in the staff room to reduce energy bills.
- Regular servicing of electrical equipment is done to reduce energy wastage.
- The college has two switches for external lights so that they can be turned off when not needed.

*** Use of renewable energy**

- The college has a waste paper recycling plant to make handmade paper. In the last year 500 sheets of paper were made.

*** Water harvesting**

- The college has a water harvesting unit which is used to recharge ground water. It was constructed in 2012-2013. It has a 200 ft pipe and effectively recharges groundwater.

*** Efforts for Carbon neutrality**

- The college recycles waste paper in an attempt to reduce its carbon footprint and produced 500 sheets of recycled paper.
- The NSS wing of the college frequently carries out 'Clean and Green Drive' in the campus.
- *Prakriti*, the environment society of the college, carries out nature walks to sensitise people about environmental concerns.
- 'Green Railings' an initiative of *Prakriti* recycles PET bottles from the waste generated in the college canteen for decorative purposes. They also produced mini-plant pots that could be hung on the college railings to augment the college green cover.

- The garden waste of the college is composted and converted into manure which is used in college gardens.
- The non-biodegradable paper waste is recycled to produce usable paper in the college.
- Before Holi in 2015 students from *Prakriti* informed people about the harmful effects of chemical colours and educated them about the easy ways of making one's own organic colours.
- Under the campaign 'Each One! Plant One! Protect One!' *Prakriti* encourages stakeholders in the college to sow seeds in an effort to make the campus green.

Plantation

The college campus has abundant tree cover and boasts of a variety of native trees and plants. For a detailed list kindly see table 7.1.1 above.

- *Prakriti* and the NSS unit of the college carry out plantation drives inside and outside the campus from time to time.
- The college has a 'Herb Garden' and a 'Garden of Hope' where samples of our country's flora are planted in an attempt to conserve them.
- Under the 'Each One! Plant One! Protect One!' drive *Prakriti* has sown the seeds of various vegetables including Okra, Tomato, Chilli, Eggplant, Spinach etc.
- *Prakriti* conducts nature walks in the neighbourhood to sensitise people about the significance of plantation drives.

* Hazardous waste management

- As DCAC is not a science college no significant hazardous waste has been produced in the last four years. However the college has colour coded waste bins.

* e-waste management

- An e-waste collection and awareness drive was carried out by *Prakriti* in association with Chintan Environmental Research and Action Group. It collected 20 kgs of e-waste.
- The college has a designated e-waste basket where students can deposit their e-waste for environment friendly disposal.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

The following innovations were introduced in the last four years in the college:

- The college has earmarked the first day of every academic session as Orientation Day where students are made aware of institutional policies.
- *Broadway*, the placement cell of the college organises an Orientation Programme for the college students in the first week of August where it introduces students to its activities. Students involved in the Placement Cell make this presentation.
- The automation of the admission process has made it easier to extract a variety of information regarding students. This in turn facilitates easier communication with them and the decision making process.
- The college instituted an award for the non-teaching members of the staff to acknowledge their contribution in the smooth functioning of the institution and to motivate them.
- The entire campus is wi-fi enabled. In addition to this many classrooms were made ICT friendly so that blended learning could take place.
- The stationary shop/bookstore has made it easier to get photocopies, books, print outs and general stationary items etc for students and faculty members.
- The college has a professional counsellor who is available for all stakeholders to provide socio-psychological counselling.
- The cleanliness of the college campus has been outsourced to Sulabh International. It has made the campus cleaner than earlier.
- The college has a silent generator as power backup. It has a 82.5 KVA capacity and is fitted with an air filter and oil filter to ensure release of minimal pollutants. It also has an emergency stop and auto-cut system to switch off the generator when the electricity supply resumes, which ensures no wastage of fuel.
- Campus security has been outsourced to a professional agency. This has ensured that no outsiders gain unauthorised access to the college premises and has significantly improved discipline in the institution.
- No loud music is allowed after 5 p.m. during festivals organised by the Students Council and other societies so as not to inconvenience our neighbouring community. This in turn helps maintain cordial relations with them.

- Earlier girl students approached a designated person to get sanitary napkins for themselves. To maintain privacy and create a more efficient system a sanitary napkins dispensing machine has been installed in the Girl's Common Room.
- The college has a 'Herb Garden' as well as a 'Garden of Hope.' Students recharge themselves in its tranquil atmosphere.
- The students are encouraged to participate in Yoga initiatives organised by Mokash, the BA (Prog) Yoga society.
- The students of *Prakriti* conduct environmental surveys in the neighbouring areas to assess and raise general awareness on pressing environmental concerns among students. The society also conducts regular nature walks to apprise students about various environmental issues.
- The college has an active Placement Cell, *Broadway*, which is very active in making placements. (for details please see 5.1.9. (a))
- *Intellectual Resonance* gives faculty members a forum to publish their research work. Similarly *Swaram* provides students a platform to voice their views on various issues.
- The college website has been updated to display attendance, timetables and other information.
- The college has an institutional repository where Annual Reports, copies of *Intellectual Resonance*, publications of various departments, findings of Innovation Projects in book form and dissertations etc. are kept.
- The Women Cell addresses the concerns of female students and teachers.
- The college has got additional load sanctioned by NDMC which has resulted in reduction in power failure risk due to load sharing. This has also reduced the electricity bill of the college.
- To make the grievance redressal system more effective the college has three complaint boxes — one in front of the Principal's Office where students and stakeholders can register their suggestions/complaints on a variety of issues, there is another complaint box in the Library where students can register their complaints/suggestions concerning any aspect of the functioning of the Library; finally the college also has a complaint box *Nirbhik* installed by Delhi Police.
- After the construction of the new building, the library was shifted to the ground floor to make it convenient for the differently abled students to access it easily.

- The EOC is very proactive in addressing the concerns of the differently abled in the college. The college has built 8 ramps with tactile paths and grab handles, along with 3 washrooms to serve their needs. The corridor leading to the student's dealing area also has tactile paths and grab handles. The college has also earmarked 2 parking spaces for the differently abled inside the premises.
- JAWS 13 was introduced in the college to facilitate easy access of resources material for the visually challenged students.
- Automation of the college library has resulted in the maintenance of an automated database. It enables the library staff to maintain an updated record of journals, magazines, books etc. OPAC enables students to browse the library database in an efficient and precise manner.
- The college has a reading room for students and another for teachers.
- A Medical Room with a trained nurse was recently inaugurated in the college. Thus professional help is available to all stakeholders on the college campus.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices in the given format at page no. 98, which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

- Title of the Practice:** TanZeal
- Goal:** The holistic development of underprivileged children in nearby areas.
- The Context:** Two students from DCAC, Sukriti Sethi and Yashovardhan Verma felt that there was a lacuna in the education that students from economically strained sections were receiving. The students saw slum children playing in the slums where Hotel Leela has now come up. These were children of migrant labourers. Sukriti and Yash started talking with these children and realised that they too had dreams and were keen to learn. This gave them the idea to do something for them. They decided to start taking some classes with them in the college premises. One of their friends Tanzeel, passed away while on holiday. So they decided to name their endeavour TanZeal in his memory. They started TanZeal with 4 students from the neighbourhood in 2012. Today there are over 100 students who come regularly to the college in the afternoon. They are brought by the student volunteers who escort them back home, to their parents after class. Student volunteers take classes with these students regularly.
- The Practice:** In Project TanZeal the underprivileged children come to the centre five days a week from 2:30 to 4:30. Student volunteers take classes with these

students on many subjects. Some of the subjects they give mentoring on include: Mathematics, English and Hindi. The student volunteers go beyond merely academic teaching and also focus on the moral and personality development of their students. To facilitate their holistic development, student volunteers also encourage the students to participate in extra-curricular activities and hone their skills in dancing, singing and art talent once a week. The student volunteers noticed a marked improvement in their performance in their respective schools.

The volunteers also take students on regular outings to explore new places in Delhi. This expands their horizon and awareness. They were taken on a Metro ride, for a picnic to Safdarjung's Tomb. This year, the children were taken to visit Nehru Planetarium. Prior to this outing, the children were told about the stars, the various constellations, the planets, and the solar system. They greatly enjoyed their outing which enhanced their understanding of the night sky.

- (v) **Evidence of success:** The greatest evidence of success has been the improved performance of students in their respective schools. In fact, after the very first year of operations, the teachers of neighbouring schools were asking where their students were going since there was a marked improvement in their performance in school. Furthermore, students also give a live performance during the Annual NSS Mela, AADYA, held in the college premises. During the festival, students also showcase their talents and also what they have learnt during the year. Students also display and sell bookmarks, diyas etc. they make in their art classes during the festival. The money generated is used for purchasing more stationery products for the children every year. TanZeal organises outings every year. The trip to Nehru Planetarium this year helped them learn about stars and constellations.

The success of the project is also seen in the growth in number of volunteers who interact and teach the students. The project also has more children coming in every afternoon. A Dengue awareness session was conducted for the children and they were informed about the symptoms, cause, and prevention of the virulent disease.

Diwali celebrations this year included distribution of a small hamper of gifts to every child. The unit also conducted an immensely successful clothes donation drive called the "Spread the Warmth Campaign" wherein college students were encouraged to donate their old clothes which were then distributed to the children and their families. Christmas spread the magic of Santa as the children wrote and submitted wish-lists on pieces of paper.

- (vi) **Problems Encountered and Resources required:** It was difficult to convince students to participate in TanZeal in the beginning. However, once they were convinced all students participated whole-heartedly. There have never been any resource constraints since the college makes available all infrastructural resources for all activities of TanZeal.

Dr. V.B. Singh from the Department of Computer Science has also offered to conduct basic computer education classes with them to make them computer literate.

Title of the Practice: *Broadway*, the Placement Cell of the college.

- (ii) **Goal :** The college wants to give its students the best start in their professional life.
- (iii) **The Context:** The college has a pro-active Placement Cell, *Broadway*, constituted by the Staff Council, which works with the aim of providing a strong interlink between the corporate sector and the academia. The team of *Broadway* is a combination of experienced teachers and young minds who are representatives of various departments.
- (iv) **The Practice:** In the first week of August *Broadway* organises an orientation programme where it introduces students to its activities. Students involved in the Placement Cell make this presentation. Freshers are informed about salient features to be kept in mind while preparing for an interview – the appropriate dress code, how to write an impressive CV in terms of length and content, and also on how to speak while giving an interview. All this information is disseminated to students through a powerpoint presentation. After this presentation there is a Q&A session where the Placement convener answers any queries raised by the students. During the course of the year *Broadway*, organizes various seminars and workshops on career guidance and conducts placement sessions from time to time.

Companies approach the Placement Cell Convener for holding pre-placement talks and interviews. Interested organisations give details of their profile, job description and CTC to the placement convener who then posts the relevant information on the Facebook page (<https://www.facebook.com/broadwaydcacplacementcell>) so that all interested students can access it. A Google form is created through which interested students apply. The Google form is converted to excel sheet which is sent to the concerned company which interviews them when it comes to the college. The Placement Cell takes care of all hospitality issues while placements are going on. Companies with varied profiles come to the college for placements in the fields of finance, accounting, marketing, sales, computers, audit, research background, journalism, creative writing and content writing. When companies come to DCAC for placements they inform students about their requirements and emerging jobs in the market.

In the pre-placement seminars the company informs students about their requirements and emerging jobs in the market. Student placement coordinators are appointed from each stream to be part of the placement cell. This cell trains students in various activities like the art of writing CVs, career opportunities in

various sectors, etc. Mock interviews and group discussions are also organized to give the students a real feel of what the placements are going to be all about. Not only does this give them the required inputs, but also goes miles in improving their confidence levels.

- (v) **Evidence of success:** The highest offer received for students was Rs. 7 lacs. The Cell does not entertain companies offering a CTC of less than Rs. 2.4 lacs. To ensure that all students get an opportunity to participate, no student can accept more than 2 proposals.

Another sign of success has been the fact that most companies visit the campus again and again since they are extremely satisfied with the students they have employed. Moreover, every year more companies want to come to DCAC for campus for placements.

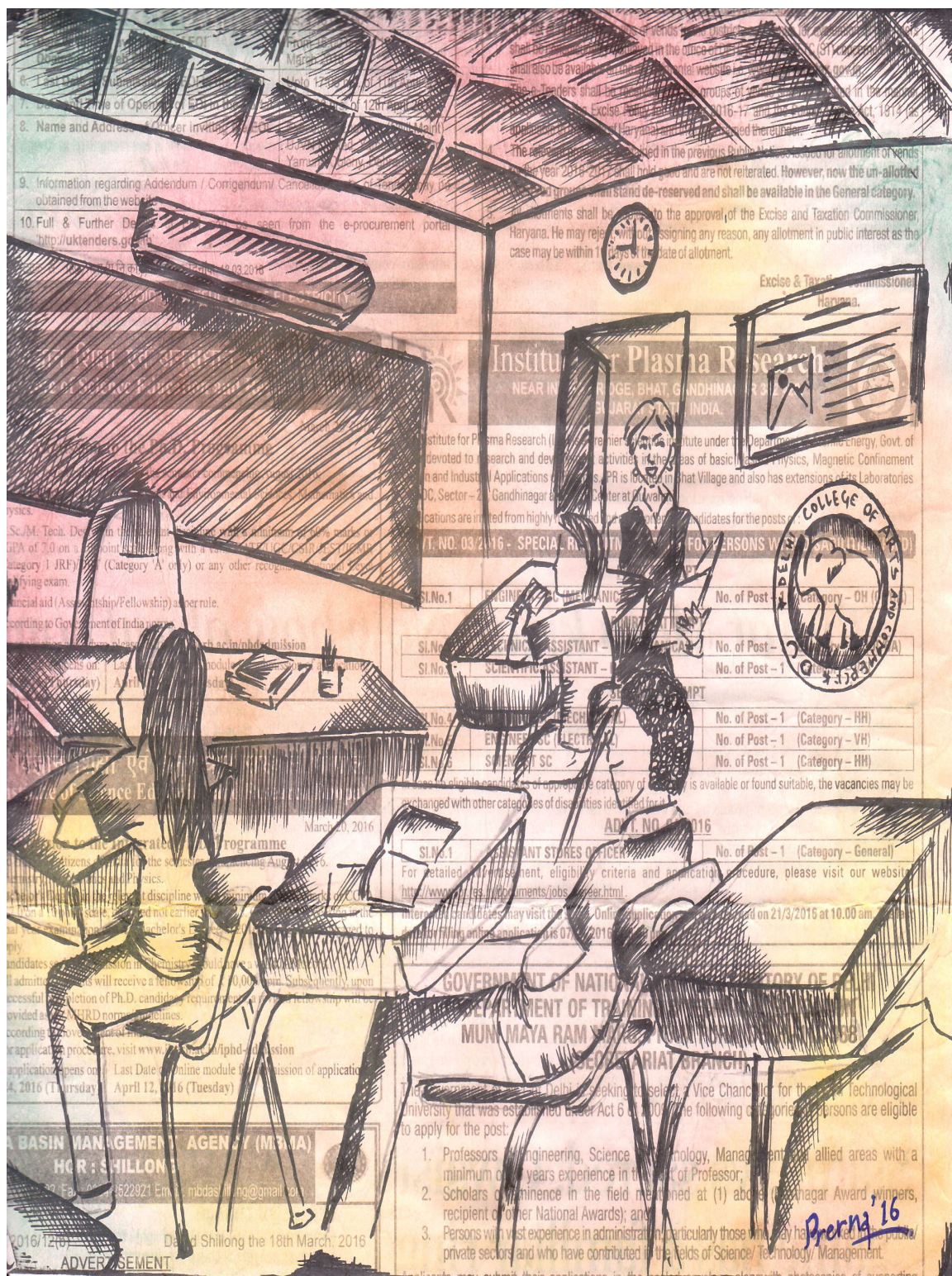

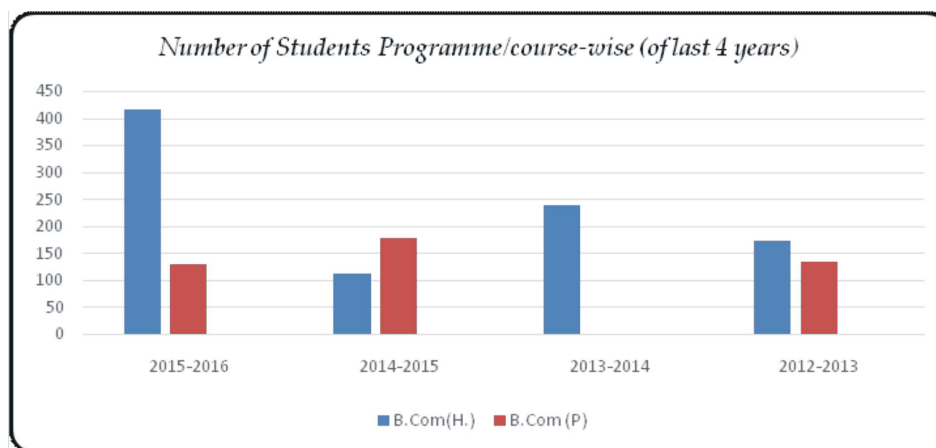

(a) Library:

- The college has a well-stocked library having more than 43,000 books. It has very good collection of books on Commerce and Management.

- The library is equipped with the state of art technology i.e. NETTLIB software, OPAC facility in addition to spacious reading rooms.
- Separate enclosure for faculty members.
- It is equipped with DU network of e-resources available through DULS.

(b) Internet facilities for staff and students:

- The college is Wi-Fi enabled.
- More than 700 laptops and 100 desktops, with internet facilities are available for faculty members and students for teaching/research/other related purposes.
- College has four Computer Laboratories for students and one computer room facility dedicated for teachers, for easy access of internet and for all the computational work.

(c) Class rooms with ICT facility:

- More than 20 classrooms have multimedia LED projectors.
- There are 3 seminar rooms with the same facility used for project presentations from time to time.

(d) Laboratories (Computer Lab):

- Four computer labs with more than 100 desktops are available for students with internet facility to work on their assignments.

- *One computer lab*, called the *UGC Resource Centre* is a lab for faculty members, with more than 10 desktops, with printing and internet facility.
- *One state-of-the art Media Lab*(called *CONNECT*) which can be used for video production, still photography, video editing, radio programming and other production related activities. The construction of the media lab is complete with necessary infrastructure such as fixtures and fittings, noise-proof walls, newsroom studio furniture set-up etc. The process for procuring camera, audio and editing equipment is underway.
- *One computer lab*, in the Enabling Unit of college's *Equal Opportunity Cell*, which is a lab for students with disabilities. It has 10 desktops and 17 laptops, all equipped with reading software (JAWS version 13) and the internet. The lab has a printer and state-of-the art LEXIC scanner which is multi-purpose equipment that can scan and read any written material (including handwritten material) in any language.

Kunal Jaitly, Ashvin Bhatia and Vaibhavee Katial were elected for the post of President, VP and GS respectively for the session 2015-16.

The Society organizes various departmental activities/events such as the Annual inter-college fest QUEST, lecture series via the *Friday School of Economics*, departmental fresher's and farewell get-togethers etc. **The Annual Economics Festival, QUEST** stems from the purpose to create a platform where students from various walks of life display their creative as well as entrepreneurial skills

in a coherent setup. It is a two day extravaganza that generally takes place in the months of February/March. Preparations start as early as December, which includes laying groundwork for various events, getting suitable sponsorship and online and offline promotion to attract students from various colleges in and around Delhi. Quest draws its inspiration from the theme- *WHERE THE CORPORATE MEETS THE CREATIVE*. A plethora of events are put in place including both educational & brain teasing events and some fun & creative events.

Students of the department actively participate in the forum called **the Friday School of Economics**, which is an interactive discussion forum, for anyone and everyone who is even slightly intrigued by economics and related issues. The idea is to enrich ourselves through talks, discussions, workshops and to be able to think out of the box. In the academic year of 2015-16, four guest speakers delivered lectures on a wide array of topics ranging from political economy to the working of capital markets. It is a platform where students get to interact with speakers from various fields to learn more about the working of an economy.

The **department newsletter Ecosystem** is published annually at the session end. It provides a look into all the events that took place in the year gone by. Written, compiled and edited by the students with special inputs from the teachers, the newsletter perfectly captures the year in a snapshot and provides a suitable platform to share one's ideas and views on a wide range of topics.

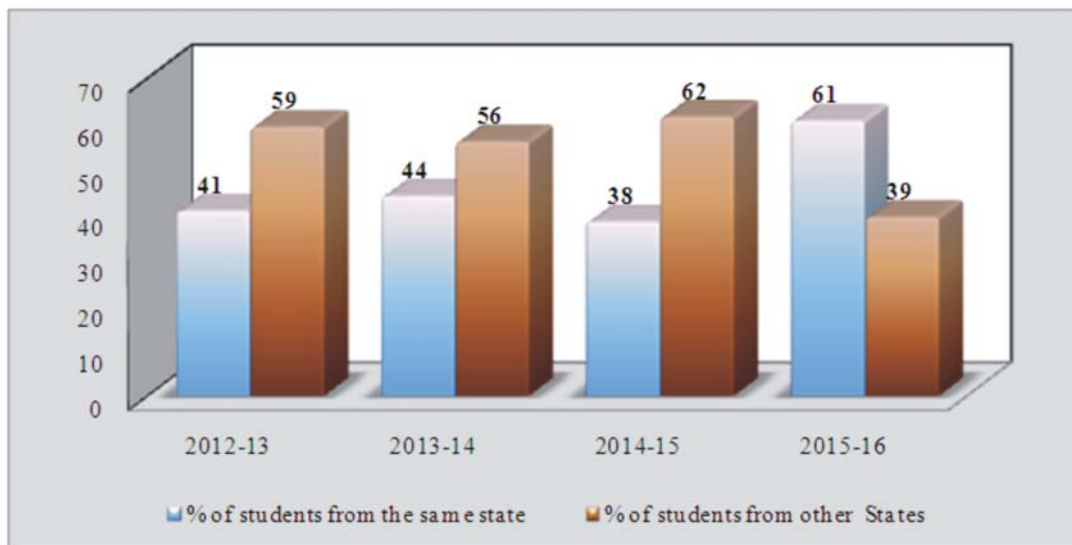

30. Details of Infrastructural Facilities:

- (a) **Library:** The college has a fairly large library housing more than 43,000 books, including adequate number of books for the Department of Economics. Journals such as *Economic & Political Weekly*, *Yojana* etc. apart from numerous books of inter-disciplinary nature and very useful for faculty and students of the department. During the last four years, the library has added nearly 350 books on Economics. The library is equipped with the state of art technology i.e. NETTLIB software, OPAC facility in addition to spacious reading rooms. There is a separate enclosure for faculty members. It is equipped with DU network of e-resources available through DULS. It has subscribed to UGC-NLIST for a year that will become operational from April 2016 onwards.
- (b) **Internet facilities for staff and students:** The entire college is Wi-fi enabled. There are more than 700 laptops which are issued to faculty members and students as and when required. Faculty members issue laptops for classroom teaching and other research related work. Further, more than 100 desktop computers are available in five computer labs. One computer lab, called the 'UGC Resource Centre' is a lab exclusively for faculty members, with more than 10 desktops, with internet facility.
- (c) **Class rooms with ICT facility:** There are 21 classrooms with multimedia projectors. There are 3 big seminar/committee rooms with the same facility used for project presentations from time to time. There is one multipurpose hall/auditorium with audio-video facility that is utilized for large group sessions.
- (d) **Laboratories:**
- Four computer labs with more than 100 desktops are available for students with internet facility to work on their assignments.
 - One computer lab, called the 'UGC Resource Centre' is a lab exclusively for faculty members, with more than 10 desktops, with internet facility.
 - One state-of-the art Media Lab which can be used for video production, still photography, video editing, radio programming and other production related activities. The construction of the media lab is complete with necessary infrastructure such as fixtures and fittings, noise-proof walls, newsroom studio furniture set-up etc. The process for procuring camera, audio and editing equipment is underway.

- (iv) *One computer lab*, in the Enabling Unit of college's *Equal Opportunity Cell*, which is a lab for students with disabilities. It has 10 desktops and 17 laptops, all equipped with reading software (JAWS version 13) and the internet. The lab has a printer and state-of-the art LEXIC scanner which is multi-purpose equipment that can scan and read any written material (including handwritten material) in any language.

32. Details on student enrichment programmes (special lectures/workshops/seminar) with external experts:

Special lectures are arranged in college for students from time to time. These include lectures organised during major events such as the departmental festival or UGC-sponsored seminar and those organised regularly under the '*Friday School of Economics*' (FSE). FSE is a weekly discussion forum of students (under the able-supervision of the current Teacher-in-charge, Mr. Mr. Bir Singh), where diverse issues pertaining to economics and society are discussed, and where eminent

scholars are invited from time to time to enlighten the students and faculty members on recent developments in various sectors of the economy. It is a liberal platform for budding thinkers where students execute all activities of holding sessions on weekly basis with some exceptions. The selection of topics for lectures, talks and discussions is done democratically by its editorial committee of the students. FSE, above all, is forum for building a vibrant network of thinking beings who aspire for promoting good human values in the society. It believes in creating a beautiful human society by raising tolerant, wise, compassionate and visionary students for addressing and resolving socio-economic problems of our beloved country as well as humanity.

33. Teaching methods adopted to improve student learning:

Certain lectures involve use of ICT and most project presentations by students are evaluated after individual presentations are made by the students. Group assignments conducted during some tutorial sessions promote team-building capabilities in students. Classroom group discussions are encouraged and attempts are made to engage all students in such discussions.

34. Participation in institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) and extension activities:

- (i) Students of Department of Economics have actively participated in Delhi University's Innovation Projects over the years. The most recent project (project code DCAC301) which aims at skill development of marginalized urban women, engages the students in working closely with the marginalized urban community. They have surveyed families living in the JJC colony and servant quarters in the vicinity of college to identify inherent traditional skills and the

potential for further skill enhancement. Several training workshops for skill enhancement have been conducted on-site and in college. The students not only train the women and monitor their progress, they also help these women in marketing their products through various college fests, fairs during festivals and also online sources (website for details: www.facebook.com/kshamtaadcac).

- (ii) Eight students from Economics department served as student research associates of DU Innovation Project (code DCAC 201), titled “Creating a More Enabling Environment for Differently-abled Students in Universities in Delhi through a Dropout Prevention Programme”. They analyzed secondary and primary data pertaining to enrolment and dropout of differently-abled students in selected Undergraduate colleges of Delhi University, to understand the link between their academic performance and the constraints / problems they face in terms access to facilities, peer group interaction in college, family backing etc. The student research associates were instrumental in the construction of first of its kind ‘Online Portal’ (ie. www.facebook.com/enabledthedisabled), which enables the differently-abled students to secure help for their academic pursuits from volunteers. This portal allows instant communication between its registered members, who post their requests for scribes, readers, audio files etc., which is instantly communicated to all its members, thus enabling quick response.
- (iii) Project TanZeal, an initiative under the NSS unit of DCAC was initiated in the year 2012 with the main aim of making underprivileged kids self-competent in the basic languages (Hindi and English) and Mathematics, to nurture their young minds and to teach them some life skills. A dedicated team of around 50 volunteers, including students from the Department of Economics, holds evening classes in the college campus everyday, where these children engage in studies and extra-curricular activities. The college provides an easy access to all the facilities, such as classrooms, front and back lawns and computer labs in support of the project. These children are occasionally given access to the computer lab to facilitate familiarity with technology. Over the years, the project has gone strength to strength, with the number of children covered by the project increasing from about 10 to approximately 60 this year. At the end of each semester, the kids are taken for an educational-cum-fun trip. Children also enthusiastically perform in the Social Fest *Aadya* and mesmerize the crowd with their dancing and singing skills.
- (iv) Mr. Bir Singh of Economics Department has been running the Centre for Inclusive Development (CID) since the year 2010. CID aims at strengthening

education base of children who are enrolled in government schools or ill-equipped private schools. With a view to resolve problem of unemployment, it targets school drop outs to learn livelihood skills. It has been working at grass root level of villages and has helped few students getting through competitive exams and completing technical courses so far. Some of the major achievements of CID have been:

- a. It addresses education needs of children going to government schools and sub-standard private schools by providing free evening classes for these students on a daily basis
- b. The students are connected to various skill development institutions such as NSIC, MSME, and ATDC
- c. Classes for various competitive exams such as SSC, IBPS, Railways, and SSB etc. are conducted for needy and poor students
- d. A library is operational for instilling academic habits in students
- e. Research is carried out on various socio-economic issues which have wide ranging implications for empowerment of people

35. SWOC analysis of the Department and future plans:

- (a) **Strengths:** Economics is one of the most popular and sought after course in DU. The Department of Economics at DCAC has continuously strived to provide the best possible training to students enabling them to excel in the field. Well qualified faculty members ensure that the training provided to our students is one of the best. Our faculty does a lot of mentoring of the students both in terms of guiding them through the courses and helping them make decisions about their future course of action.

Our students are encouraged to explore the field beyond the syllabus via their engagement in lectures and debates organized under the *Friday School of Economics*, where eminent people in the field are invited to give a talk and interact with the students. Additionally students also get involved with the faculty projects and often, research projects outside the university which gives them well rounded training in the field of economics beyond the texts taught in class. In particular, involvement of the students with the department innovation projects has instilled tremendous confidence in them. We have seen students evolve from being shy and under-confident at the beginning of the project to being very confident and handling a large portion of the project independently by the end of it. Our students' Economics Society *Ecolibrium*,

independently organises the Economics fest. This provides the students with a good idea of the functioning of the world and prepares them for life after college.

This approach of the department has helped us get the best out of our students and our results have continuously improved. To summarize, the strengths of our department include:

1. Trained and motivated mix of vibrant young and experienced teaching staff.
2. Distinction of students.
3. Excellent results in terms of percentage marks obtained by students

(b) **Weaknesses:** Due to lack of tutorial rooms, the department sometimes finds it a constraint to engage as much with the students as the faculty wants to. In addition, inspite of wanting to offer the many optional courses that are listed by the University, we are unable to do so due to logistics. Additionally, due to being an off-campus college in a relatively secluded location, we sometimes find it difficult to attract big sponsors for events like the Economics fest organised by our students.

(c) **Opportunities:**

- The department has been attracting a large number of students from other states of India. Their mathematical training and understanding/ spoken skill of English is sometimes lesser than what is required for the program. The department strives to bridge this gap by engaging more with these students and provide them extra time/ sessions to bridge the gap.
- The department also aims to engage students and faculty members in capability building among rural and marginalised students in Delhi & NCR region through the *Centre for Inclusive Development* operational since 2010. This, we believe will widen the focus of our students by exposing them to students that are not as privileged and will also give them practical experience of applying what they learn in class about equity, public goods and efficient utilization of resources. Thus, classroom teaching that we do, will become inclusive in true sense.
- Offer more electives that provide students with a professional edge and also introduce students to some research by introducing projects/ minor reports and presentations in the marking scheme.

- (d) **Challenges:** Non availability of course books in Hindi is a big constraint for students who are not fluent in English. Additionally we feel tied down by our limited infrastructure in terms of lack of software, which we feel constrains our practical teaching of certain portions of the course. Another challenge for us is to create opportunities for students to gain exposure through more interactions with field experts and academicians
- (e) **Future Plans:** The department aims to further encourage collaborative research between faculty and students. To do so we plan to organise field trips for primary data collection by the students that can then be used by them for either minor projects or for conducting research with the faculty.

30. Details of Infrastructural Facilities:

- (a) **Library:** The college has a fairly large library housing more than 43,000 books, including adequate number of books for the Department of English. During the last four years, the library has added nearly 250 books on English. The library is equipped with the state of art technology i.e. NETTLIB software, OPAC facility in addition to spacious reading rooms. There is a separate enclosure for faculty members. It is equipped with DU network of e-resources available through DULS. It has subscribed to UGC-NLIST for a year that will become operational from April 2016 onwards.

- (b) **Internet facilities for staff and students:** The entire college is Wi-fi enabled. There are more than 700 laptops which are issued to faculty members and students as and when required. Faculty members issue laptops for classroom teaching and other research related work. Further, more than 100 desktop computers are available in five computer labs.
- (c) **Class rooms with ICT facility:** There are 21 classrooms with multimedia projectors. There are 3 big seminar/committee rooms with the same facility used for project presentations from time to time. There is one multipurpose hall/auditorium with audio-video facility that is utilized for large group sessions.
- (d) **Laboratories:**
- (i) Four computer labs with more than 100 desktops are available for students with internet facility to work on their assignments.
 - (ii) One computer lab, called the 'UGC Resource Centre' is a lab dedicated for faculty members, with more than 10 desktops, with internet facility.
 - (iii) One state-of-the art Media Lab which can be used for video production, still photography, video editing, radio programming and other production related activities. The construction of the media lab is complete with necessary infrastructure such as fixtures and fittings, noise-proof walls, newsroom studio furniture set-up etc. The process for procuring camera, audio and editing equipment is underway.
 - (iv) One computer lab, in the Enabling Unit of college's Equal Opportunity Cell, which is a lab for students with disabilities. It has 10 desktops and 17 laptops, all equipped with reading software (JAWS version 13) and the internet. The lab has a printer and state-of-the art LEXIC scanner which is multi-purpose equipment that can scan and read any written material (including handwritten material) in any language.

In a Session, to discuss gender issues, the representatives of *He for She*, a UN initiative for gender equality addressed the students.

- A Creative Writing Workshop AFLUTTER for students was organised on 24th September 2015 in association with the online publishing portal, “Story Mirror” where eminent author Mr. Kulpreet Yadav, of such noted novel as *The Girl who loved a Pirate*, held a day-long session with students.
- On 6th March, 2014, at Pantheon, the English Literary Association Festival, Panel discussion on the topic- ‘Aesthetics of a Sentence: Defining the 21st Century Indian Novel.’ The panelist on the topic included Mr. Suman Bhattacharya Mr. K .Unni, Dr. Anuradha Marwah and Dr. Gautam Choubey. The discussion was moderated by senior professor Dr. Smita Banerjee.
- 4 March 2013, at Pantheon, the English Literary Association Festival,, Panel Discussion on the new 4 year Undergraduate Programme. The discussants included Faizal Beg and Marry Anne Bobinski, from University of British Columbia.
- 5 March 2013 Panel Discussion on how literature has always inspired cinema. Discussants were Anna Vetticad, a film-journalist and the author of the book ‘*The Adventures of an Intrepid Film Critic*’, Ajay Bahl, whose film *B.A. Pass* has won various awards in the global festival circuit and is gearing up for a May theatrical release and Avijit Dutt a well-known actor, filmmaker and theater-person who has been a part of films like Raj Kumar Gupta’s *No One Killed Jessica* and Deepa Mehta’s *Fire*. The discussion was moderated by senior Faculty Dr. Smita Banerjee.
- The Department organized a two day long Festival “Epiphany” on 1 & 2 March, 2012. Dr. Poonam Trivedi spoke on Shakespeare and Drama. On this occasion a book exhibition was organized by the students of English Honours on Banned Art and the eminent writer Ms. Mridula Garg, who is feted at various Literary Festivals was invited to speak. Mridula Garg is a famous Indian writer who writes in both Hindi and English languages.
- The Department organized a 2nd English Literary fest “Literati” 2011. Three eminent personalities Dr. Aruna Chakravarti, (writer, translator and former Principal of Janki Devi College), Dr. Minoti Chatterjee (Principal of Kamla Nehru College,) and Ms. Avereer Chaurey (well known theater personality) were invited. Dr. Minoti Chatterji and Ms. Avereer Chaurey rendered a reading of Dr. Aruna Chakravarti’s novel “*The Inheritors*”. The students organized an Exhibition on “Contemporary Indian Literary Scene”.

34. Participation in Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) and Extension Activities:

- (i) Students of Department of English have actively participated in Delhi University's Innovation Projects over the years. The most recent project (project code DCAC301) which aims at skill development of marginalized urban women and engages the students in working closely with the marginalized urban community. The Team has surveyed families living in the JJC colony and servant quarters in the vicinity of college to identify inherent traditional skills and tapped their potential for further skill enhancement. Several training workshops for skill enhancement have been conducted on-site and in college. The students not only train the women and monitor their progress, they also help these women in marketing their products through various college festivals, fairs during festivals and also online sources (website for details: www.facebook.com/kshamtaadcac).
- (ii) Project TanZeal, an initiative now under the NSS unit of DCAC was initiated in the year 2012 by two of our students Swikriti Singh & Yashvardhan Verma, in memory of their classmate. The primary aim of the project was to make the underprivileged kids self-competent in the basic languages (Hindi and English) and Mathematics, to nurture their young minds and to teach them some life skills. A dedicated team of around 50 volunteers, including students from departments other than English, hold evening classes in the college campus everyday, where these children engage in studies and extra-curricular activities. The college provides an easy access to all the facilities, such as classrooms, front and back lawns and computer labs in support of the project. These children are occasionally given access to the computer lab to facilitate familiarity with technology. Over the years, the project has gone from strength to strength, with the number of children covered by the project increasing from about 10 to approximately 60 this year. At the end of each semester, the children are taken for an educational-cum-fun trip. Children also enthusiastically perform in the Social Festival *Aadya* and mesmerize the crowd with their dancing and singing skills.

- Since a paper of English Literature cuts across many genre, age and location, we engage more than one teacher to teach a paper so as to offer multiple perspective on issues and ideas to the students.
- The Department boasts of a Creative Writer Dr. Devika Narula with many published volume of Poetry, and in the process of publishing her first Novel. 200 copies of Dr. Devika (Khanna) Narula's Critical Book *South Asian Diaspora: Summer Blossoms in Winter Gardens* were purchased by Central Institute of English and Foreign Languages, Lucknow for distribution to 200 Government funded Libraries across India in March, 2007.
- The Department Teachers put in extra efforts to improve English Language Proficiency for students from underprivileged sections of society by conducting an add on English Language Proficiency Course, Basic Level (University of Delhi) after college hours to give students practice in using English in a wide variety of contexts relevant to work, study and social activities. Dr. Anita Bhela coordinated the course.

Weaknesses:

- Infrastructural constraints to offer high quality research facility.

- We do not yet possess a department library which would allow close interaction with students so as to provide them a book bank/ closely monitor their reading & suggest books/make reading material easily accessible to students/pool in resources.

Opportunities:

- The increasing focus on Inter-disciplinarity offers great opportunity to students to adopt a multidisciplinary approach to the subject.
- The wide choice of subjects available to students under CBCS can be maximised

Challenges:

- Providing support to students towards research becomes a huge challenge for the department due to limited infrastructure and other facilities

Future Plans:

- To introduce Add On courses like one on Film Studies & Creative Writing
- To Revive English Language Proficiency Course in College

30. Details of Infrastructural Facilities:

- (a) **Library:** We have a very well equipped library. Around 200 books of German including grammar, workbooks, skill development books have been added to the collection in last four years. Most text books have an audio CD along with them. The library is equipped with the state of art technology i.e. NETTLIB software, OPAC facility in addition to spacious reading rooms. There is a separate enclosure for faculty members. It is equipped with DU network of e-resources available through DULS. It has subscribed to UGC-NLIST for a year that will become operational from April 2016 onwards.

- (b) **Internet facilities for staff and students:** The entire college is Wi-fi enabled. There are more than 700 laptops which are issued to faculty members and students as and when required. Faculty members issue laptops for classroom teaching and other research related work. Further, more than 100 desktop computers are available in five computer labs.
- (c) **Class rooms with ICT facility:** There are 21 classrooms with multimedia projectors. There are 3 big seminar/committee rooms with the same facility used for project presentations from time to time. There is one multipurpose hall/auditorium with audio-video facility that is utilized for large group sessions.
- (d) **Laboratories:**
- (i) Four computer labs with more than 100 desktops are available for students with internet facility to work on their assignments.
 - (ii) One computer lab, called the 'UGC Resource Centre' is a lab dedicated for faculty members, with more than 10 desktops, with internet facility.
 - (iii) One state-of-the art Media Lab which can be used for video production, still photography, video editing, radio programming and other production related activities. The construction of the media lab is complete with necessary infrastructure such as fixtures and fittings, noise-proof walls, newsroom studio furniture set-up etc. The process for procuring camera, audio and editing equipment is underway.
 - (iv) *One computer lab, in the Enabling Unit of college's Equal Opportunity Cell, which is a lab for students with disabilities. It has 10 desktops and 17 laptops, all equipped with reading software (JAWS version 13) and the internet. The lab has a printer and state-of-the art LEXIC scanner which is multi-purpose equipment that can scan and read any written material (including handwritten material) in any language.*

The department always encourages students of various streams for an effective teaching and learning process. For this, department has adopted different methods, including lecture method, power point presentations, quiz and role making methods to inculcate knowledge. 35. SWOC analysis of the Department and future plans:

- (a) **Strengths:** The faculty is dynamic, experienced and passionate towards teaching and research. All faculty members are involved in interdisciplinary

research and teaching. The faculty members adopt a focused approach towards guiding students in understanding the concepts of the syllabi and contemporary issues. The students are encouraged to attend seminars/ conferences/ summer-training programs and workshops to enhance their exposure to language and literature and keep them abreast with the latest developments in relevant fields.

(b) Weaknesses:

- The class rooms assigned to the Department are not equipped with projectors, which is a serious obstacle in the effective teaching-learning process.
- Since many students who opt for Hindi as a discipline belong to the weaker section of the society, lack of financial assistance at the college level for research-related activities is a weak area which needs serious attention.

(c) Opportunities: The department engages with a mixed lot of students from different courses who are involved in various interdisciplinary activities. There has been an increase in demand for students with good skills in Hindi language due to the growth of media industry and academia. The department also encourages such students who want to pursue their studies in media or academics. The learning skills of our students are well developed which enables them to pursue further education in premier institutions of the country.

(d) Challenges: There is the need to identify area(s) where we can be a pioneer, A resource to the University like partnership of alumni can be a appropriate motivation for the students. Shortage of funds, rooms, and absence of an Honours course in Hindi pose a big challenge to conduct seminars, workshop and other related academic activities.

(e) Future Plans:

30. Details of Infrastructural Facilities:

- (a) **Library:** The College Library caters to the needs of wide range of students by maintaining fairly large number of books in both Hindi and English medium. Besides this, it has also implemented bar code computerized circulation system for the convenience of the students. The college library also provides online library facilities such as online journal, books and web OPAC interface which anyone can use to browse through the books, periodicals and other library resources. - (a) **Library:** The college is equipped with a well-functioning and adequately stocked library with over 43,000 books. The Department of Journalism has sufficient number of books for its students in the library. In addition to this, the students also access journals such as *The Economic and Political Weekly*, and also make use of other journals subscribed by the college library for research purposes. Every year the department of Journalism adds new editions and relevant books in the library for the benefit of students and teachers. In the last four years, 61 new books have been added to the existing collection of journalism and mass communication books. The college library is equipped with the latest library database management system such as NETLIB and OPAC to make library access easier for students and teachers.
- (b) **Internet facilities for staff and students:** The college has provided every faculty member with internet connectivity over WiFi as well as desktops and laptops for their perusal. The faculty has access to college laptops for classroom lectures and for other related work. Additionally desktops with internet connectivity are also available to students in four computer labs.
- (c) **Class rooms with ICT facility:** Around 20 classrooms in the college are equipped with overhead multimedia projectors for teaching. These projectors are used for class presentations, film screenings, and other audio-visual material for teaching. The college also houses three seminar/committee rooms for meetings, presentations and other events as and when required.
- (d) **Laboratories: Media Lab** – The college has a state-of-the art Media Lab which can be used for video production, still photography, video editing, radio programming and other production related activities. The construction of the media lab is complete with necessary infrastructure such as fixtures and fittings, noise-proof walls, newsroom studio furniture set-up etc. The process for procuring camera, audio and editing equipment is underway.

30. Details of Infrastructural Facilities:

- (a) **Library:** The College library maintains an exhaustive number of books (Both in English & Hindi Medium) and journals, magazine as well as various national and local news papers (English & Hindi). Faculty members and students also have access to a number of online journals, books, and libraries through University of Delhi's online Library, where every faculty member and student is provided with a personalized ID and password.
- (b) **Internet facilities for staff and students:** The college is Wi-Fi enabled with good numbers of desktops and laptops with Internet facilities are available for Staff and Students at all times for teaching/research/other work purposes. Further, the College has 4 Computer Laboratories and 1 computer room facility for teachers all the time for easy access of internet and for all the computational work
- (c) **Class rooms with ICT facility:** There are more than twenty classrooms that are equipped with multimedia projectors.
- (d) **Laboratories:**
 - (i) Four computer labs with more than 100 desktops are available for students with internet facility to work on their assignments.
 - (ii) One computer lab, called the 'UGC Resource Centre' is a lab dedicated for faculty members, with more than 10 desktops, with internet facility.
 - (iii) One state-of-the art Media Lab which can be used for video production, still photography, video editing, radio programming and other production related activities. The construction of the media lab is complete with necessary infrastructure such as fixtures and fittings, noise-proof walls, newsroom studio furniture set-up etc. The process for procuring camera, audio and editing equipment is underway.
 - (iv) *One computer lab*, in the Enabling Unit of college's *Equal Opportunity Cell*, which is a lab for students with disabilities. It is equipped with 10 personal computers installed with Jaws13.0, talking and screen-reading software, 17 Netbooks with special screen-reading software, one *Lexic* scanner with which visually challenged students can scan books, one printer with latest technology and all the basic reading equipments such as angel e-book reader and voice recorder, Braille slates, mathematical slates, etc.

35. SWOC analysis of the Department and future plans:

- (a) **Strengths:** The Department of Political Science draws its strength from the concept 'Unity in Diversity', for our classes represent each and every section of this land. Students from diverse backgrounds intermingle and in turn be sensitized by experiences of cultural composition of the college. Further the Department believes in democracy in its true spirit, by making the class room an open atmosphere for democracy in practice. The department is very proud of the fact that its faculty and students partner the multitude of democratic voices and struggles that dot the country and does so by initiating debates and discussions within the classroom that often lead to mature and well-reasoned academic papers and eventually even some activist work. The department conducts regular student seminars in each semester, sponsored by the Department but organised solely by the students themselves. The department's unique strength lies in training young men and women to think critically and analyse the world around them. Today, the Department is a fine mixture of young and competent faculty on the one hand and the senior and experienced faculty on the other hand. The faculty has varied research and teaching interests and is keenly involved in academic activities of various kinds. The courses

that students undertake engage both with theory and practice. For example the course offered by the department on *Gandhi in Contemporary world* looks at not just theoretical aspect of Gandhism but also engages students with the government scheme on *swachata abhiyaan*. Project RTI has been active for about 3 years in NSS DCAC. The project *Revolution through Education* is another important project taken up by *Save the Quest* with the motive of reforming the education system to make it more flexible and holistic, more importantly quest-based. This project is operational since May 2013. Special classes are arranged for students preparing for their post-graduate entrance examinations in various universities. Many of UG students in political science department, after being trained in the subject in DCAC, go on to join in prestigious universities like JNU and DU in India and LSE and Indiana university, etc in west.

- (b) **Weaknesses:** All class rooms that are assigned to the Department are not equipped with projectors, thereby becoming a serious hindrance in the use of educational technology.

Unavailability of good Hindi medium literature for Hindi medium students often demotivates the students and teachers.

No doubt our library is rich but, students are instructed to return library books before the beginning of the semester examination. This makes it difficult for some students to prepare during the exams.

Lack of financial assistance at the college level for research-related activities is another weak area which needs serious attention.

Lack of Hostel Facilities is another area of concern for the outstation students. Outstation students are forced to stay at faraway places in search of cheaper accommodation availability, which adversely affects not only their academic activities but also the health of the students

- (c) **Opportunities:** Owing to its inter-disciplinary approach, the scope and opportunity of Political Science is much more. The Department facilitates by providing a space for the young minds to develop into a thinking being. It is also part of the core courses of the Honours programme in Journalism. The inter-disciplinary focus of new research within the college and at DU as well as outside has provided the students with many new opportunities to engage in research. On the career front the subject can be the best option for Teaching, Civil Services, Law, Research, Mass Media and so on, among the most sought after career choices.
- (d) **Challenges:** At times diversity may create biggest hindrances and emerge as a challenge before you, which is true to the Department of Political Science.

One such challenge relating to diversity is the issue of language. As mentioned before, non-availability of reading material in Hindi, especially according to the new syllabus, is a huge disadvantage for a large number of students. Nevertheless, the faculty members and the students of the Department have come up with a unique initiative by introducing Students Seminar programmes in every semester to, at least partially, overcome such challenge.

The biggest challenge before the Department as well as to the college is the non-regularization of teachers, which is discouraging young teachers to come with innovative ideas.

- (e) **Future Plans:** The Department plans to apply for a research grant to undertake a research project involving both faculty and students – this could be in the fields of gender, political economy or international relations. Among the future plans, the top priority before the Department is to initiate a regular series of lectures by eminent scholars and organize seminars/conferences on a regular basis. We propose to start a Departmental Journal (bilingual) with an ISSN number. The department intends to conduct more educational trips for the Students. Also since we have lot of students from Hindi medium, we intend to propose for provision of English learning short term courses to interested students.

30. Details of Infrastructural Facilities:

- (a) **Library:** A fairly good collection of Spanish books is available in the College library. Approximately more than 120 new Spanish books have been added in the last four years.
- (b) **Internet facilities for staff and students:** The entire college is Wi-fi enabled. There are more than 700 laptops which are issued to faculty members and students as and when required. Faculty members issue laptops for classroom teaching and other research related work. Further, more than 100 desktop computers are available in five computer labs.
- (c) **Class rooms with ICT facility:** There are 21 classrooms with multimedia projectors. There are 3 big seminar/committee rooms with the same facility used for project presentations from time to time. There is one multipurpose hall/auditorium with audio-video facility that is utilized for large group sessions.
- (d) **Laboratories:**
 - (i) Four computer labs with more than 100 desktops are available for students with internet facility to work on their assignments.
 - (ii) One computer lab, called the 'UGC Resource Centre' is a lab dedicated for faculty members, with more than 10 desktops, with internet facility.
 - (iii) One state-of-the art Media Lab which can be used for video production, still photography, video editing, radio programming and other production related activities. The construction of the media lab is complete with necessary infrastructure such as fixtures and fittings, noise-proof walls, newsroom studio furniture set-up etc. The process for procuring camera, audio and editing equipment is underway.

- 31. Number of students receiving financial assistance from college, university, Government and others agencies:**
- 32. Details on student enrichment programmes (special lectures/workshops/seminar) with external experts:** Knowledge of the language is enriched with the use of audio/visual aids. There are CD's available with most of the books so as to increase the spoken and comprehension skills of the students. Films are also occasionally shown.
- 33. Teaching methods adopted to improve student learning:** Focus is always on the use of the Communicative method of teaching wherein functional use of the language is encouraged dealing with varied situations. Focus is on activity based exercises and not rote learning. Traditional method of teaching also has to be resorted to with slow learners making them practice through repetition.
- 34. Participation in institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) and extension activities:** Helped the college in launching the Add-on Part-time Certificate Course in Spanish, French and German in 2006 and the Diploma and Advanced Diploma Course in Spanish in 2007. Was the Course Advisor for these courses from 2006 to 2008. Thereafter, I was the Co-ordinator from 2008 till 2013. During this period part-time courses in Chinese, Korean and Japanese were also introduced in the college. These were then discontinued in 2013 because of unavailability of teachers. At the moment I am part of the Committee which is responsible for managing these courses.
- 35. SWOC analysis of the Department and future plans:**
- (a) Strengths:**
- (i) Learning process going on well for students who attend class regularly.
 - (ii) A well equipped classroom.
 - (iii) Students are guided to keep in touch with nearby Spanish Institutes, for example "Instituto Cervantes" which has a good library. A good collection of CDs and DVDs are also available. Many students avail this facility.
Some students also visit the JNU library.
 - (iv) Occasionally films also shown in class.
 - (v) Three display boards are there in the classroom where students can display the projects they work on.
- (b) Weaknesses:**
- (i) More discipline with regard to attendance required for many students.
-

- (ii) Books/CD's/DVD's for the library are restricted to the Indian market. Permission should be given for online purchase of these so as to better equip the College library.

- (c) **Opportunities:** Many students pursued Spanish after completing their B.A. in College. Some got jobs in embassies of the Spanish speaking countries as also in Companies and Call Centres where knowledge of Spanish is required.

Knowledge of a foreign language is otherwise also an asset whatever be their field of work.

- (d) **Challenges:**

- (i) To counsel students to be more regular in their studies, both in class and in their self-study and to use the language as much as possible amongst themselves.

- (e) **Future Plans:**

- (i) To work on getting permission for online purchase of books, CD's and DVD's.
- (ii) To organize talks by experts in the field.
- (iii) To work on the possibility of introducing a "one-semester" capsule course in Spanish as a second Generic Elective option.
- (iv) To work on the possibility of allowing students of B.A. (Hons.) Generic Elective Sem. III to study Spanish from the beginning by joining Sem I students (if time-table so permits). They will be able to complete the 4 semester study of Spanish.

Layout of Old Building: Ground Floor

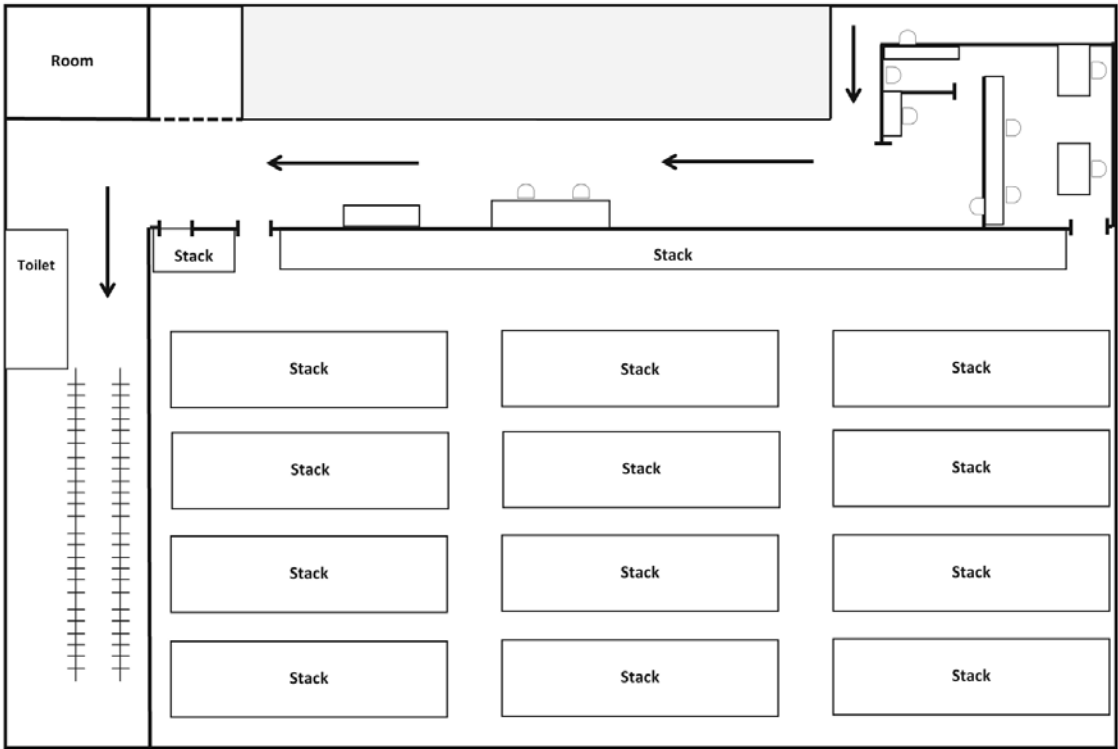


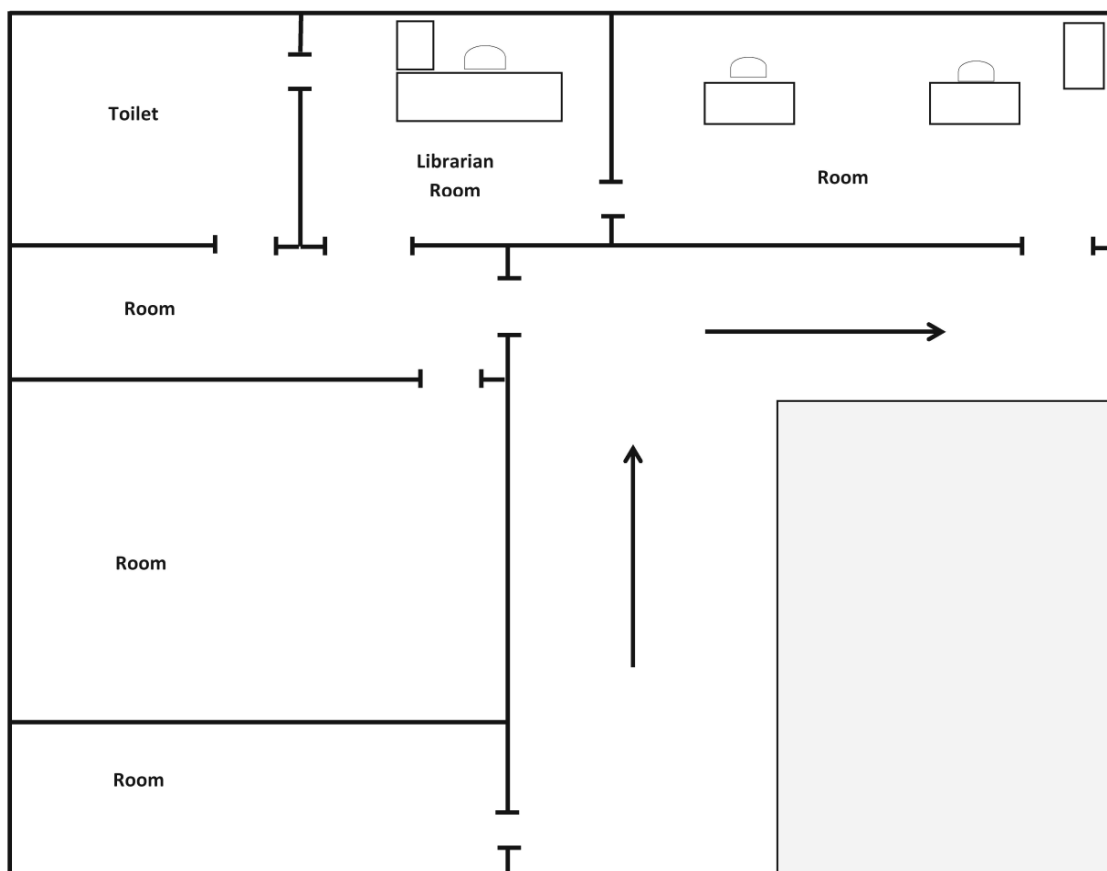
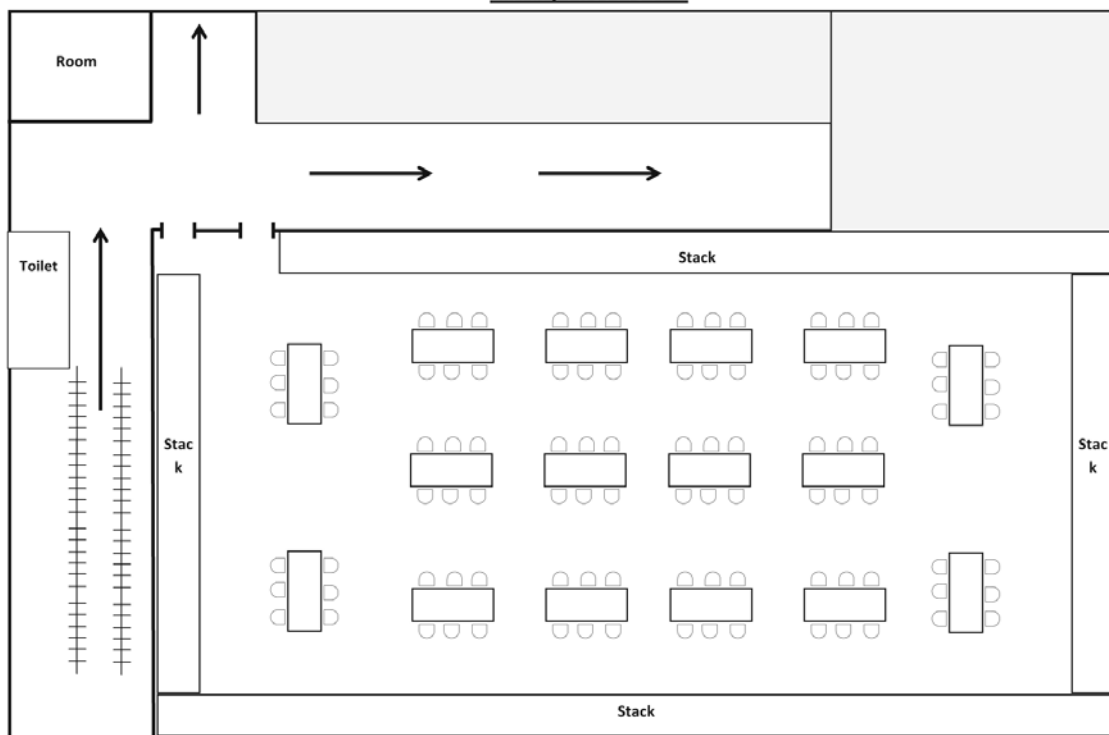

CONSTITUTION OF STUDENTS' COUNCIL DELHI COLLEGE OF ARTS & COMMERCE

1. Students' Council will be known as Delhi College of Arts & Commerce Students Council, hereinafter referred to as 'Council'.
2. The main objective of the students' Council will be to organise cultural, educational, sport's activities in the college and also to co-operate towards the solution of day-to-day problems and the difficulties faced by the students and create healthy atmosphere for all round development of the students of the College.
3. The Council will consist of the following elected office bearers:
 1. President
 2. General Secretary
 3. Vice-President
 4. Sports Secretary
 5. Cultural Secretary
 6. Joint Secretary
 7. Secretary Girls Common RoomIn addition of these office bearers one representative from each course will be elected by the students of the respective course.
4. Eligibility for election to Council
 - (a) President: Only third year student will be eligible to seek election to the office of President.
 - (b) Vice-President: No Ist year student can contest election to the office of the Vice-President.
 - (c) Sports Secretary: The student seeking election to this post should be a good sportsman having excellence in sports.
 - (d) Cultural Secretary: The student seeking election to this post should have outstanding achievement in cultural activities (like music, singing, debate).

5. Election

- (i) Election to these office bearers will be held in August and exact date will be declared by Staff Council/Patron.
- (ii) The term of the office bearers and other representatives will be from August to 1st April every year. However, in case any member of the Council is found guilty of indiscipline expelled, fined or involved in any criminal case or caught for using unfair means in any examination will cease to be the member from the day the action is taken against him/her.
- (iii) Principal of the college will be the Patron of the Students' Council.
- (iv) Patron can suspend any member including President from the office, if he is satisfied that the continuance of such member in his post is detrimental to the interest of the college or the Council. Such member/President will be removed by the Patron (Principal in Council) after giving him due opportunity.

6. General Eligibility Conditions.

- (i) No student who has been expelled, fined, failed in examination (including those who failed in 1st year of Honours Courses), detailed/debarred by the authorities from taking examination for any reason, dropouts, involved in using unfair means in the examination, will be eligible to seek election or caste vote.
- (ii) No student against whom disciplinary action has been taken by the college shall be eligible to caste vote or seek election.
- (iii) No student who is involved in any criminal case and against whom such case is pending in any court shall be eligible to seek election or caste his vote.
- (iv) Issuing of posters, banners, cards, pamphlets, writing on the wall, shouting of slogans

in and around the college will disqualify a candidate from competing in election. Students encouraging outsiders, directly or indirectly or involve them in college election will also disqualify him/her from seeking elections. Before taking such action the member will be given a fair chance to present his/her case.

- (v) Personal canvassing is allowed in any form without prejudice to para 6(iv).

7 Budget and Finances:

The council will approve the budget presented by the Vice-President in the first meeting of the students' Council on the basis of funds available for the purpose and will distribute these funds to its various activities for the entire year. No money can be spent without the approval of the Council. Patron/Advisor may take appropriate action in case he finds any expenditure not in accordance with objectives. Distribution of funds should be balanced, so as to achieve all major objectives given under para 2. The expenditure will be audited by C.A. All sanctions will be approved by Principal and Bursar.

8. Functions & Powers

Staff Advisor:

The staff council or the Patron (Principal in Council) will nominate one teacher to act as Staff Advisor from among the three names approved by the Staff Council and after consulting the students' council. No teacher will be nominated for more than two terms in all but not in succession. The staff Advisor will have the following powers.

1. To preside over all meetings of the Council.
2. To give final decision on the deliberations of the council.
3. To ensure that expenses incurred by the Council are in order and have its full approval.
4. To advise the council in decision making and its day-to-day functioning on important matters.

9. Meetings:

- (i) Students Council will meet atleast thrice in an year. No member is permitted to use un-parliamentary language, disobey the rulings of council Advisor, or to disturb the meeting will fully or otherwise. Such members will be liable for disciplinary action and can be removed from membership as per para 5(iv).
- (ii) The Patron (Principal in Council) will have the right to veto any decision taken by the Council if it is not in conformity with the norms or in the opinion of Patron is detrimental to the interests of the Institution.

President

President shall act as Coordinator of the Council and will ensure proper working of the different societies. In case of resignation, expulsion or any other disciplinary action against President, General Secretary/Vice-President will act as President till the expiry of the term. However, if the Vice-President is unwilling or is ineligible under para 5(ii) & iii the General Secretary will act the President of the Council.

Vice-President

He/she will preside over the meeting in the absence of President. He will be responsible for drawing money in accordance with para 10 and spent it. He will maintain accounts, ensure proper utilisation of money received and get them audited. He/She will work as the Treasurer of the Council.

Secretary General

He/She will preside over the meeting in absence of President/Vice-President. He/She will coordinate the activities of all the office bearers. He/she will be incharge of all correspondence to and from the Council. He/she will call meetings of the Council under advice from the Advisor and ensure suitable arrangements. He will be incharge of all such records.

Sports/Cultural Secretary:

He/she will be responsible and instrumental in organising sports/cultural activities in the college, as decided by the Council in its meetings.

Joint Secretary

He/She will assist the General Secretary in discharge of his functions. He/she will also look after the academic interest of the students and organise academic activities as passed by Council.

10. General

The money can be drawn by any of the following:
The Advisor and any one of the President or Vice-President. The cash in hand will be kept by the Advisor/President/Vice-President,

11. Amendment to Constitution

The General Body of the students can amend the constitution if approved by 2/3rd majority of the students on the rolls of the college. However, the Patron (Principal in Council) will have the full right to suspend in whole or any clause, amend or re-word any of the clauses of the constitution if deemed necessary in the interest of the college. The decision of the Patron (Principal in Council) will be final and will be binding on all.

Eligibility Criteria for Candidate as per Recommendations of Lyngdoh Committee's report.

1. Under graduate student between the age 17 and 22 may contest election. This age range may be appropriately relaxed in the case of professional colleges, where course often range between 4 to 5 years.
2. Although the committee would refrain from prescribing any particular minimum marks to be attained by the candidate, the candidate should in no event have any academic arrears in the year of contesting elections.
3. The candidate shall have attained the minimum percentage of attendance as prescribed by the University or 75% attendance, whichever is higher.
4. The candidate shall have one opportunity to contest for the post of office bearer. And two opportunities to contest for the post of an executive member.
5. The candidate shall not have a previous criminal record that is to say he should not have been tried and /or convicted of any criminal offence or misdemeanor. The candidate shall also not have been subject to any disciplinary action by the University authority.
6. The candidate must be a regular, full time student of the college and shall not be distance/proximate education student. That is to say that all eligible candidate must be enrolled in a full time course duration being at least being one year.

b- Diversion of funds.

During the scrutiny of record of Grant-in-aid, it has been noticed that the college has received 415.00 lakh non-recurring OBC special grant during the year 2009-10 with the specific purposes for which grant may be utilized as per detail given below-

1. Renovation and repairs of classrooms, laboratories and libraries.
2. Purchase of science laboratories equipment.
3. Purchase of textbooks (Upto Rs.5 Lakhs) for the library.
4. Purchase of generator for power backup.
5. Replacement and/or repair of furniture for classroom, laboratories and library.

During the test-check of vouchers, it has been revealed that the college has utilized amounting to Rs. 2,36,331/- for the purchase of 80 chairs for canteen, 06 office almirah for office use, 01 hot case for office use and 01 bar code reader and printer for library.

Further, as per record 80 chairs were issued to caretaker for the use of canteen but no record was maintained by the caretaker.

The college has purchased new furniture without replacing/repair the old one as mentioned above at S. No. 5. It must be ensure that all relevant procedures and guidelines in connection with utilization of these funds are adhered to and proper accounts are maintained.

Reasons for violating the specific purpose for utilization of OBC grant may be explained to audit.

Sub:- Irregularities in awarding the work of canteen.

During the test check of file relating to award a college canteen contract, it has been revealed that the college canteen contract was awarded to M/s Pooja Malhotra from March 2009 to July 2009 and extended upto Dec. 2009 and thereafter the work was awarded to M/s Prem Jeet from Jan. 2010 to august 2010. In this regard, following irregularities have been observed-

1. The college has awarded the college canteen contract without charging the rent/license fee per month from the contractor whereas the college is providing a big space, Kitchen, store room and utensil washing room. Reasons for not charging license fee from the contractor may be explained to audit.
2. The college is charging monthly charge of Rs. 1000/- p.m. for water and electricity from the contractor instead of charging actual expenses for the use of water and electricity of the college. As per condition no. 3 of letter Dt.13.7.2007 issued to contractor the charges will be on flat rate till separate meters provided to the canteen. After a lapse of 4year, no efforts were made to install a separate meters for canteen. Even the college is charging a very nominal rate for water and electricity and which is loss to the college.
3. Even the contractor is not paying the water and electricity charges i.e. Rs. 1000/- monthly.
4. As per condition no.9 of award letter Dt.18.12.2009 to M/s Prem Jeet, the caterers will arrange for sufficient furniture for use of the students. But in March 2010, 80 chairs were purchased for Rs. 1,08,000/- and issued to college canteen. Reasons for this may be explained.

Further on the Scrutiny of voucher No.620 dated 30.11.2012 revealed that Mr. Y.K.Ranjan, Associate Prof. Department of Pol. Sc. sought permission to visit Darjeeling (West Bengal) against Home Town Concession for the block year 2012 – 13. Darjeeling does not come under the North Eastern Region as per CCS (LTC) Rules, 1988. As per his demand he was granted LTC Advance of Rs.67,500/- vide cheque No.66625 dated 19.06.2012 for Darjeeling visit. After a lapse of 5 months and reminder from DCAC, he returned the unspent amount of Rs.36,811/- vide cheque No. 444398 dated 23.11.2012, without paying any penal interest. Against the declared place of visit Darjeeling (West Bengal), in his claim he has shown Imphal (Manipur) and Guwahati (Assam) for the place of visit along with proof of Air India Airline ticket. He has travelled from 12.07.2012 to 14.07.2012. He neither sought the permission of the competent authority for the change of declared place of visit before the commencement of journey. In these circumstances, under Rules, the whole reimbursement of Rs.30,689/- to him needs to be forfeited. Hence, the amount of Rs.30,689/- may be recovered from Mr. Y.K.Ranjan.

The College authorities may recover an amount of Rs.7,14,779/- as a cost of ticket and leave encashment amount under the intimation to audit, and other such type of cases may be reviewed at college level.

Sub Non- Reconciliation of the expenditure with PWD

Non Recurring : On the scrutiny of record pertaining to grant In aid it has been found that Rs. 388lakh was sanctioned as non-recurring grant under "implementation of OBC reservation" for the (1) repair/renovation of classrooms, laboratories and library (2) purchase of science laboratories equipment (3) Purchase of textbooks for library (4) Purchase of Generator set (5) replacement /repair of furniture for classrooms. A detail proposal of the expenditure amounting to Rs. 387 lakhs was submitted to the University of Delhi. Out of this fund Rs. 367.06 has been spent on various works/purchases as per the detail given

The files related to purchase of equipments and furniture and fixture have not been provided to audit.

As per CPWD manual the Executive engineer shall send to accounts officer the statement of expenditure in (CPWA-65A) along with schedule of deposit works (CPWA65) showing the progress of expenditure on deposit work. It is also necessary that in respect of deposit works, the department should settle their accounts against the deposit expenditure expeditiously so that the amount in the book of audit as well as Govt. department does not remain unaccounted for a considerable period.

While audit it has been found that college has sanctioned the amount for each work as an when demanded by PWD, when the college authorities were requested to provide the completion certificate and the actual expenditure made by the PWD, the department has failed to provide the Reconciliation statement/actual expenditure made by PWD on each work completed.

College authorities are requested to take the statement of expenditure (work wise) from PWD and reconcile the expenditure, and if any amount which is paid excess to PWD may be recover and deposit in Govt. account, and Expenditure statement, reconciliation of expenditure and status report may be sent to audit.

(2) **Teaching Salary:** An amount of Rs. 40 lakh was issued as recurring expenditure under OBC Teaching salary head, as per condition of the letter no expenditure should be mixed with the funds that are being released under the "OBC Teaching Head" but it has been found that college authorities has made the payment of Rs. 51.54 lakh against Rs. 40 lakh and the balance amount has been charged to recurring expenditure head which is irregular. Reasons for excess expenditure and charged to the different head may be explained to audit.

Sub Irregularities / non observation of purchase procedure

(1) **Purchase of Window type Air conditioners** : For the purchase of two ton window type Air-Conditioners, rates/ quotations of Hitachi and Samsung brands were called from the open market on 15 March 2012, and the supply order was placed to M/s Master Cool Aircon for the supply of two Hitachi brand air conditioners @ Rs. 32500/-. As per the comparative statement it has been found that M/s. R.P.G Electronic has submitted Rs. 24000/- per air conditions for Samsung brand.

College authorities may clarify that when the rates of two brands were collected and the rates of 2 ton Samsung brand was Rs. 24000/-, why the costlier model of Rs. 32500/- was purchased and Govt. money amounting to Rs. 17000/- wasted, and it has also been found that Rule 146 of GFR has also not observed.

- (2) **Purchase of five split Air conditioners** : On 10 March 2010 four split (2 ton) air conditioners were demanded by the co-ordinator, ICT programme for which quotations were called from the local vendors/suppliers. Quotations were received from 05 vendors/suppliers and vide supply order no. DCAC/2010/C-1/70 dt. 30.03.201, the supply order for 05 air conditioners was placed to M/s Pankaj Electronics @ Rs. 42000/- per air conditioner plus other installation charges. While audit it has been found that as per comparative statement M/s. Raj Electronics has also submitted the same rate i.e. Rs. 42,000/- but he was charging Rs. 500/- as installation charges, whereas M/s. Pankaj was charging Rs. 1000/- for installation, Rs. 600/- for Wall brackets, Rs. 400/- for Bee Brackets. It has also been found that on 02.02.2010 M/s Pankaj has submitted Rs. 40,000/- per AC of same brand and same model which is not considered by the Purchase committee, reasons not mentioned in the file.

Irregular purchase of 05 AC's when only four AC's were demanded may be got regularised from the competent authority under intimation to audit.

- ✓(3) **Purchase of Digital Camera** : As per GFR 145 "Purchase of Goods up the value of Rs. 15000/- only on each occasion may be made without inviting quotations or bid on the basis of a certificate to be recorded by the competent authorities as mentioned in the rule. But it has been found that on 30-03-2011 a Sony brand digital camera amounting to Rs. 14700/- was purchased from M/s. Sanmati computers but the Rule GFR-145 has not followed and no certificate has been obtained from the officer deputed to purchase the camera. The omission needs regularisation from the competent authority under intimation to audit.

- (4) **Purchase of chairs and desk**: As per supply order No. DCAC/2011/1202 dt. 30.03.2011 for the purchase of 600 tables/desk and 600 chairs amounting to Rs. 7,95,000/- were purchased from M/s. Suresh Enterprises, for which no original file was submitted to audit only photocopy of the file was submitted to audit from the record it revealed that only the quotations were called from the open market no procedure as mentioned in rule 151 of General Financial rules has been followed.

Regularisation for non – observation of GFR Rules may be obtained from the competent authority under intimation to audit.

Sub Misuse of student fund and non -observation of the codal formalities

Vide voucher no. 374 dt. 14.11.2012 an amount of Rs. 7,29,213/-has been spent on construction of rooms for Students Union and NSS and repair and renovation of the canteen from student fund and the work was awarded to M/s. Rajesh Solanki. During audit it has been found that College authorities have not prepared any estimate for the work and no technical advice was obtained from any of the Govt. /private authority. Further college authorities had not observed the provisions of GFR Rules

- (1) Rule 126(3) All original works costing up to Rupees ten lakhs may be assigned to a Public Works Department.
- (2) Rule 132 (ii) preparation of detailed design and estimates shall precede any sanction for work
 - (iv) Open tenders will be called for works costing less than Rupees five lakhs
 - (vi) Execution of contract agreement or award of work should be done before Commencement of the work

It has also been found that under OBC scheme an amount of Rs. 10 lakh (Grant in Aid) was also sanctioned for the renovation of canteen even then the expenditure has been made from the student fund which is a misuse of student fund. Following points may please be clarified to audit

1. Reasons for the expenditure been made from the student funds when the Grant in aid was already sanctioned for the same purpose.
2. Reasons for non -observation of codal formalities as per GFR Rules



Sub.: Un claimed Security Money amounting to Rs.42,22,121/-

At the time of admission college is collecting Rs.1500/- from each student as Security/caution money, which is refundable within a period of three years after the completion of their academic degree. As per student's society fund ledger/balance sheet for the year 2012-2013 it has been found that an amount of Rs.42,22,121/- is lying which includes large amount of security which is more than three years old and unclaimed under library security head. Year wise balance (as per balance sheet) is given below:-

Reasons for non-refund of caution money which is more than three years old may be explained to audit and further college authorities should make efforts to refund the amount to the concerned students or unclaimed amount of security money may be utilized for the purpose prescribed in the guidelines issued by the University on the subject with the approval of the competent authority.

Sub.: Physical Verification of Store and Library**Physical Verification of Store**

As per Rule 192(1)(3) of General Financial Rules "Physical verification of the store and stock is required to be done at least once in a year and the discrepancies, if any, should be recorded in the stock register for appropriate action by the competent authority.

During the test audit of store stock registers it has been found that physical verification of consumable and non-consumable has not been done during the audit period.

Physical Verification of Library

As per rule 194 of GFR "Complete physical verification of books should be done every year in case of library having not more than twenty thousand volumes. For library having more than twenty thousand volumes up to fifty thousand volumes, such verification should be done at least once in three years. Sample verification at intervals of not more than

three years should be done in case of library having more than fifty thousand volumes. In case such verification reveals unusual or unreasonable shortage, complete verification shall be done." But it has been found that no physical verification of the library has been done during audit period.

College authority is requested to conduct the physical verification of the store and library and the outcome of the verification, and the reasons for not conducting the physical verification of the store and library may be intimated to audit.

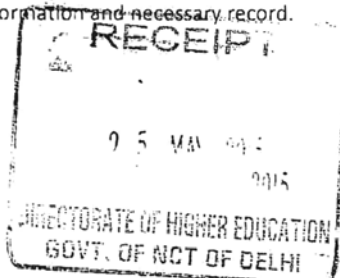

Sub: Diversion of Funds

It is submitted that the University of Delhi has granted its approval vide its letter No.DC/OBC Grant/09/402 dated. 20.1.2009 to our plans submitted to the University vide this office letter No.DCAC/Build/A-9/776 & 778 dated 21 and 23.01.2009. (Copy enclosed).

The Canteen furniture as per revised plan item No.5 was approved by the University vide letter No. mentioned above and issued to College Canteen by the College. Therefore, amount of Rs.2,36,331/- has been utilized in accordance with the prior approval of the University. The old furniture has already been repaired and is presently in use.

It is submitted that the College has not violated the guidelines and has taken the prior approval of the University. Keeping into consideration the necessity of the Institution of Higher Education.

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Para No.3 : Irregularities in awarding the work of Canteen

Ref. No.

1. Necessary instructions have been issued to the Convenor, College Canteen to do the needful and will be shown to the next Audit.
2. Separate water and electricity meters have already been installed and the contractor is being charged as per the latest rates of water and electricity. No loss is being incurred to the College .
3. Contractor is regularly paying what is due to him.
4. Under OBC scheme introduced to the Colleges the strength of the students got increased. In view of this the College provided to Canteen the furniture in accordance to the instructions given and amount sanctioned by the University.

NEW PARAS

Para No.1 : Ir-regular payment of LTC amounting to Rs.7,14,779/-

It is submitted that the LTC payments to the employees were made who purchased the tickets from Air-India, though through the other agents. However, if the ticket cost is more than the Air tickets cost charged by Air India, the same will be reimbursed after verification. In case, if there is no extra amount charged by the Agents from whom the employees have purchased tickets of Air India, the para may kindly be dropped.

Para No.2: Recovery of Transport amounting to Rs.9920/-

It is submitted that the amount will be recovered from the named employees in the month of June, 2014 and will be shown to the audit party in the next audit.

Para No.3: Recovery of Rs.2546/- from Students as Cost of Library Books

Recovery of Rs.2546/- from Students as the Cost of Library Books has been deducted from their Library Security amount vide Cheque No.938557 dt. 29.5.2014. A Copy of the receipt is enclosed.

Para No.4 : Non-Reconciliation of the Expenditure with PWD:

College authorities have been requesting PWD to provide statement of expenditure to the College. The College is further requesting PWD in this regard. The same will be shown to the audit party in the next audit.

Para No.5: Irregularities / non observation of purchase procedure

(1) Purchase of Window Air Conditioners

The clarification provided by the Purchase Committee is enclosed.

"For Samsung two ton window type Air-Conditioners only one quotation was available whereas for Hitachi two ton window type Air-Conditioners three quotations were available. Therefore, the purchase committee could not consider the purchase of Samsung brand Air-conditioners. Further, the information that purchase committee gathered from different sources was that Hitachi air-conditioners are power efficient i.e. consume much less power than other brands such as 'Samsung'. A photocopy of 'Comparative quotations' is enclosed herewith."

(2) Purchase of Five Split Air Conditioners

The clarification provided by the Purchase Committee is enclosed.

"The order was placed with M/s. Pankaj Electronics (even though their installation charges were slightly higher) because this firm had supplied air-conditioners to the College in the past and their record of providing service is quite satisfactory."

(3) Purchase of Digital Camera

The clarification provided by the Purchase Committee is enclosed.

"Sony brand digital camera was purchased after inviting quotations for the same. After a review of the quotations, the purchase committee recommended that order for the supply of this camera be placed with M/s. Sanmati Computers as the quotation of the firm was the lowest. No technical officer was deputed for the purpose."

(4) Purchase of Chairs and Desks

The observations of the Competent authority i.e. purchase committee is enclosed. Therefore rules were followed accordingly.



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Ref. No....*"Statement of Comparative Quotations was prepared on the basis of original quotations of different suppliers. The Purchase Committee recommended that order be placed with M/s. Suresh Enterprises because their quotations was the lowest."*

Para No.6 : Misuse of Students Fund and Non-observation of the codel formalities.

1. There were long standing demands of the students for giving them separate rooms for *Student Union and National Service scheme (NSS)*. In order to meet their demands and getting consultation with respective incharges, this arrangement was initiated. No separate rooms were constructed. College had a sizeable room near the rear gate with tins on its roof. The same room was divided into two walls re-plastered damaged tins on roof were replaced by lantern. Thus Student Union and NSS rooms were allotted for the exclusive purpose of the student activities.

Therefore, no misuse of funds took place. Students Society funds were utilized. Since exclusively these rooms meant for Students Union and NSS activities.

Further, there was toilet room adjacent to the Canteen, which was not being used because it needed repairs and installation of the toilet sheets and related work. Thus, providing facility to the students near canteen.

2. Since the students were benefited therefore, the students funds were utilized. The same will be shown to the next audit party.

Tan No.1 : Un claimed Security Money amounting to Rs.42,22,121/-

Library security amount becomes due to be paid to the final year students after they get clearance from the College. Some of the students do apply for the refund of library security whereas, other do not bother to get back the amount. It gets accumulated as unclaimed.

It is proposed that such unclaimed amount would be utilized for various purposes such as automation of library, Computer, Media Labs to extend the benefits to the students studying under various degree courses.

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

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



Major Achievements and Activities during 2013-14

The college started publishing a peer reviewed bi-annual academic journal, *Intellectual Resonance* in 2013. This year the college has been awarded 3 Innovations Projects by University of Delhi while last year the college had successfully completed 2 Projects out of which one was selected for special display at Antardhwnai 2014 titled Symphonies of Nature: Folk songs from Punjab and Jammu and Kashmir: Dr. Devika Narula and Dr. Vinita Chaturvedi (English) and Dr. Amrit Kaur Basra (History). Dr. Smita Banerjee (English), Dr. Rajiv Goel (Commerce), Dr. K. Suresh Kumar (History) and Dr. Deepti Taneja (Economics) have completed their PhDs in 2013-14. Mr. Rajesh Kumar (Political Science) has been awarded a fellowship by the National University Singapore to pursue his doctoral research. Mr. Bir Singh (Economics) is pursuing his PhD. from CESP, JNU. Ms. Geetanjali Kala (Journalism), successfully completed a second masters from School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London with distinction. The Foundation project on –Hidden Monuments of Delhi by Aditya Kumar Gupta, Chaitnya Modgill and Adil Sethi was selected for an award at Antardhwnai. Three DCAC students were awarded the LEADearth Fellowship which is a Teri TETRA PACK Fellowship. We are the only college in the Delhi University whose three students, Perna Sood, Manav Seth and Shaurya Patel have been awarded these projects. Amongst the five projects TERI selected from Delhi, DCAC bagged one called R Cube-generating awareness for converting waste from a challenge into opportunities and E 3-Generating awareness for environmental issues. The National Service Scheme Unit of Delhi College of Arts and Commerce has always been one of the most functional NSS Units of the Delhi University. Keeping the spirit of– Not Me, But You alive in our hearts, the NSS activities began even before the fresh batch for the year came in. In fact, NSS volunteers enthusiastically assisted the first years during the entire admission process.

Prakriti

Environment Society of DCAC under the guidance of Neeru Ma'am and the President Ritu has organized numerous activities in the academic year 2014-15. Society began the year by launching it's logo and printing their t-shirts. This year the project Paper plant under the guidance of Project Head Surya has done a commendable job by producing around 500 hand made sheets. Prakriti also organized e-waste collection drive in collaboration with CHINTAN. It collected around 20 kgs e-waste and submitted to CHINTAN which will reuse the gadgets. Thus they took a step in following the 3R's- Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. The Society also conducted an environmental survey in Netaji Nagar and nearby areas to create awareness on the current environmental issues. 90 students participated in the survey. The survey results showed 91% people use plastic bags and 79% of them often use plastic bags whereas only 34% people know about the harmful effects of plastic bags, 35% people are aware about segregation of waste whereas only 30% of them follow it, 56% people are aware about CFC's and 54% of them still rely

on CFC'S producing products, 43% people have planted saplings and only 40% people are aware about water scarcity.

Prakriti has participated in the All India Campaign 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan' started by the Government of India on October 2nd, 2014 following the footsteps of the Father of Nation- Mahatma Gandhi. Prakriti actively participated in cleaning the college campus and promoted the cleanliness campaign. It has participated in seminars held at India Habitat Centre and India International Centre organized by LeadEarthship and Navdanya respectively. LeadEarthship, a youth initiative by Tetra pak India and TERI-The Energy and Resources Institute hosted a seminar that brought leaders, entrepreneurs, artists, authors, activists and young achievers to talk about sustainability and social change. Navdanya in collaboration with India International Centre organized its annual festival BHOOMI based on Annapurna: Feeding the world. Annapurna talked about Food Security, Food Safety and Food Sovereignty.

Prakriti organized a campaign to create awareness to use of 'organic colours' by distributing greeting cards to the staff members and students. Society also organized various competitions to promote environmental awareness. It has organized Online Nature Photography, Slogan and essay writing competition.

Prakriti has also organized 'Bottle Re-use' campaign under which used bottles were decorated and saplings were planted. This was done as part of the green railing project.

To conclude, Prakriti –Environment society of DCAC has achieved a lot and is growing each passing day.

NSS Annual Report

The session of 2014-15 has witnessed NSS becoming one of the most active and recognized student society in the college. Over the past year, the NSS has started new projects, as well as expanded the scope of existing projects. The annual NSS fest – Aadya, was shifted to January from its original timing as a Diwali Mela and has proved to be a bigger success than its previous editions.

The event was held on Thursday, January 15th, 2015. The festival which witnessed a footfall of around 2500 students was the third instalment of NSS DCAC's cultural festival started in November 2012.

The festival had 20 stalls put up by NGOs such as Delhi Foundation (an NGO of deaf and dumb women), Tamana, Save the Children and Save the Quest etc. including stalls put by Enactus Ramjas, Enactus Hans Raj, Enactus CBS and Enactus DCAC. The fest further consisted of dance performances by Tanzeal kids, flash mob and fun one minute games like Pictionary, Lucky 7, Feed the Clown etc.

The NSS also conducted workshops and expanded the scope of its annual blood donation drive by making it a bi-annual event from 2014 onwards, as well as beginning a new collaboration with the team from BloodConnect. The New project has already begun functioning, and oversaw the second blood donation drive, conducted during the second weekend of February 2015.

Individual Project reports are given below

Project TanZeal

Project TanZeal initiated on 1st August, 2012 by two students of Delhi College of Arts and Commerce, Yashvardhan Verma and Sukriti Sethi. They used to regularly observe the children of the construction labourers who worked near their college. They decided to approach them one day with the simple intention of finding at least one child who they could teach after their college hours but upon reaching, they received immensely positive response from the parents of those children and thus, the Project started with 11 children.

Eventually, TanZeal garnered a lot of appreciation from both the staff and the students of the college which led to an increase in their volunteer strength from two to about fifteen. The children also brought their friends from school and nearby areas and within the next few months, TanZeal had more than 40 children regularly coming for the after school classes. At present, TanZeal has a total strength of over 80 children along with 40 volunteers who teach them.

TanZeal aims at the holistic development of the underprivileged children who come at the centre five days a week from 2:30 to 4:30. The College premises are used as the centre for the Project and the TanZeal team has access to all the facilities provided by the college right from using the classroom to using the Computer Rooms. The children are not just taught basic subjects like Mathematics, English and Hindi, a lot of focus is given to moral education and personality development as well. The children get to hone their dancing, singing and art talent one day a week in the Project. Every year, the children display their talent during the Annual NSS Mela of the college, Aadya. They give live performance in front of the entire college and the bookmarks, diya and other items made by these children are sold at nominal rates at the TanZeal stall. The money earned by selling these items is used for buying more stationery products for the children every year.

Project TanZeal has regular outings where the children are taken to explore new places in Delhi like Nehru Park, Qutub Minar and Safdarjung Tomb. Project TanZeal was featured in a National daily, "The Hindu" in 2013. This year witnessed a significant improvement in the Annual Results of the Tanzeal Children as about 21 of them scored the highest marks in their respective grades.

This years' TanZeal session began in the month of July and ended in April, 2015. The Project will begin its third year in the month of July, 2015.

Action Points

- Strength of students increased from 45 to 88.
- Volunteer workforce increased from 11 to 48.
- 21 students scored highest marks in their grades.
- Talent Day
- Trip to QutubMinar

Project Arts and Craft

The project has inhouse activities as well as we have a collaboration with an NGO Arpan which forms the other other wing. It has the responsibilities of decoration in the fest and events of NSS.

Achievements

- Volunteers of Udaan have successfully conducted NSS fest by just not their creativity but also coordination with other project members.
- Besides above activities they also went for clean and green drive in Lajpat Nagar were they cleaned not only the walls of the street but also created awareness among people about the importance of cleanliness of the surroundings and our environment.
- **Collaboration with Arpan :** The collaboration with Arpan focuses on the all-round development of underprivileged children.

The volunteers of the college go to the AndhMahavidyalaya at Panchkuian Road in New Delhi, every Wednesday to make the children learn by fun. Various activities are performed with the blind children to enhance their logical and analytical skills along with the development in other areas. The organization sends us a curriculum every week and the activities are performed accordingly.

Action Points

- Collaboration with an NGO Arpan

- Creative responsibility of all NSS activities and events
- Wall painting in and outside college (Lajpat Nagar flyover)
- Various activities with the blind children to enhance their logical and analytical skills

Clean and Green

Clean and green has been an important part of NSS DCAC. It emphasizes on the cleanliness of the college. Under this project, we organise various cleanliness drives, which are mostly one day events. Along with these one day events, campus surveys are conducted by the volunteers on regular basis.

Campus Survey

This year, we conducted two campus surveys. Under this, volunteers were asked to survey different areas of college. Set of forms were prepared and volunteers were asked to get them filled by the students of college. In another survey, volunteers themselves surveyed some areas of college. The data from both the surveys were compiled into a report.

Cleanliness Drive

Action Points:

- **Campus Survey :** This year, we conducted two campus surveys. Under this, volunteers were asked to survey different areas of college. Set of forms were prepared and volunteer were asked to get them filled by the students of college. In another survey, volunteers themselves surveyed some areas of college. The data from both the surveys were compiled into a report.
- **Cleanliness Drive :** Two cleanliness drives were conducted throughout the year. Some of the areas of college were targeted by the volunteers and eventually cleaned by them. Area near the basketball court, near the music room and at the back of the NSS room needed further attention. The report has already been compiled and submitted to the Principal office.

Cleanliness Drive at Lajpat Nagar flyover in association with New Delhi Rising. A cleanliness drive was organised at Lajpat Nagar flyover. Volunteers were asked to clean the flyover by themselves and then paint them (assisted by Project Arts and Craft).

RTI

Project RTI has been active for about 3 years in NSS DCAC. The main objective of this project is to allow students to have a better understanding of the RTI Act, 2005 and the right to information which has been bestowed upon the citizens of India by the government. RTI is something which can be put to use in our daily lives as and when needed. One can seek information from public authorities on the grounds of RTI Act. The activities and events planned for this session were for the better understanding of the above mentioned objectives.

Two activities were planned for the volunteers of Project RTI which took most of the time during the session:

- During the first half of the session, the project collaborated with SatarkNagarikSangathan (SNS) – an information group which assists people to exercise their right to information using RTI Act. This year the work was regarding Food Security Act, in compliance with RTI Act, 2005. The Act obligates for every public authority to make Suo-motu disclosure of certain information which they have to display near their territories. The students had to survey different ration circles across different constituencies in Delhi and prepare the report for the same along with photographs to support their report. They had to check the information available on the public boards displayed by these circles and fill out the form provided to them by SNS. These reports were compiled and sent to SNS. The experience earned was first hand and students got the exposure of how a public authority worked in reality.
- In the later stage of the session, students in their respective groups of 2/3 were asked to file an RTI application to understand the basics of the RTI Act. They had to research about a public authority where they wanted to obtain the information and following the protocol prescribed, they filed their RTIs. All the students got to know the procedure of filing the RTI applications. A total of 11 RTIs will be written out of which, 4 RTIs will be filed and remaining 7 will be kept in NSS records. This will be very helpful to them in understanding the communication, procedure and the system. It will also help in dealing with problems in public authorities in a better way. Though the activity is still in progress but it is estimated to be completed by the first week of April.

Action Points:

- During the first half of the session, the project collaborated with Satark Nagarik Sangathan (SNS) – an information group which assists people to exercise their right to information using RTI Act.

- In the later stage of the session, students in their respective groups of 2/3 were asked to file an RTI application to understand the basics of the RTI Act.

Blind School

The project Blind School is one of the most important and the very first project taken up by Save the Quest. This project is operational since January 2013. Our objective is not just assisting the visually impaired students but to empower them in carrying out the very basic routine life.

STQ volunteers acts as scribes and tutors for numerous visually impaired students from University of Delhi, JNU and National Association for the Blind. These students have also helped with their assignments and their study material is provided to them in audio formats. The volunteers have scribed almost 300 exams this year. We associated ourselves with National Association for the Blind, R.K. Puram since July 2013. STQ also holds monthly events and competitions at the associations.

STQ has also started the 'I Pledge Campaign' under the Blind School Project itself. In this campaign, we drive the people around us to pledge that they would never discriminate among people on the basis of their disabilities. This initiative include various sensitization drives which in our view help the people to be aware of how it feels to be visually impaired and why those people demand no discrimination. This "I Pledge" campaign has been taken place in many colleges of Delhi University and in public places like canaught place in delhi.

Project Blind School started with just one kid who volunteered for teaching at the National Association for The Blind, R.K. Puram. And today, STQ is proud that it has come a long way since its inception. STQ is officially associated with National Association for The Blind, R.K. Puram and looks after the requirements of 200 children staying at the place. A project with the same name is also run by the STQ in DCAC in collaboration with the NSS unit of the college. STQ is also officially associated with the equal opportunity cell, DCAC.

Volunteer participation at STQ is constantly growing in numbers and currently stands at a figure of more than 100 volunteers. STQ plans to expand the project, associate with other institutions for disabled students to carry on the spread of this noble deed.

REVOLUTION THROUGH EDUCATION

The project Revolution through Education is another important project taken up by Save the Quest with the motive of reforming the education system to make it more flexible and holistic, more importantly quest-based. This project is operational since May 2013.

This was a project which sprung out of our disappointment with the current education system which more often than not fails to recognize, acknowledge and encourage talent. What troubled us more was the trend where many students were compelled to become either engineers or doctors or civil servants or chartered accountants.

We need a more liberating education system that let us choose our own paths and careers and also a kind of education system which should create people who are not just job-oriented but citizens who are knowledgeable and able to tackle problems both at personal and professional fronts. We stand for the students rights and uphold the philosophy of pragmatic, quality-based and quest-based education.

This project advocates the working philosophy of STQ wherein we emphasize on the importance of education in our quest to bring about positive, social changes. It includes presentations and research to encourage and to motivate students, to understand the system better and to advocate for much-needed reforms. Each presentation includes student counseling and encouraging students to stand up for their beliefs and for positive social reforms. We are also conducting a survey called “Perception towards Education” to assess the students’ take on the prevailing education system.

In a series of presentations and surveys, Team STQ has been to various schools in Patna namely St. Michael, Notre Dame, Kendriya Vidyalaya, Don Bosco. Team STQ is now looking at visiting private CBSE schools in South Delhi. STQ’s survey called “Perception towards Education” has already been completed by the students of the above schools and few colleges of the University of Delhi.

Action Points

- As part of this initiative, volunteers scribe exams for these special students. They also help disabled students in completing their assignments or preparing for their exams, apart from giving them tutorial classes.
- In association with Save the Quest, the students have conducted various workshops to sensitize the youth towards differently abled students. Pledge Card mechanism was introduced under the project, where people pledge to create a disabled-friendly environment and to never discriminate on the basis of disability.

Miscellaneous Events

- **Collection Drive for J&K Flood Victims**

NGO relief partner: Kashmir Foundation for Social Change

Students donated generously in cash and in kind. The street play society, Leher did a call

and a short skit to inform people about the situation in the valley and encourage them to donate.

- **Workshop on Gender Policing Conducted**

NGO Partner: No Country for Women

The organizers talked about what rape is, why it is caused and why it is wrong. The aim was to make people understand that if we think rape is wrong for the wrong reasons, then people are a part of the problem. People need to understand what the actual cause of rape is and how the urban educated class also interprets the gender roles wrongly.
